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when, pursuant to due process of law, there is reasonable suspicion or probable cause to believe that they have committed an offense, and

WHEREAS, enforcement decisions based solely on race have no acceptable or legal place in law enforcement operations, and

WHEREAS, there exists a perception in some communities within the state that law enforcement decisions based on race may be occurring in Florida, and

WHEREAS, the Florida Sheriffs Association and the Florida Police Chiefs Association have joined other professional law enforcement associations to discourage "racial" or any other forms of unconstitutional discriminatory profiling, and agreed to provide training and support to all law enforcement agencies to help them insure that such practices are not utilized.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT, the Florida Legislature will continue to encourage professional traffic stop techniques by Florida's law enforcement community, and condemns any use of "profiling," where decision-making is based on race or any other form of unconstitutional discriminatory profiling.

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
