I. SUMMARY:

This bill modifies the formulary of medicinal drugs that physician assistants may prescribe. The bill requires the Council on Physician Assistants, in consultation with a licensed pharmacist, to establish a negative drug formulary which lists the medicinal drugs that a licensed physician assistant may not prescribe. It also permits a licensed physician assistant to dispense drug samples to patients. Furthermore, it repeals the five-member physician assistant formulary committee.

B. PRESENT SITUATION:

Physician assistants are regulated in Florida by chapters 458 and 459, Florida Statutes. Licensed physician assistants are authorized to prescribe any of the drugs listed on the Physician Assistant Formulary. The current formulary is known as a "positive formulary" meaning that all of the drugs physician assistants may prescribe are specifically approved and listed on the formulary. A physician assistant may not prescribe new drugs until they are approved and placed on the list.

Sections 458.347 and 459.022, F.S., provide for a five-person formulary committee to meet and decide which drugs should be placed on the drug formulary. The committee makes recommendations to the Board of Medicine and the Board of Osteopathic Medicine, which in turn, vote to approve or reject the recommendations. Once approved, the boards adopt the formulary in a rule that is included in the Florida Administrative Code. Physician assistants may then prescribe any of the drugs listed on the formulary.

C. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

This bill modifies the formulary of medicinal drugs that physician assistants may prescribe. The bill requires the Council on Physician Assistants, in consultation with a licensed pharmacist, to establish a "negative drug formulary" which lists the medicinal drugs that a licensed physician assistant may *not* prescribe. It also permits a licensed physician assistant to dispense drug samples to patients. Furthermore, it repeals the five-member physician assistant formulary committee and vests the power to make recommendations for change with the Council on Physician Assistants.

D. SECTION-BY-SECTION ANALYSIS:

<u>Section 1.</u> Amends s. 458.347, F.S., to allow licensed physician assistants to dispense drug samples; abolishes the five-member physician assistant formulary committee; and requires the Council on Physician Assistants, in consultation with a licensed pharmacist, to establish a negative formulary of drugs that a physician assistant may not prescribe.

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<u>Section 2.</u> Amends s. 459.022, F.S., to allow licensed physician assistants to dispense drug samples; abolishes the five-member physician assistant formulary committee; and repeals duplicative language found in both chapters 458 and 459 relating to the physician assistant drug formulary.

Section 3. Provides an effective date of July 1, 2001.

The bill does not require a city or county to expend funds or to take any action requiring the expenditure of funds.

B. REDUCTION OF REVENUE RAISING AUTHORITY:

This bill does not reduce the authority that municipalities or counties have to raise revenues in the aggregate.

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C. REDUCTION OF STATE TAX SHARED WITH COUNTIES AND MUNICIPALITIES:

This bill does not reduce the percentage of state tax shared with counties or municipalities.

B. RULE-MAKING AUTHORITY:

Rules are currently adopted by the Board of Medicine and Board of Osteopathic Medicine based upon the formulary recommendations of the five-member formulary committee. This bill transfers the recommendation authority of the committee to the Council on Physician Assistants but retains the rulemaking authority in the boards. The bill will require the boards to modify their existing rules.

C. OTHER COMMENTS:

The bill specifically requires controlled substances, as defined in chapter 893, to be included in the negative formulary of drugs that physician assistants are prohibited from prescribing.
