I. SUMMARY:

Vehicular homicide is currently defined as the killing of a human being or a viable fetus by any injury to the mother caused by the operation of a motor vehicle by another in a reckless manner likely to cause death or great bodily harm. HB 497 redefines the term "viable fetus" as a fetus "after the 20th week of gestation".

Currently, the willful killing of an unborn quick child by any injury to the mother which would be murder if it resulted in the death of the mother is manslaughter. The bill amends this section by punishing the unlawful killing of an unborn quick child by injury to the mother in the same manner as if the mother was killed. For example, if a person kills a fetus by committing an act which would constitute first degree murder if the mother were to die, the killer could be charged with first degree murder for the death of the fetus.

B. PRESENT SITUATION:

Vehicular Homicide

Vehicular homicide is the killing of a human being, or the killing of a viable fetus by any injury to the mother, caused by the operation of a motor vehicle by another in a reckless manner likely to cause the death of, or great bodily harm to, another. s. 782.071, F.S. The degree of culpability required to prove reckless driving is less than culpable negligence, which is the standard for manslaughter, but more than a mere failure to use ordinary care. <u>McCreary v. State</u>, 371 So.2d 1024 (Fla.1979); <u>Michel v. State</u>, 752 So.2d 6, 12 (Fla. 5th DCA 2000)(holding that evidence supported vehicular homicide conviction where defendants had been ordered off the interstate for failing to have the proper equipment on their truck then drove the truck on a dark stretch of highway at night, without any rear warning lights, at a speed of between 22 and 24 m.p.h. and with metals rails hanging out of the back of the truck, which had no bumper) The offense is a second degree felony which is ranked as a Level 7 offense in the Offense Severity Ranking Chart of the Criminal Punishment Code. s. 921.0022(3)(g), F.S. If at the time of the accident, the person knew or should have known that the accident occurred and the person failed to give information or render aid, the offense is a first degree felony which is ranked as a Level 8 offense in the Offense Severity Ranking Chart of the Criminal Punishment Code. s. 921.0022(3)(h), F.S.

The statute also provides that for purposes of this section, a fetus is viable when it becomes capable of meaningful life outside the womb through standard medical measures. s. 782.071(3), F.S. According to the Florida Supreme Court "[u]nder current standards, [viability] generally occurs upon completion of the second trimester." In re T.W., 551 So.2d 1186, 1194 (Fla. 1989).

The statute further provides that a right of action for civil damages shall exist under s. 768.19, F.S., the Wrongful Death Act under all circumstances, for all deaths described in the vehicular homicide statute. s. 782.071(4), F.S.

Killing of Unborn Quick Child

Section 782.09 provides that the "willful killing of an unborn quick child, by any injury to the mother of such child which would be murder if it resulted in the death of such mother, shall be deemed manslaughter" a second degree felony. Manslaughter is defined as the "killing of a human being by the act, procurement, or culpable negligence of another". s. 782.07. F.S. The term "unborn quick

child is not defined in the statute and no court has defined the term for purposes of this statute. A definition of the term "quick" that was used by the Florida Supreme Court in another context is "pregnant with a child the movement of which is felt." <u>Stokes v. Liberty Mut. Ins. Co.</u>, 213 So.2d 695, 697(Fla. 1968); <u>Walsingham v. State</u>, 250 So.2d 857 (Fla. 1971)(Ervin, J. specially concurring)(defining a "quick child" as "when the embryo (has) advanced to that degree of maturity where the child had a separate and independent existence, and the woman has herself felt the child alive and quick within her.") Black's Law Dictionary defines a "quick child" as "one that has developed so that it moves within the mother's womb". The offense is ranked as a Level 7 offense in the Offense Severity Ranking Chart of the Criminal Punishment Code. s. 921.0022(3)(g), F.S.

C. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

Vehicular Homicide

The bill amends the vehicular homicide statute to change the definition of a "viable" fetus to provide that for purposes of that section, a fetus is viable after the 20th week of gestation.

Killing of Unborn Quick Child

The bill amends s. 782.09, F.S. to specify that the <u>unlawful</u> killing of an unborn quick child, by any injury to the mother of such child which would be murder if it resulted in the death of such mother shall not be deemed manslaughter as the current statute provides but shall be deemed murder in the same degree as that which would have been committed against the mother. Thus, for example, a person who unlawfully kills an unborn quick child by any injury to the mother which would be murder in the first degree constituting a capital felony if it resulted in the mother's death, commits murder in the first degree constituting a capital felony.¹

The bill also provides that the death of the mother resulting from the same act or criminal episode which caused the death of the unborn quick child shall not bar prosecution under this section.

D. SECTION-BY-SECTION ANALYSIS:

Section 1: Amends s. 782.071, F.S. relating to vehicular homicide of a viable fetus.

<u>Section 2</u>: Amends s. 782.09, F.S. relating to killing of an unborn child by injury to mother to make such killing the same degree as that which would have been committed against the mother.

Section 3: Reenacts s. 921.0022, and 960.03, F.S.

Section 4: Providing effective date.

¹ Second degree murder is a first degree felony which is punishable by life imprisonment. s. 782.04(2) and (3), F.S. Third degree murder is a second degree felony ranked as a Level 8 offense in the Offense Severity Ranking Chart of the Criminal Punishment Code which is punishable by up to 15 years imprisonment. s. 782.04(4), F.S. Manslaughter is a second degree felony that is ranked as a Level 7 offense in the Offense Severity Ranking Chart of the Criminal Punishment Code and is punishable by up to 15 years imprisonment. ss. 782.07(1), F.S.,
