STATEMENT OF SUBSTANTIAL CHANGES CONTAINED IN COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR Senate Bill 828 The Committee Substitute requires the Department of Health to adopt, by rule the blood-borne-pathogen standard set forth in the federal law, which shall become applicable to all public sector employers. The Department of Health must compile and maintain a list of existing needleless systems and sharps with engineered sharps injury protection that must be available to assist employers, including the Department of Health and the Department of Corrections, in complying with the applicable requirements of the blood-borne pathogen standard. The list may be developed from existing sources of information.
