# I. SUMMARY:

This bill revises the grandfathering requirements for licensure by allowing prior national certification to substitute for the required examination. It eliminates the examination requirement only for those individuals who have previously applied through the grandfather provision and who had an application approved by the Board of Orthotists & Prosthetists as of October 1, 2000. The bill also deletes a provision enacted in 1999, which allowed certain individuals to become licensed if they met part of the national certification requirements at the time of application.

There is minimal fiscal impact to the Department of Health.

This bill allows persons who have not passed the required examination to be licensed.

#### B. PRESENT SITUATION:

Part XIV of Chapter 468, Florida Statutes, governs the practice of orthotics, prosthetics, and pedorthics in Florida. The laws regulating the profession were first adopted by the Legislature in 1997. The Board of Orthotists and Prosthetists reviews applications for licensure and regulates licensees. The law allows the board to administer its own exam or to accept the examination results of an approved national certification examination. The board has approved several national certification examinations. However, the board has declined to approve the Board for Orthotist/Prosthetist Certification (BOC) examination.

When the original licensure law passed, there was a grandfathering provision, s. 468.805, F.S., included for persons who had been practicing in Florida since July 1, 1990. It required persons who met the statutory experience and certification requirements to apply for licensure prior to March 1, 1998, in order to qualify for the grandfathering provision. The time period was extended during the 1999 Legislative session to allow additional persons who would otherwise have met the licensure requirements to apply for licensure prior to July 1, 1999. Grandfather applicants are exempt from the educational requirements for licensure in s. 468.803, F.S.

# C. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

The Department of Health reports that this bill would allow passage of the BOC exam to substitute for the required examination and eliminates the examination requirement for those individuals who had previously applied through the grandfather provision and who had an application approved by the Board as of October 1, 2000. Proponents of this bill report that approximately 40 persons would benefit from the provisions of this bill.

#### D. SECTION-BY-SECTION ANALYSIS:

<u>Section 1.</u> Amends s. 468.805, F.S., to allow certain applicants for licensure to be granted a license without successfully completing the designated national certification exam.

<u>Section 2.</u> Repeals s. 1 of ch. 99-158, L.O.F., which previously extended the grandfather provision to July 1, 1999.

Section 3. Provides an effective date of upon becoming law.

This profession is currently in a deficit.
