Subsections (1), (2), (5), and (7) of 9 section 240.40201, Florida Statutes, are amended, and 10 subsection (11) is added to that section, to read: 11 240.40201 Florida Bright Futures Scholarship 12 Program.--13 (1) The Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program is created to establish a lottery-funded scholarship program to 14 reward any Florida high school graduate who merits recognition 15 of high academic achievement and who enrolls in a degree 16 17 program, certificate program, or applied technology diploma program at an eligible Florida public or private postsecondary 18 19 education institution within 7 $\frac{3}{2}$ years after of graduation from high school. An award may not be provided to a student 20 21 beyond 7 years after high school graduation, regardless of the year in which the student first receives scholarship funding. 22 23 (2) The Bright Futures Scholarship Program consists of 24 three types of awards, the Florida Academic Scholarship, the 25 Florida Medallion Merit Scholarship, and the Florida Vocational Gold Seal Vocational Scholarship. 26 27 (5) The department shall issue awards from the 28 scholarship program annually. Annual awards may be for up to 29 45 semester credit hours or the equivalent. Before the registration period each semester, the department shall 30 31 transmit payment for each award to the president or director 2

of the postsecondary education institution, or his or her
representative, except that the department may withhold
payment if the receiving institution fails to report or to
make refunds to the department as required in this act.

5 (a) Within 30 days after the end of regular 6 registration each semester, the educational institution shall 7 certify to the department the eligibility status of each 8 student who receives an award. After the end of the drop and 9 add period, an institution is not required to reevaluate or 10 revise a student's eligibility status, but must make a refund 11 to the department if a student who receives an award disbursement terminates enrollment for any reason during an 12 13 academic term and a refund is permitted by the institution's refund policy. 14

(b) An institution that receives funds from the program shall certify to the department the amount of funds disbursed to each student and shall remit to the department any undisbursed advances within 60 days after the end of regular registration.

20 (c) Each institution that receives moneys through this program shall prepare an annual report that includes an 21 independent external audit or an audit prepared by the Office 22 of the Auditor General. The report shall include an audit of 23 24 the institution's administration of the program and a complete 25 accounting of the moneys for the program. This report must be submitted to the department annually by March 1. The 26 27 department may conduct its own annual audit of an 28 institution's administration of the program. The department 29 may request a refund of any moneys overpaid to the institution for the program. The department may suspend or revoke an 30 31 institution's eligibility to receive future moneys for the

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program if the department finds that an institution has not 1 2 complied with this section. The institution must remit within 3 60 days any refund requested in accordance with this subsection. 4 5 (7) A student may receive only one type of award from 6 the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program at a time, but 7 may transfer from one type of award to another through the renewal application process, if the student's eligibility 8 9 status changes. However, a student is not eligible to transfer 10 from a Florida Medallion Merit Scholarship or a Florida 11 Vocational Gold Seal Vocational Scholarship to a Florida Academic Scholarship. A student who receives an award from the 12 13 program may also receive a federal family education loan or a federal direct loan, and the value of the award must be 14 considered in the certification or calculation of the 15 student's loan eligibility. 16 17 (11) A student who graduated from high school in 1997 or earlier and who is eligible for the Florida Undergraduate 18 19 Scholar's Program pursuant to s. 240.402, Florida Statutes, 20 1996 Supplement, is eligible for the Florida Academic Scholars award as provided in this chapter. A student who graduated 21 from high school in 1997 or earlier and who is eligible for 22 the Florida Vocational Gold Seal Endorsement Scholarship award 23 24 pursuant to s. 240.40201, Florida Statutes, 1996 Supplement, 25 is eligible for the Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholarship award as provided in this chapter. Award eligibility ends 7 26 27 years after high school graduation. 28 Section 2. Paragraph (b) of subsection (1) and 29 subsection (2) of section 240.40202, Florida Statutes, are 30 amended to read: 31

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1 240.40202 Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program; 2 student eligibility requirements for initial awards .--3 (1) To be eligible for an initial award from any of the three types of scholarships under the Florida Bright 4 5 Futures Scholarship Program, a student must: 6 (b) Earn a standard Florida high school diploma or its 7 equivalent as described in s. 232.246 or s. 229.814 unless: 8 The student is enrolled full time in the early 1. 9 admission program of an eligible postsecondary education 10 institution or completes a home education program according to 11 s. 232.0201; or The student earns a high school diploma from a 12 2. 13 non-Florida school while living with a parent or quardian who is on military or public service assignment away from Florida. 14 The term "public service assignment," as used in this 15 subparagraph, means the occupational assignment outside this 16 17 state of a person who is a permanent resident of this state 18 and who is employed by the United States Government or the 19 State of Florida conditioned upon assignment outside this 20 state. 9 10	Makes several technical or administrative changes to the Bright Futures Scholarship Program. The technical changes have no fiscal impact.
11 12	. The Merit Scholarship is renamed the Medallion Scholarship.
13	. Application deadlines are less restrictive: a student may apply by high school graduation, with exceptions allowed up to December 31.
14 15	. The terms "renewal, reinstatement, restoration, and public service assignment" are defined and used consistently.
16 17	. A student will be eligible for the equivalent of a 4-year scholarship for enrollment in a 5-year program that includes some graduate school.
