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I. SUMMARY:

This bill removes the restriction on the use of registration fees and fines collected from solicitors of contributions. According to chapter 496, Florida Statutes, the use of funds is limited to the cost of administering and enforcing the "Solicitations of Contributions Act." This bill will allow the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services to use the excess funds to pay some of the overall costs to operate the Division of Consumer Services.

This change will allow a recurring fund shift from the General Revenue Fund to the General Inspection Trust Fund of \$457,000 in the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, Consumer Protection Program.

The Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services registers approximately 8,000 organizations annually which desire to solicit contributions in the State. The Department collects \$1.2 million annually in registration fees. According to section 496.405, Florida Statutes, these fees are deposited into the General Inspection Trust Fund and used to pay the costs of administering and enforcing the "Solicitation of Contributions Act." [Chapter 496, Florida Statutes] The annual cost to administer and enforce the Act is \$570,700. This provides excess receipts of approximately \$629,300.

C. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

This bill would allow the excess fees collected to be used to fund some of the overall costs to operate the Division of Consumer Services.
