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20	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
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22	Section 1. This act may be cited as the "Florida
23	Alzheimer's Training Act."
24	Section 2. Effective July 1, 2004, section 400.4785,
25	Florida Statutes, is amended to read:
26	400.4785 Patients with Alzheimer's disease or other
27	related disorders; certain training mandates and
28	disclosures
29	(1)(a) An agency licensed under this part which
30	provides direct service to adults shall require each newly
31	hired employee who provides direct care to patients under

federal home health regulations to dedicate 4 hours to 1 2 training in Alzheimer's disease and dementia-related 3 illnesses. This training shall include, but is not limited to, 4 overview of dementia, demonstrating basic skills in communicating with persons with dementia, managing problem 5 6 behaviors, promoting the client's independence in activities 7 of daily living, and skills in working with families and 8 caregivers. 9 (b) The Department of Elderly Affairs, or its 10 designee, shall approve the required training. The department must consider for approval training offered in a variety of 11 12 formats. The department shall keep a list of current providers 13 who are approved to provide the 4-hour training. The 14 department shall adopt rules to establish standards for the 15 trainers required in this section. 16 (c) Upon completing the training listed in this 17 section, the employee shall be issued a certificate that states that the training mandated under this section has been 18 19 received. The certificate shall be dated and signed by the 20 training provider. The certificate is evidence of completion of this training and the employee is not required to repeat 21 this training if the employee changes employment to a 22 23 different home health agency, assisted living facility, nursing home, adult day care center, adult family-care home, 24 25 or hospice. 26 (2) An agency licensed under this part which claims 27 that it provides special care for persons who have Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders must disclose in its 28 29 advertisements or in a separate document those services that distinguish the care as being especially applicable to, or 30 suitable for, such persons. The agency must give a copy of 31 2

all such advertisements or a copy of the document to each 1 person who requests information about the agency and must 2 maintain a copy of all such advertisements and documents in 3 4 its records. The Agency for Health Care Administration shall 5 examine all such advertisements and documents in the agency's records as part of the license renewal procedure. б 7 Section 3. Effective July 1, 2003, section 400.55715, 8 Florida Statutes, is created to read: 9 400.55715 Care for persons with Alzheimer's disease or related disorders.--10 (1) As a condition of licensure, adult day care 11 12 centers licensed under this part must provide to each of their employees, upon beginning employment, basic written 13 14 information about interacting with persons with Alzheimer's 15 disease or a related disorder. The hospice must give a copy of 9 all such advertisements or a copy of the document to each person who requests information about programs and services 10 for persons with Alzheimer's disease or other related 11 12 disorders offered by the hospice and must maintain a copy of all such advertisements and documents in its records. 13 The 14 agency shall examine all such advertisements and documents in 15 the hospice's records as part of the license renewal 16 procedure. 17 (2) A hospice licensed under this part must provide to each of its employees, upon beginning employment, basic 18 19 written information about interacting with persons with 20 Alzheimer's disease or a related disorder. 21 (3) All employees who are expected to, or whose responsibilities require them to, have direct contact with 22 23 patients with Alzheimer's disease or a related disorder must, in addition to being provided the information required in this 24 25 section, have an initial training of at least 1 hour completed 26 in the first 3 months after beginning employment. This training shall include, but not be limited to, an overview of 27 28 dementias and shall provide basic skills in communicating with 29 persons with dementia. 30 (4) An individual who provides direct care to a person with Alzheimer's disease or a related disorder shall be 31 7

The Department of Elderly Affairs or its 13 designee must approve the initial and continuing training 14 provided pursuant to this act. The department shall keep a 15 list of current providers who are approved to provide initial and continuing training. The department shall adopt rules to 16 17 establish standards for the trainers and the training required in this act. Any trainer approved pursuant to this act shall 18 19 be considered to be an approved trainer for the purposes of 20 meeting the Alzheimer's training requirements for any entity 21 licensed under chapter 400, Florida Statutes. Any training curricula approved pursuant to this act shall be considered to 22 23 meet the Alzheimer's training requirements for any entity licensed under chapter 400, Florida Statutes, except that the 24 approved training curricula shall be considered to meet only a 25 26 part of the Alzheimer's training requirements for assisted living facilities licensed under part III of chapter 400, 27 Florida Statutes. A trainer shall submit to the department or 28 29 its designee the additional curricula necessary to meet the Alzheimer's training requirements set forth in s. 400.4178, 30 Florida Statutes, for employees of assisted living facilities. 31 9

The department shall apply the training completed by employees who meet the Alzheimer's training requirements for any entity licensed pursuant to part II, part IV, part V, part VI, or part VII of chapter 400, Florida Statutes, toward the completion of the additional Alzheimer's training required in s. 400.4178, Florida Statutes. Section 8. The Legislature finds that Alzheimer's disease and related disorders pose an urgent health need in this state. Therefore, each state university, college, or postsecondary school that prepares undergraduate or graduate students for health professions as described in chapter 456, Florida Statutes, is encouraged to include in its curriculum basic training about Alzheimer's disease and related disorders. Section 9. Except as otherwise provided herein, this act shall take effect July 1, 2002. CODING: Words stricken are deletions; words underlined are additions.
