This act may be cited as the "Florida Alzheimer's Training Act." 21 22 Section 2. Effective July 1, 2004, section 400.4786, 23 Florida Statutes, is created to read: 24 400.4786 Care for persons with Alzheimer's disease or 25 related disorders.--(1) As a condition of licensure, home health agencies 26 27 licensed under this part must provide to each of their 28 employees, upon beginning employment, basic written 29 information about interacting with persons with Alzheimer's 30 disease or a related disorder. 31

400.6045 Patients with Alzheimer's disease or other 14 related disorders; certain disclosures; training.--15

(1) A hospice licensed under this part which claims 16 17 that it provides special care for persons who have Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders must disclose in its 18 19 advertisements or in a separate document those services that 20 distinguish the care as being especially applicable to, or 21 suitable for, such persons. The hospice must give a copy of all such advertisements or a copy of the document to each 22 person who requests information about programs and services 23 24 for persons with Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders offered by the hospice and must maintain a copy of 25 all such advertisements and documents in its records. 26 The 27 agency shall examine all such advertisements and documents in 28 the hospice's records as part of the license renewal 29 procedure. 30 (2) A hospice licensed under this part must provide to

31 each of its employees, upon beginning employment, basic

An employee hired on or after July 1, 2002, 23 24 need not comply with the guidelines created in this act before July 1, 2003, or July 1, 2004, as provided. 25 Section 7. The Department of Elderly Affairs may 26 27 contract with or enter into a cooperative agreement with a state university or statewide advocacy organization that 28 29 possesses expertise in the area of Alzheimer's disease and 30 related disorders to review potential trainers and training 31 materials. The department may accept grants, donations, and

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1	gifts to meet the costs associated with providing the review
2	and approval and the required training.
3	Section 8. The Legislature finds that Alzheimer's
4	disease and related disorders pose an urgent health need in
5	this state. Therefore, each state university, college, or
6	postsecondary school that prepares undergraduate or graduate
7	students for health professions as described in chapter 456,
8	Florida Statutes, is encouraged to include in its curriculum
9	basic training about Alzheimer's disease and related
10	disorders.
11	Section 9. This act shall take effect July 1, 2002.
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14	SENATE SUMMARY
15	Requires employees of home health agencies, adult day
16	care centers, adult family-care homes, and hospices that provide care for residents with Alzheimer's disease or related disorders to complete dementia-specific training.
17	Provides for certificates of such training. Prescribes duties of the Department of Elderly Affairs in approving
18	training providers.
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
