Section 39.320, Florida Statutes, is 20 created to read: 21 39.320 Commission on Florida Families.--2.2 (1) LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS AND INTENT. --23 (a) The Legislature finds that single mothers deserve 24 respect and support in grappling with circumstances far harder 25 than the majority of individuals can possibly imagine, but it should not be forgotten that fathers have a unique and 26 irreplaceable role in the lives of children, that children 27 28 need their fathers, and that when fathers are absent, children

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suffer.

success, and are less likely to need public assistance or be involved in crimes or drugs and that the circumstance most favorable to sustaining two-parent families is the institution of marriage.

- (c) The Legislature finds that academic research has shown that at the time of the birth of a child to low-income, unmarried parents, the majority of the parents were romantically involved and committed to raising their child and the majority of those parents believed that marriage is beneficial to children.
- (d) The Legislature finds that, while the majority of low-income, unmarried parents value marriage and want to marry, few actually do marry because of complex family situations and barriers, such as lack of education and employment and the existence of additional children from other relationships.
- (e) The Legislature also finds that while some relationships between mothers and fathers are broken and beyond repair, others can be nurtured and salvaged with the provision of appropriate supports to fathers as well as mothers. These supports may include opportunities to obtain or increase educational levels and employment skills and easy affordable access to relationship skills education. For some unwed parents, it will be possible and desirable to help them move towards marriage; for others who are in new relationships, the optimum goal may be to help them co-parent, spend time with their child, and pay child support regularly.
- (f) The Legislature finds that assisting states to end dependence of low-income parents by promoting job preparation, work, and marriage and assisting states to encourage the formation and maintenance of two-parent families are the two

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of four stated purposes of federal welfare reform enacted in 1996 that have been largely neglected by states and that states are now urging Congress to designate 10 percent of all welfare funds for relationship education and skills development, responsible fatherhood programs, and community support as it seeks to reauthorize the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Act in 2002.

- (g) The Legislature further finds that state public policy should not force people to get married, should not withdraw benefits to single mothers merely because they are not married, and should not keep people in abusive relationships. Rather, it should be the policy of this state to define marriage as the ideal, particularly in situations where there are children; to help those individuals who choose marriage obtain access to what they need to sustain a healthy marriage; and to be compassionate towards other family situations.
- (h) It is therefore the intent of the Legislature to build on the accomplishments of the Commission on Responsible Fatherhood, which is now recognized as the national model of a comprehensive statewide strategy to address fatherhood issues; to provide the direction necessary to increase public awareness of the problems of failing marriages, not only for individuals but also for communities and the larger society; and to continue to develop sound public policy related to fathers, parenting, marriage, and the effects of poverty on children and their families through the work of the Commission on Florida Families. The Legislature further intends that, to the extent practicable, the laws of this state should encourage, promote, and value strong, safe, long-term 31 marriages.

- within the Department of Children and Family Services the Commission on Florida Families. The commission shall consist of 18 members, with 6 each appointed by the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives. At least 50 percent of the commission members must be representatives from the private sector. The commission members shall include representatives of business, workforce development, education, state government, local government, mental health, child development, and community and faith-based organizations.
- (3) PURPOSES AND RESPONSIBILITIES.--The purposes of the commission are to develop comprehensive statewide strategies to facilitate the connection or reconnection of responsible fathers with their families and children, to increase the availability of and access to parenting and relationship skills education and training, and to encourage and support the formation and maintenance of two-parent families. In order to carry out these purposes, and subject to the availability of funds, the commission is directed to:
- (a) Develop a plan for statewide implementation of s.

 232.246(1)(i), relating to marriage and relationship

 skill-based education, through programs modeled after the

 PEERS, PAIRS, Connections, or Loving Well programs.
- (b) Develop a statewide plan for delivering services and supports to couples to help them learn communication and conflict resolution skills prior to marriage, enable couples to refresh those skills periodically during marriage and, if the marriage fails, provide divorce education and mediation techniques that teach parents how to work through their

problems and how to minimize the impact of the divorce on their children.

- Revenue, recommendations to achieve balance between the traditional mission of child support enforcement agencies as welfare cost-recovery programs and a new expanded mission of helping families become self-supporting, while at the same time improving agency performance, meeting federal performance measures, and providing low-income fathers with the opportunity to demonstrate their capacity to provide financial support to their children.
- (d) Serve as a clearinghouse for collecting and disseminating information related to research findings on poverty and its effect on families, and innovative approaches to the delivery of services necessary for the formation and maintenance of two-parent families.
- (e) Make recommendations to the Legislature annually with respect to policy development in these areas.
- (4) COORDINATION.--The commission shall coordinate its work with community-based organizations, including those that are faith-based, with schools, courts, adult and juvenile criminal justice systems, and agencies providing social welfare, welfare transition, and child support services, and with any appropriate research and policy development centers, including, but not limited to, those within universities that focus on issues related to fatherhood, low-income families, marriages, and children, poverty, parenting, and relationship skills.
- (5) ADVISORY COMMITTEES.--The commission may appoint advisory committees that the commission considers appropriate, which may include members from outside the commission, to

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study special problems or issues and advise the commission on those subjects. Any existing advisory board, commission, or 2 3 council may seek to become an official advisory committee to 4 the commission by submitting to the commission a resolution 5 requesting affiliation and having the request approved by the 6 commission. The commission shall establish the operating 7 procedures of the committees. 8 (6) FUNDING. -- The operation of the Commission on 9 Florida Families shall be funded from general revenue funds 10 currently allocated to the Commission on Responsible 11 Fatherhood. The Commission on Florida Families may seek and 12 accept grants, funds, or gifts from any source, public or 13 private, federal, state, or local, to supplement its operation 14 and defray the expenses incurred in the operation and 15 implementation of this section. 16 Section 2.
