#### I. Summary:

Senate Bill 2054 names the children's medical services building of the Department of Health, which is under construction in Tallahassee, the "Elaine Gordon Children's Medical Services Building", and directs the Department of Health to erect suitable markers designating the building as such.

The bill creates an undesignated section of law.

#### II. Present Situation:

Section 267.062, F.S., provides that no state building, road, bridge, park, recreational complex, or other similar facility may be named for a living person, except as specifically provided by law.

Elaine Gordon was born in New York, and moved to Florida in 1964. During the Constitutional Revision Session in 1968, she was a legislative assistant to State Representative George Firestone, who later became Secretary of State. In 1972, she was elected to the House of Representatives. Representative Gordon was the first woman to chair a standing committee, the first female Speaker Pro Tempore and the first woman inducted into the Florida Women's Hall of Fame. She was the first recipient of the Florida United Way Humanitarian Award. She chaired numerous committees during her tenure. As she accumulated legislative experience and seniority, she became Dean of the House in 1992 as the House's longest-sitting member.

Elaine Gordon died on February 25, 2000, of non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, at the age of 68.

### III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

The bill names the children's medical services building of the Department of Health, which is under construction in Tallahassee, the "Elaine Gordon Children's Medical Services Building", and directs the Department of Health to erect suitable markers designating the building as such.

The bill provides an effective date of upon becoming a law.
