28	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

30	Section 1. This act may be cited as the "Citizen's
31	Government Efficiency Act of 2002."

Section 2. State agency efficiency.--

- (1) All state agency heads shall charge each of their employees with the responsibility of determining ways to make the agency run more efficiently.
- (2) No later than 45 days prior to the start of each regular session of the Legislature, all state agency heads shall propose statutory or rule changes that would result in savings to their agency's administrative budget. In addition to recommendations from staff, state agency heads shall take into account savings suggestions from citizens and from outside organizations such as Florida TaxWatch, the Florida Council of 100, and the Davis Productivity Awards Foundation.
- (3) Each state agency website shall contain a place where citizens can make efficiency recommendations. Further, each state agency website shall highlight any efficiency that was enacted by either statutory or rule change.
- (4) The Legislature shall annually appropriate 10 percent of the savings to a state agency from efficiency recommendations back to that agency for salary enhancements.

 State agencies are encouraged to provide salary bonuses to employees who develop efficiency recommendations.

Section 3. State contracts.--

(1) All state agency heads are encouraged and authorized to enter into an annual contract review with public-private providers who have entered into multiyear contracts to provide services for the state and to enter into contract renegotiation if it is determined that savings to the state can be obtained. State agency heads are authorized to provide bonuses to public-private providers who provide their services for less than the contract amount, subject to the

public-private partners receiving satisfactory performance reviews from those receiving the services.

(2) Final contract modifications pursuant to subsection (1) shall be subject to the notice, review, and approval process specified in section 216.177, Florida Statutes.

Section 4. Subsection (1) of section 216.134, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

216.134 Consensus estimating conferences; general provisions.--

(1) Each consensus estimating conference shall develop such official information within its area of responsibility as the conference determines, by consensus, is needed for purposes of the state planning and budgeting system. Unless otherwise provided by law or decided by unanimous agreement of the principals of the conference, all official information developed by the conference shall be based on the assumption that current law and current administrative practices will remain in effect throughout the period for which the official information is to be used. The official information developed by each consensus estimating conference shall include forecasts for a period of at least 10 years, unless the principals of the conference unanimously agree otherwise.

Section 5. Paragraph (a) of subsection (6) of section 216.136, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

216.136 Consensus estimating conferences; duties and principals.--

- (6) SOCIAL SERVICES ESTIMATING CONFERENCE. --
- (a) Duties.--
- The Social Services Estimating Conference shall 31 develop such official information relating to the social

services system of the state, including forecasts of social services caseloads, utilization, and expenditures, as the conference determines is needed for the state planning and budgeting system. Such official information shall include, but not be limited to, cash assistance, services to the developmentally disabled, and Medicaid caseloads.

2. The Social Services Estimating Conference shall develop information relating to the Florida Kidcare program, including, but not limited to, outreach impacts, enrollment, caseload, utilization, and expenditure information that the conference determines is needed to plan for and project future budgets and the drawdown of federal matching funds. The agencies required to collect and analyze Florida Kidcare program data under s. 409.8134 shall be participants in the Social Services Estimating Conference for purposes of developing information relating to the Florida Kidcare program.

Section 6. This act shall take effect July 1, 2002.

LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY

Creates the "Citizen's Government Efficiency Act of 2002." Requires state agencies to propose administrative efficiencies to the Legislature prior to the start of each regular session of the Legislature. Requires state agencies to provide citizens a place on their agency websites for suggesting efficiencies. Provides that savings from efficiency recommendations shall be reappropriated to state agencies for salary bonuses. Authorizes state agency heads to review and renegotiate contract provisions under certain circumstances and to provide bonuses pursuant thereto. Requires notice, review, and approval of final contract modifications as specified in s. 216.177, F.S. Requires official information developed by each consensus estimating conference to include forecasts for a period of at least 10 years. Requires the Social Services Estimating conference to develop official information relating to services to the developmentally disabled. (See bill for details.)
