1 A bill to be entitled 2 An act relating to chronic diseases; creating 3 s. 385.210, F.S.; creating the "Arthritis 4 Prevention and Education Act"; providing 5 legislative findings; providing purposes; 6 directing the Department of Health to establish 7 an arthritis prevention and education program; 8 requiring the department to conduct a needs 9 assessment; providing for establishment of an advisory panel on arthritis; providing for 10 implementation of a public awareness effort; 11 12 providing for funding through contributions; directing the Secretary of Health to seek 13 14 federal waivers as necessary to maximize 15 federal funding; establishing a Prostate Cancer Awareness Program within the Department of 16 17 Health; specifying purpose, activities, administration, and funding sources for the 18 19 program; creating a prostate cancer advisory committee; providing for appointment of 20 21 members; providing for reimbursement of 22 expenses; providing an effective date. 23 24 WHEREAS, prostate cancer is the most common type of 25 cancer and the second leading cause of death from cancer among 26 men in the United States and in Florida, and WHEREAS, an estimated 198,100 men in the United States 27 28 will have been diagnosed with prostate cancer in 2001, 15,000 29 of them residents of Florida, and

WHEREAS, an estimated 31,500 men in the United States will have died from prostate cancer in 2001, 2,400 of them residents of Florida, and

WHEREAS, Florida has both the second highest number of new cases of prostate cancer and the second highest number of deaths from prostate cancer in the United States, and

WHEREAS, the risk of being diagnosed with prostate cancer is higher among elderly men, and Florida has a high percentage of elderly men compared to other states, and

WHEREAS, African-American men have a 50-percent higher risk of being diagnosed with prostate cancer and are more than twice as likely to die from the disease than Caucasian men, but are less likely to be screened for the disease, and

WHEREAS, 74 percent of all prostate cancer among African-American men is detected at local and regional sites; however, the 5-year survival rate drops to 30 percent when prostate cancer has spread to distant sites, and

WHEREAS, the risk of being diagnosed with prostate cancer is 50 percent higher among men with a family history of prostate cancer, and

WHEREAS, the 5-year survival rate for men who have prostate cancer diagnosed at an early stage is 95 percent compared to 34 percent when diagnosis occurs at a late stage, and 68 percent of non-Caucasian men with prostate cancer in Florida are diagnosed at an early stage compared to 75 percent of Caucasian men, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 385.210, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

1 385.210 Arthritis prevention and education.--2 (1) SHORT TITLE. -- This act may be cited as the "Arthritis Prevention and Education Act." 3 4 (2) LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS.--The Legislature finds the 5 following: 6 (a) Arthritis encompasses more than 100 diseases and 7 conditions that affect joints, the surrounding tissues, and other connective tissues. 8 9 (b) Arthritis is the leading cause of disability in the United States, limiting daily activities for more than 7 10 million citizens. 11 12 (c) This disease has a significant impact on quality of life, not only for the individual who experiences its 13 14 painful symptoms and resulting disability, but also for family 15 members and caregivers. There are enormous economic and social costs 16 (d) 17 associated with treating arthritis and its complications, which are estimated at almost \$80 billion annually in the 18 19 United States. 20 (e) Currently, the challenge exists to ensure delivery of effective, but often underutilized, interventions that are 21 necessary in the prevention or reduction of arthritis-related 22 pain and disability. 23 (f) Although there exists a large quantity of public 24 information about arthritis, including programs that can 25 dramatically impact early diagnosis and treatment as well as 26 the quality of life of people with arthritis, such information 27 remains inadequately disseminated and insufficient in 28 29 addressing the needs of specific diverse populations and other

underserved groups.

(g) The Arthritis Foundation, Florida Chapter, the
Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and the
Association of State and Territorial Health Officials have led
the development of a public health strategy, the National
Arthritis Action Plan, to respond to this challenge.

(h) Educating the public and the health care community
throughout the state about this devastating disease is of
paramount importance and is in every respect in the public

- (3) PURPOSES.--The purposes of this section are to:
- (a) Create and foster a statewide program that promotes public awareness and increases knowledge about the causes of arthritis, the importance of early diagnosis and appropriate management, effective prevention strategies, and pain prevention and management.

interest and to the benefit of all residents of the state.

- (b) Develop knowledge and enhance understanding of arthritis by disseminating educational materials and information on research results, services provided, and strategies for prevention and education to patients, health professionals, and the public.
- (c) Establish a solid scientific base of knowledge on the prevention of arthritis and related disabilities through surveillance, epidemiology, and prevention research.
- (d) Utilize educational and training resources and services developed by organizations with appropriate expertise and knowledge of arthritis and to use available technical assistance.
- (e) Evaluate the need for improving the quality and accessibility of existing community-based arthritis services.
- (f) Heighten awareness among state and local health and human services officials, health professionals and

providers, and policymakers about the prevention, detection, and treatment of arthritis.

- (g) Implement and coordinate state and local programs and services to reduce the public health burden of arthritis.
- (h) Provide lasting improvements in the delivery of health care for individuals with arthritis and their families, thus improving their quality of life while also containing health care costs.
 - (4) ARTHRITIS PREVENTION AND EDUCATION PROGRAM. --
- (a) Program establishment.--To the extent that funds are specifically made available for this purpose, the

 Department of Health shall establish, promote, and maintain an arthritis prevention and education program to raise public awareness, educate consumers, and educate and train health professionals, teachers, and human services providers, and for other purposes as provided in this section.
- (b) Needs assessment.--The department shall conduct a needs assessment to identify:
- 1. Epidemiological and other research on arthritis being conducted within the state.
- 2. Available technical assistance and educational materials and programs on arthritis nationwide and within the state.
- $\underline{\mbox{3. The level of public and professional awareness of}}$ arthritis.
- 4. The needs of people with arthritis, their families, and caregivers.
- 5. The educational and support service needs of health care providers, including physicians, nurses, managed care organizations, and other health care providers, relating to arthritis.

- 6. The services available to persons with arthritis.
- 7. The existence of arthritis treatment, self-management, physical activity, and other education programs.
- $\underline{8.}$ The existence of rehabilitation services for people with arthritis.
- (c) Advisory panel on arthritis.--The department shall establish and coordinate an advisory panel on arthritis to provide nongovernmental input regarding the arthritis prevention and education program. Membership shall include, but is not limited to, persons with arthritis, public health educators, medical experts on arthritis, providers of arthritis health care, persons knowledgeable in health promotion and education, and representatives of national arthritis organizations and their local chapters.
- is not limited to, strategies consistent with the National Arthritis Action Plan and existing state planning efforts to raise public awareness and knowledge on the causes and nature of arthritis, personal risk factors, the value of prevention and early detection, ways to minimize preventable pain, and options for diagnosing and treating the disease.
 - (5) FUNDING.--

- (a) Contributions.--The Secretary of Health may accept grants, services, and property from the Federal Government, foundations, organizations, medical schools, and other entities as may be available for the purposes of fulfilling the obligations of this program.
- (b) Federal waivers.--The secretary shall seek any federal waiver or waivers that may be necessary to maximize funds from the Federal Government to implement this program.

Section 2. Prostate Cancer Awareness Program. --

- $\underline{\mbox{(1)}}$ This section may be cited as the "Prostate Cancer Awareness Act of 2002."
- (2) To the extent that funds are specifically made available for this purpose, the Prostate Cancer Awareness Program is established within the Department of Health. The purpose of this program is to implement the January 2000 recommendations of the Florida Prostate Cancer Task Force to provide statewide outreach and health education activities to ensure that men are aware of and appropriately seek medical counseling for prostate cancer as an early detection health care measure.
- (3) The program shall utilize known effective strategies that may include, but are not limited to, radio and television advertisements, newspaper articles and feature stories, community education outreach programs, peer education strategies, brochures, posters, videos, and computer-based resources.
- (4) For purposes of implementing the program, the Department of Health may:
- (a) Conduct activities directly or enter into a contract with a qualified nonprofit community education entity.
- (b) Seek any available gifts, grants, or funds from the state, the Federal Government, philanthropic foundations, and industry or business groups.
- (5) A prostate cancer advisory committee is created to advise and assist the Department of Health in implementing the program.
- (a) The Secretary of Health shall appoint the advisory committee members, who shall consist of:

1	1. Three persons from prostate cancer survivor groups
2	or cancer-related advocacy groups.
3	2. Three persons who are scientists or clinicians from
4	public universities or research organizations.
5	3. Three persons who are practicing cancer medical
6	specialists from health organizations with a commitment to
7	cancer research and control.
8	4. One person who has health education and social
9	marketing experience.
10	(b) Members shall serve without compensation, but may,
11	pursuant to s. 112.061, Florida Statutes, receive
12	reimbursement for per diem and travel expenses incurred in the
13	performance of their official duties.
14	Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2002.
