I. <u>SUMMARY</u>:

THIS DOCUMENT IS NOT INTENDED TO BE USED FOR THE PURPOSE OF CONSTRUING STATUTES, OR TO BE CONSTRUED AS AFFECTING, DEFINING, LIMITING, CONTROLLING, SPECIFYING, CLARIFYING, OR MODIFYING ANY LEGISLATION OR STATUTE.

This bill provides that a pharmacist may take the required continuing education courses at any time within the 2 year licensure renewal biennium. Current law requires pharmacists to complete 15 hours per year. This change would require pharmacists to complete 30 hours every two years. This change would make continuing education for pharmacists consistent with the other health care professions.

The bill has no fiscal impact.

Section 465.009, F.S., currently requires pharmacists to complete 15 hours of continuing education every year. The courses are approved by the Florida Board of Pharmacy. The Department of Health may not renew a pharmacist license until the pharmacist provides satisfactory proof of the completion of these 15 hours annually.

C. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

The bill requires 30 hours of continuing education to be completed every two years (biennially), instead of 15 hours of continuing education to be completed every year (annually).
