House Resolution

A resolution recognizing June 2002 as Prostate Cancer Awareness Month in Florida.

WHEREAS, prostate cancer is the most common cancer diagnosed among men in Florida, and the American Cancer Society estimates that 15,000 new cases of prostate cancer will have been diagnosed among Florida males in 2001 once reports for that year are completed, and

WHEREAS, the American Cancer Society anticipates that by the end of the year 2001 there will have been 2,400 deaths in Florida attributed to prostate cancer, and

WHEREAS, African-American men have a 47-percent higher incidence of prostate cancer than white men, and African-American men are twice as likely to die of prostate cancer than are white men, and

WHEREAS, the American Cancer Society recommends that annual prostate screening begin at age 50, except that men at high risk of cancer, such as African-American males and males with a family history of the disease, are recommended to begin annual screening at age 45, and

WHEREAS, the American Cancer Society supports the annual African-American Men's Health Summit as an effort to increase prostate cancer awareness and prostate screening among African-American men in Florida, and

WHEREAS, the Man-to-Man Program of the American Cancer Society is an attempt to increase prostate cancer awareness, education, and support, particularly during the month of June but throughout the rest of the year as well, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Florida:

That the House of Representatives recognizes the month of June 2002 as Prostate Cancer Awareness Month in Florida and urges all men to gain a better understanding of the risks associated with prostate cancer, to take preventive steps to minimize those risks, and to consult their doctors about annual prostate cancer screening in compliance with the American Cancer Society prostate cancer screening guidelines.
