An act relating to student financial assistance; amending s. 1009.57, F.S.; requiring the Florida Teacher Scholarship and Forgivable Loan Program to provide scholarship assistance to education paraprofessionals and substitute teachers seeking certification to teach in critical teacher shortage areas; establishing a scholarship loan program to provide scholarship loans to students who teach in poor or underperforming areas in the state; providing eligibility requirements; providing for loan forgiveness; amending s. 1009.58, F.S.; expanding the critical teacher shortage tuition reimbursement program; authorizing tuition reimbursement for courses needed for recertification; authorizing certain tuition-free courses on a space-available basis; amending s. 1009.59, F.S.; specifying that the Critical Teacher Shortage Student Loan Forgiveness Program applies to personnel seeking employment in certain high priority location areas; increasing the amount of loan principal repayments; amending s. 1003.52, F.S.; conforming language; providing an appropriation; providing an effective date.

HB 1213 2003 There is created the Florida Teacher Scholarship and 30 (1)Forgivable Loan Program to be administered by the Department of 31 Education. The program shall provide scholarship assistance to 32 eligible students for lower-division undergraduate study and 33 loan assistance to eligible students for upper-division 34 35 undergraduate and graduate study. The program shall also provide scholarship assistance for lower-division or upper-division 36 undergraduate study to education paraprofessionals and 37 substitute teachers to attain certification to teach in a 38 subject area or a high priority location area pursuant to s. 39 40 1009.59. The primary purpose of the program is to attract capable and promising students to the teaching profession, 41 42 attract teachers to areas of projected or current critical teacher shortage, attract liberal arts and science graduates to 43 teaching, and provide opportunity for persons making midcareer 44 decisions to enter the teaching profession. The State Board of 45 Education shall adopt rules necessary to administer the program 46 and shall annually identify critical teacher shortage areas. 47 (4) Within the Florida Teacher Scholarship and Forgivable 48 Loan Program is established a scholarship loan program to 49 50 provide 4-year scholarship loans of up to \$5,000 per year to Florida high school seniors interested in preparing to teach in 51 the public schools of the state. The scholarship loan program 52 shall be administered by the Department of Education. 53 (a) To be eligible for a scholarship loan, a student must: 54 1. Have maintained a minimum cumulative grade point 55 average of 3.5 on a 4.0 scale or the equivalent in high school 56 and have scored at least 1100 on the SAT or 27 on the ACT. 57 Have declared the intent to teach for at least 3 years 58 2. in a public school in a poor or underperforming area identified 59

63	3. Meet the general requirements for student eligibility

66	(b) A scholarship loan may be used for attendance at a
67	state university, a community college, or an independent
68	institution as defined in s. 1009.89. The scholarship loan shall
69	be used for tuition and fees and may be used to purchase books
70	and housing.
71	(c) A scholarship loan may be renewed annually if the
72	student meets the eligibility criteria established by the
73	department.
74	(d) All scholarship loans shall be evidenced by notes made
75	payable to the Department of Education that shall bear interest
76	at the rate of 8 percent annually beginning after termination of
77	the scholarship loan. The scholarship loan may be terminated by
78	the recipient withdrawing from school or by the recipient not
79	meeting the standards set by the department.
80	(e) The Department of Education shall forgive the loan if,
81	within 7 years after graduation, the recipient teaches for 3

83	underperforming area. The department shall also forgive the loan

99 (2) The State Board of Education shall adopt rules to implement the critical teacher shortage tuition assistance and 100 101 reimbursement program. Any full-time public school employee or developmental research school employee certified to teach in 102 this state is eligible for the program. requirements, or selected teacher preparation graduates from any

(b) Up to \$7,500 \$5,000 a year for up to 2 years on behalf
of selected graduates of state-approved graduate postsecondary
teacher preparation programs, persons with graduate degrees
certified to teach pursuant to any applicable teacher
certification requirements, or selected teacher preparation
graduates from any state participating in the Interstate
Agreement on the Qualification of Educational Personnel.

All repayments shall be contingent on continued proof 164 (C) of employment in the designated subject areas or high priority 165 location areas in this state and shall be made directly to the 166 holder of the loan. The state shall not bear responsibility for 167 the collection of any interest charges or other remaining 168 balance. In the event that designated critical teacher shortage 169 subject areas or high priority location areas are changed by the 170 State Board of Education, a teacher shall continue to be 171 eligible for loan forgiveness as long as he or she continues to 172 teach in the subject area or high priority location area for 173 which the original loan repayment was made and otherwise meets 174 all conditions of eligibility. 175

The district school board shall recruit and train (10)180 teachers who are interested, qualified, or experienced in 181 educating students in juvenile justice programs. Students in 182 juvenile justice programs shall be provided a wide range of 183 educational programs and opportunities including textbooks, 184 technology, instructional support, and other resources available 185 to students in public schools. Teachers assigned to educational 186 programs in juvenile justice settings in which the district 187 188 school board operates the educational program shall be selected by the district school board in consultation with the director 189 190 of the juvenile justice facility. Educational programs in juvenile justice facilities shall have access to the substitute 191 teacher pool utilized by the district school board. Full-time 192 teachers working in juvenile justice schools, whether employed 193 by a district school board or a provider, shall be eligible for 194 the critical teacher shortage tuition assistance and 195 reimbursement program as defined by s. 1009.58. 196

197Section 5. There is hereby appropriated from the General198Revenue Fund to the Department of Education the sum of \$12199million to be divided evenly among the Florida Teacher200Scholarship and Forgivable Loan Program, the critical teacher201shortage tuition assistance and reimbursement program, and the202Critical Teacher Shortage Student Loan Forgiveness Program for203the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this act.

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Section 6. This act shall take effect July 1, 2003.

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
