A bill to be entitled

An act relating to criminal liability for failure to report a crime; creating s. 877.31, F.S.; creating the "Nicholas Isaac Cordero Act"; requiring a person who knows that a crime is being committed to report the crime to a law enforcement officer, under specified circumstances, if the crime exposes the victim to serious bodily injury likely to cause death; providing penalties; providing exceptions; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 877.31, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

877.31 Legal duty to report a crime exposing the victim to
serious bodily injury likely to cause death; penalties for
failure to report; exceptions.--

- (1) This section may be referred to by the popular name the "Nicholas Isaac Cordero Act."
- (2) A person who knows that a crime is being committed which exposes the victim to serious bodily injury likely to cause death must report the crime to a law enforcement officer within 48 hours after the offense is committed to the extent that the report can be made without danger to the person reporting or to another person. Any person who violates this subsection commits a misdemeanor of the second degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082 or s. 775.083.
 - (3) This section does not apply to a person who is:
- (a) Prosecuted as a principal in the first degree or as an accessory after the fact to an offense;

(b) Prosecuted for attempting, soliciting, or conspiring to commit an offense, when the prosecuted offense occurred in the course of the same criminal conduct, transaction, or episode as the criminal offense that exposed the victim to serious bodily injury;

- (c) Related by blood or marriage to the principal or victim of an episode that exposes the victim to serious bodily injury; or
 - (d) A victim of serious bodily injury.
 - Section 2. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law.
