A bill to be entitled

An act relating to toxic mold; establishing a task force to investigate toxic mold in structures in the state and potential health hazards related thereto; requiring a report to the Legislature; providing for implementation; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Task force to investigate toxic mold.--

- (1) The citizens of Florida are concerned about the following matters:
- (a) The presence of toxic mold contamination in homes, schools, and office buildings may be causing possible health hazards.
- (b) An outbreak of litigation has ensued in the western part of the United States by homeowners against their building contractors and insurance companies to recover for damage done to their health and homes by mold contamination, resulting in the award of millions of dollars.
- (c) Centers for disease control and prevention have performed numerous studies on the possible health effects of toxic mold and have found possible linkages of exposure to mold contamination and health problems such as coughing, wheezing, runny nose, irritated eyes and throat, and skin rashes.
- (d) Health professionals have investigated possible relationships between mold contamination and outbreaks of allergies and asthma attacks, the negative effects of mold contamination on the function of vital organs, and the possible increase of susceptibility to colds and flu.

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is imperative that the extent of health risks related to toxic mold contamination be determined and a corresponding plan of action be taken to eliminate such hazards from structures in Florida and that identifying and studying this indoor toxin is the first step towards eliminating it from homes, schools, and other buildings in the state. The Legislature further finds that it is in the best interests of the health, welfare, and safety of the citizens of the state to establish a comprehensive study of toxic mold.

- (3) A task force is established to investigate toxic mold in homes, schools, and buildings and the potential health hazards caused by toxic mold. The task force shall be comprised of individuals appointed by the Department of Health, including health officers, health and medical experts, mold abatement experts, affected consumers, and representatives of affected industries, including residential, commercial, and industrial tenants, proprietors, landlords, insurers, and builders.
- (4) The task force shall advise the Department of Health on the development of exposure limits to mold, standards for assessment of molds in indoor environments, and standards for identification and remediation of mold.
- (5) The task force shall present its findings to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives by January 1, 2004.
- (6) This section shall be implemented to the extent that funds are specifically appropriated for carrying out the purposes of this section.
 - Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2003.
