A bill to be entitled

An act relating to the distribution of general reports and newsletters; amending s. 283.30, F.S.; providing definitions; creating s. 283.551, F.S.; prohibiting government agencies from mailing unsolicited general reports and newsletters; permitting such agencies to post general reports and newsletters on the agency's Internet website; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

- Section 1. Subsections (4) through (6) of section 283.30, Florida Statutes, are renumbered as subsections (6) through (8), respectively, and new subsections (4) and (5) are added to said section to read:
- 283.30 Definitions.--As used in this part, unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the term:
- (4) "General report" means a document containing information about a broad range of issues relating to an agency that is intended to convey general information regarding that agency and its status over a period of time or as of a certain date.
- (5) "Newsletter" means a brief document issued at regular intervals of less than a year containing news about an agency.

  Section 2. Section 283.551, Florida Statutes, is created to read:
  - 283.551 Distribution of general reports and newsletters.--
- (1) Except as otherwise provided in chapter 119 or as otherwise authorized by law, an agency is not authorized to mail general reports and newsletters except in response to requests

pursuant to chapter 119 or to addresses in publication mailing
lists pursuant to s. 283.55. A general report or newsletter may
be mailed to persons requesting the general report or newsletter
or requesting receipt of all agency general reports or
newsletters. However, regulatory newsletters provided to
affected persons or reports or newsletters relating to the
prevention or treatment of disease or injury may be mailed
without a request.
(2) An agency may post any general report or newsletter on
the agency's Internet website.

Section 3. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law.
