A bill to be entitled  
An act relating to the Medal of Heroism;  
providing that designated persons are eligible  
to receive the Medal of Heroism; providing for  
application to the Governor; providing an  
effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. (1) The Governor may award a Medal of Heroism of appropriate design, with ribbons and appurtenances, to a law enforcement, correctional, or correctional probation officer, as defined in section 943.10(14), Florida Statutes; a firefighter, as defined in section 112.191(1)(b), Florida Statutes; an emergency medical technician, as defined in section 401.23(11), Florida Statutes; or a paramedic, as defined in section 401.23(17), Florida Statutes. A recipient must have distinguished himself or herself conspicuously by gallantry and intrepidity; must have risked his or her life deliberately above and beyond the call of duty while performing duty in his or her respective position; and must have engaged in hazardous or perilous activities to preserve lives with the knowledge that such activities might result in great personal harm.

(2) A candidate or person seeking to nominate a candidate for the award must make written application to the Governor. The Governor may refer an application to any public or private entity for advice and recommendations regarding the application.

Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2003.

Senate Bill 1992

Corrects technical deficiencies and provides that the Governor may seek advice regarding medal candidates from all public entities, rather than only the Florida Department of Law Enforcement and the Department of Community Affairs.
