A bill to be entitled An act relating to the Reduce Class Size Scholarship Opportunity Program; creating s. 1002.395, F.S.; establishing the program to enable students to receive a scholarship to attend a private school and to provide future dollars to school districts to achieve reduced class sizes; providing for the award of a scholarship if the assigned public school and classroom is overcrowded; providing requirements for scholarship eligibility and for private school eligibility; specifying obligations of school districts and program participants; providing school district choice with respect to transportation of students; providing for calculation and payment of scholarships; providing requirements for funds received by school districts; providing that regulation of private schools is not expanded; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 1002.395, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

1002.395 Reduce Class Size Scholarship Opportunity Program.--

(1) REDUCE CLASS SIZE SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITY PROGRAM.—

There is established the Reduce Class Size Scholarship

Opportunity Program (RCSSOP) to fulfill the class size reduction

mandate specified in s. 1, Art. IX of the State Constitution

while providing an educational environment to improve student

performance without overburdening Florida's financial security.

The RCSSOP expands the state's school choice program to eligible

- (2) SCHOLARSHIP ELIGIBILITY. -- The parent of a public school student whose assigned school and classroom is overcrowded, according to the definition of an overcrowded school and classroom established by the school district, is eligible to participate in the RCSSOP. The school district's definition must adhere to the requirement of reducing the number of classroom students on a yearly basis in order to meet the mandated student-to-teacher ratio timeline established in s. 1, Art. IX of the State Constitution. A student may receive a Reduce Class Size Scholarship Opportunity Program Scholarship (RCSSOP Scholarship) if the following conditions are met:
- (a) The student is offered a scholarship based on a prioritized list of eligible students that begins with the student who would benefit most from a smaller class size learning environment. Such list shall be compiled by the assigned in-school administrator and the classroom teacher of the locally defined overcrowded classroom.
- (b) The assigned in-school administrator has given notice to the appropriate school district representative who has reviewed and confirmed that the student is eligible for an RCSSOP Scholarship and has notified the parents of the eligible student.
- (c) The parent has obtained acceptance for admission of the student to a private school that is eligible for the program and has notified the school district of the request for a RCSSOP

Scholarship at least 60 days prior to the date of the first scholarship payment. Notification must be through a communication directly to the school district or through the Department of Education in a manner that creates a written or electronic record of the notification and the date of the notification of the request for a scholarship.

- For purposes of continuity of educational choice, a RCSSOP

 Scholarship may remain in effect until a student graduates from high school.
- (3) PRIVATE SCHOOL ELIGIBILITY. -- To be eligible to participate in the RCSSOP, a private school must be located in Florida, may be sectarian or nonsectarian, and must:
- (a) Offer an education program to students in any grade K12.
- (b) Demonstrate fiscal soundness by being in operation for 1 school year or by providing the Department of Education with a statement by a certified public accountant confirming that the school is insured and has sufficient capital or credit to operate for the upcoming year. In lieu of such a statement, the school may secure a surety bond or letter of credit equal to the scholarship funds for any quarter, to be filed with the Department of Education.
- (c) Notify the Department of Education and the school district of its intent to participate in the program. The notice must specify the grade levels and services that the private school has available for the students being accepted.
 - (d) Meet state and local health and safety laws and codes.

- (e) Comply with any antidiscrimination provisions of 42 U.S.C. s. 200d that prohibit discrimination based on race, color, religion, or national origin.
- (f) Be academically accountable to the parent for meeting the educational needs of the student.
- (g) Employ or contract with teachers who meet one or more of the following criteria:
 - 1. Hold a baccalaureate or higher degree.
- 2. Have at least 5 years of teaching experience in public and/or private schools.
- 3. Have special skills, knowledge, or expertise in subjects taught.
 - (h) Comply with statutes relating to private schools.
- (i) Adhere to the tenets of its published disciplinary procedures prior to the expulsion of any RCSSOP student.
- (j) Be subject to the instruction, curriculum, and attendance criteria adopted by an appropriate nonpublic school accrediting body.
- (k) Agree not to compel any RCSSOP student attending the private school to profess a specific ideological belief or to pray or to worship.
- (1) Furnish a school profile that includes student performance.
- (m) Accept as full tuition and fees the amount of the RCSSOP Scholarship. Any amount received above full tuition and fees must be returned to the school district.

Participation in the RCSSOP is open to any private school that wishes to participate if it meets the eligibility criteria.

HB 0213 2003 118 However, no private school is required to participate in the 119 RCSSOP. 120 (4) OBLIGATION OF SCHOOL DISTRICTS. -- A school district 121 must: Publicly define an overcrowded school and classroom, 122 including calculations that meet class size requirements 123 specified in s. 1, Art. IX of the State Constitution. 124 125 Make every possible effort to reduce school and classroom overcrowding in order to meet the constitutional class 126 size student-to-teacher ratio mandate, including, but not 127 limited to: realigning the school district to provide the 128 availability of student work stations; providing scheduling 129 130 alternatives; and revising duty and personnel assignments. 131 (c) Give timely notification to the parents of students 132 eligible for an RCSSOP Scholarship. (b) A student must comply fully with the private school's code of conduct.

- (c) A parent must comply fully with the private school's parental involvement requirements, unless excused for illness or good cause.
- (d) A parent must ensure that the student takes all required state assessments.
- student transportation may vary from school district to school district depending on the option chosen by the school district.

 If a school district chooses to include state categorical funds for student transportation in the calculation formula for RCSSOP Scholarship recipients, each recipient shall be responsible for providing transportation. If a school district chooses not to include state categorical funds for student transportation in the calculation formula for RCSSOP Scholarship recipients, the school district shall be responsible for providing transportation. A school district must notify the public of its decision with respect to transportation responsibility.
 - (7) SCHOLARSHIP FUNDING AND PAYMENT. --
- (a) The actual amount of a RCSSOP Scholarship may vary from school district to school district. A RCSSOP Scholarship shall be a calculated amount equivalent to one-half of the annual per-student allocation from the Florida Education Finance Program to a school district plus any allowable federal funds associated with the student. If a school district chooses to retain student transportation responsibility, state categorical funds for student transportation shall not be included in this calculation.

(b) Upon proper documentation by the Department of Education, the Chief Financial Officer shall make RCSSOP Scholarship payments in four equal installments no later than September 1, November 1, February 1, and April 1. Payments must be made by individual warrant payable to the student's parent and mailed by the Department of Education to the chosen private school. The parent must restrictively endorse the warrant to the private school. The Department of Education is responsible for verifying the student's initial admission acceptance and continued enrollment and attendance at the private school and the eligibility of expenditures.

- districts through implementation of the RCSSOP shall be placed in individual trust funds and held by the school districts until 2008, at which time they may be fully released for the sole purpose of enabling school districts to fulfill the constitutional mandate for class size reduction. Nothing in this section limits a school district's ability to take advantage of investment or bonding opportunities as prescribed by law. All uses of these funds and transactions connected therewith shall be publicly noticed on a yearly basis.
- (9) REGULATION. -- The inclusion of eligible private schools within the options available to public school students does not expand the regulatory authority of the state, its officers, or any school district to impose any additional regulation of private schools beyond that necessary to enforce requirements expressly set forth in this section.
 - Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2003.
