Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: Section 1. Paragraphs (a) and (f) of subsection (4) of section 1002.39, Florida Statutes, are amended to read: 1002.39 The John M. McKay Scholarships for Students with Disabilities Program. -- There is established a program that is separate and distinct from the Opportunity Scholarship Program and is named the John M. McKay Scholarships for Students with Disabilities Program, pursuant to this section. (4) PRIVATE SCHOOL ELIGIBILITY. -- To be eligible to participate in the John M. McKay Scholarships for Students

with Disabilities Program, a private school must be a Florida

private school, may be sectarian or nonsectarian, and must:

- (a) 1. Demonstrate fiscal soundness by being in operation for 1 school year or provide the Department of Education with a statement by a certified public accountant confirming that the private school desiring to participate is insured and the owner or owners have sufficient capital or credit to operate the school for the upcoming year serving the number of students anticipated with expected revenues from tuition and other sources that may be reasonably expected. In lieu of such a statement, a surety bond or letter of credit for the amount equal to the scholarship funds for any quarter may be filed with the department.
- 2.a. Demonstrate, based on an affidavit verified by an attorney, previous experience for a period of not less than 1 year as a private school engaged in providing education and services to students with disabilities as defined in subsection (1) by each grade level; and
- b. Provide the legal business name for each business engaged in by the private school during the previous 2 years, the mailing address, and business locations, and the full names, addresses, and telephone numbers of its owners or corporate officers and directors and the Florida agent of the corporation; and
- c. Provide information as to whether the private school, or any of its directors, officers, owners, or general partners:
- (I) Has been convicted of a crime involving fraud or dishonest dealing; or
- (II) Has not satisfied any fine or penalty arising out of any administrative or civil enforcement action brought by any governmental agency or private person based upon conduct involving fraud or dishonest dealing.

Beginning in the 2003-2004 school year, employ or contract with teachers who are certified for the grade level, each subject area, the exceptional student education program, and each exceptionality in which the teachers provide instruction to a recipient of a John M. McKay Scholarship for Students with Disabilities. hold baccalaureate or higher degrees, or have at least 3 years of teaching experience in public or private schools, or have special skills, knowledge, or expertise that qualifies them to provide instruction in subjects taught. Section 2. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law. SENATE SUMMARY Beginning in the 2003-2004 school year requires private schools seeking eligibility to participate in the John M.
