311-239-03 A bill to be entitled 1 2 An act relating to public records; amending s. 3 440.108, F.S., which provides an exemption from 4 public-records requirements for investigatory 5 records of the Department of Insurance 6 concerning an employer's compliance with the 7 Workers' Compensation Law; clarifying that a record containing personal identifying 8 9 information of a confidential source remains confidential after an investigation is 10 complete; providing for disclosure of certain 11 12 confidential information to a law enforcement agency or administrative agency; requiring that 13 the receiving agency maintain the 14 confidentiality of the information; reenacting 15 the exemption and removing the repeal thereof 16 17 scheduled under the Open Government Sunset Review Act of 1995; providing an effective 18 19 date. 20 21 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: 22 23 Section 1. Notwithstanding the repeal scheduled for October 2, 2003, under the Open Government Sunset Review Act 24 of 1995, section 440.108, Florida Statutes, is reenacted and 25 amended to read: 26 27 440.108 Investigatory records relating to workers' 28 compensation employer compliance; confidentiality.--29 (1) All investigatory records of the department made 30 or received pursuant to s. 440.107 and any records necessary 31 to complete an investigation are confidential and exempt from 1

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1 the provisions of s. 119.07(1) and s. 24(a), Art. I of the 2 State Constitution until the investigation is completed or 3 ceases to be active. For purposes of this section, an investigation is considered "active" while such investigation 4 5 is being conducted by the department with a reasonable, good б faith belief that it may lead to the filing of administrative, civil, or criminal proceedings. An investigation does not 7 8 cease to be active if the agency is proceeding with reasonable 9 dispatch and there is a good faith belief that action may be 10 initiated by the agency or other administrative or law 11 enforcement agency. (2) After an investigation is completed or ceases to 12 13 be active, information in records relating to the 14 investigation remains remain confidential and exempt from the provisions of s. 119.07(1) and s. 24(a), Art. I of the State 15 Constitution if disclosure of that information would: 16 17 (a) Jeopardize the integrity of another active 18 investigation; 19 (b) Reveal a trade secret, as defined in s. 688.002; 20 (c) Reveal business or personal financial information; Reveal personal identifying information regarding 21 (d) the identity of a confidential source; 22 (e) Defame or cause unwarranted damage to the good 23 24 name or reputation of an individual or jeopardize the safety 25 of an individual; or (f) Reveal investigative techniques or procedures. 26 27 The department may provide information that is (3) 28 confidential and exempt under this section to any law 29 enforcement agency or administrative agency for use in the 30 performance of its official duties. An agency that receives 31 confidential information from the department shall maintain

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the confidential and exempt status of that information as long as it would otherwise remain confidential. (2) This exemption is subject to the Open Government Sunset Review Act of 1995 in accordance with s. 119.15, and shall stand repealed on October 2, 2003, unless reviewed and saved from repeal through reenactment by the Legislature. Section 2. This act shall take effect October 1, 2003. SENATE SUMMARY Reenacts an exemption from the public-records law which is provided for investigatory records of the Department of Insurance concerning an employer's compliance with requirements of the Workers' Compensation Law. Authorizes the department to disclose confidential information to a law enforcement agency or administrative agency and requires that the receiving agency maintain the confidentiality of the information. Removes the repeal of the exemption scheduled for October 2, 2003, under the Open Government Sunset Review Act of 1995. 

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
