Section 1. Paragraph (gg) is added to subsection (3) of section 119.07, Florida Statutes, to read:

image, recorded image, or other visual image of any part of the body of a victim of a sexual offense prohibited under chapter 794, chapter 800, or chapter 827 is confidential and exempt from subsection (1) and s. 24(a), Art. I of the State Constitution, regardless of whether the photograph, videotape, digital image, electronic image, recorded image, or other visual image constitutes criminal intelligence information, criminal investigative information, or any other record or evidence in the custody or possession of a law enforcement agency, state attorney, emergency medical service agency, or medical facility. This paragraph is subject to the Open Government Sunset Review Act of 1995, in accordance with s. 119.15, and shall stand

The Legislature finds that it is a public Section 2. necessity that photographs, videotapes, digital images, electronic images, recorded images, and other visual images of any part of the body of a victim of a sexual offense prohibited under chapter 794, chapter 800, or chapter 827 be made confidential and exempt from the requirements of section 119.07(1), Florida Statutes, and Section 24(a) of Article I of the State Constitution. The Legislature finds that such photographs or images often depict the victim in a graphic and disturbing fashion, and that such photographs or images, if viewed, copied, or publicized, could result in trauma, humiliation, or emotional injury to the victim and the family of the victim. Accordingly, the Legislature finds that the harm to the public which would result from the release of such
