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WHEREAS, the Economic Recovery Act of 2003 has proposed an economic growth and tax relief plan designed to strengthen the American economy, provide immediate and critical middle-class tax relief, provide financial aid to states and deliver critical help to unemployed citizens, and,

WHEREAS, the Economic Recovery Act of 2003 will provide every American adult with an immediate \$300 tax cut and allow every American family to tax an additional \$300 for up to two children, providing a \$1200 tax cut for families of four, and,

WHEREAS, the Florida Chamber of Commerce reported that the number of small businesses offering health insurance has dropped from 91% in 1999 to 76% today, forcing many Floridians to go without health insurance, and,

WHEREAS, the Economic Recovery Act of 2003 provides much needed assistance to small businesses by allowing small businesses to take a 50% tax credit to offset their health insurance costs, and,

WHEREAS, in many rural communities, the lack of access to broadband technology is hampering efforts to recruit high-wage, high-tech jobs, and,

WHEREAS, the Economic Recovery Act of 2003 provides a 20 percent tax credit for businesses investing in broadband internet infrastructure in rural and underserved areas, and,

WHEREAS, the additional costs of homeland security are draining local government budgets and without additional assistance from the federal government, many communities will be required to raise taxes on their citizens, and,

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WHEREAS, the Economic Recovery Act of 2003 provides \$5 billion to states to help communities fund key homeland security priorities, including funding for emergency planning, transit security, fire communications systems, smallpox vaccine programs and 25,000 new police, firefighters, EMT's and other first responders, and,

WHEREAS, an additional \$6 billion will be provided to fund the programs enacted in the No Child Left Behind Act, ensuring that every classroom has a qualified teacher and providing critical funding for after-school and summer school programs, and,

WHEREAS, an additional \$29 billion will be provided to help states with their budget priorities, including additional funding for Medicaid shortfalls and highway infrastructure, and,

WHEREAS, the State of Florida is facing an estimated budget deficit of between \$2 and \$4 billion, and stands to receive funding, if proportioned by population, of approximately \$2 billion, from the Economic Recovery Act of 2003, and
