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I. Summary:

This legislation re-creates the Save Our Everglades Trust Fund without modification, effective November 4, 2004. The Save Our Everglades Trust Fund, FLAIR#37-2-221, is administered by the Department of Environmental Protection. This fund was created effective July 1, 2000, by Chapter 2000-132, Laws of Florida.

II. Present Situation:

Section 373.472, F.S., creates the trust fund and provides for its purpose. Section 373.470, F.S., provides for its revenue. The fund is established to implement the Comprehensive Everglades Restoration Plan and to serve as the repository for state, local, and federal project contributions. The major source of revenue for this fund has historically been transfers from the Florida Forever Trust Fund and the Florida Preservation 2000 Trust Fund. Statutory provisions were provided during the 2002 Session authorizing bond proceeds to be deposited into the fund. According to LAS/PBS data, receipts to this fund for FY 2001-2002 were \$107.1 million.

This bill re-creates the trust fund without modification.
