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A bill to be entitled

An act relating to student discipline and school safety; amending s. 1006.07, F.S.; revising guidelines governing district school board duties relating to emergency management and emergency preparedness; providing requirements for the number and type of emergency drills that each school must conduct; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Subsection (4) of section 1006.07, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

1006.07 District school board duties relating to student discipline and school safety.--The district school board shall provide for the proper accounting for all students, for the attendance and control of students at school, and for proper attention to health, safety, and other matters relating to the welfare of students, including:

(4) EMERGENCY DRILLS; EMERGENCY PROCEDURES.--

emergency preparation and drill activities drills and for response to and management of emergencies, including incidents or events resulting from violence, technological malfunction or human error, and natural disaster actual emergencies, including, but not limited to, fires, natural disasters, and bomb threats, for all the public schools of the district which comprise grades

Formulate and prescribe policies and procedures for

K-12. District school board policies must shall include commonly

used alarm system responses for specific types of emergencies

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and verification by each school that drills have been provided

as required by law and fire protection codes. Each school shall

conduct and document at least 10 emergency drills per school

year, at least five of which must be emergency egress drills, at

least one of which must be an accidental or intentional

hazardous material release drill, and at least two of which must

be tornado drills. The focus of the two remaining emergency

drills shall be at the discretion of each school.

- (b) The district school board shall establish model emergency management and emergency preparedness procedures for the following life-threatening emergencies:
- 1. <u>Manmade emergencies</u>, including fires, bomb threats, and weapon-use and hostage situations.
- 2. <u>Technological emergencies</u>, including radiological, hazardous materials, or toxic chemical <u>releases</u> spills.
- 3. Weather emergencies, including hurricanes, tornadoes, and severe storms.
  - 4. Exposure as a result of a manmade emergency.

    Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2004.
