HB 1115 2004 A bill to be entitled

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An act relating to providing nutrition to children; providing a popular name; requiring the Food and Nutrition Management Office of the Department of Education to develop a plan for providing, in each school district, summer food programs that serve children who qualify for free or reduced-price lunches during the school year; providing requirements of the department and of the superintendent of schools; requiring the school districts to report to the department annually; providing an effective date.

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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- Section 1. Children's Summer Nutrition Act.--
- 16 This section shall be known by the popular name the 17 "Children's Summer Nutrition Act."
  - (2) The Food and Nutrition Management Office of the Department of Education shall develop a plan to ensure that, by the summer of 2005, at least one summer food program shall operate in each school district for at least 40 days during the summer months within 5 miles of an elementary school at which 50 percent or more of the students are eligible for free or reduced-price school meals. The department shall designate a person on its administrative staff who shall coordinate activities to implement this subsection.
  - (3) The plan shall also require all school districts to ensure that, by the summer of 2006, there is a summer food site within 10 miles of each elementary school at which 50 percent or

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more of the students are eligible for free or reduced-price school meals.

- (4) The department shall use the October school indicator report on eligibility for free or reduced-price school meals to determine which elementary schools in each school district meet the criteria set forth in subsections (2) and (3). The department shall provide such information to each superintendent of schools by November 30 of each year.
- (5) The superintendent of schools in each school district, in collaboration with local county government and private, nonprofit leaders, shall implement the plan to ensure access to the Summer Food Service Program. Although schools have proven to be the optimal sites for a summer food program, any nonprofit organization may serve as a site or sponsor. By May 15 of each year, each school district shall report to the department the district's summer food sites in compliance with this act.
- (6) The department shall provide to each school district by February 15 of each year a list of local organizations that have filed letters of intent to participate, so that the school districts can determine adequate coverage of need and placement of sites.
- Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2004.
