HB 1509 2004 30 programs and believes a new direction for managing growth must be in place as Florida assumes its position as the nation's 31 32 third largest state within the next 15 years, and 33 WHEREAS, the Legislature finds a need to convene an 34 informed body to comprehensively review alternatives to better 35 manage our projected growth while effectively addressing the 36 impacts of excising development not currently being addressed, 37 NOW, THEREFORE, 38 39 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: 40 The 2005 Smart Growth Study Commission .--41 Section 1. 42 (1) The 2005 Smart Growth Study Commission is hereby 43 created. The commission shall be composed of 15 voting members, 44 5 of whom are appointed by the Governor, 5 of whom are appointed 45 by the President of the Senate, and 5 of whom are appointed by 46 the Speaker of the House of Representatives. The Governor shall 47 select a chair from his appointees; however, the chair will only vote in case of a tie vote. The Secretary of Transportation, the 48 49 Secretary of Community Affairs, the Secretary of Environmental 50 Protection, and the Commissioner of Agriculture, or their 51 designees, shall serve as ex officio nonvoting members of the 52 commission. 89	financial incentives, to promote and encourage the
90	redevelopment, improvement, and, where appropriate, infill of
91	existing developed areas.
92	(c) Determining the most appropriate agency, combination
93	of agencies, or creation of a new agency for effectively
94	implementing a partnership and appropriate oversight role with
95	local and regional governments.
96	(d) Enhancing the ability of citizens to more easily and
97	at less cost participate at all levels of growth management.
98	(e) Providing development interests with necessary
99	certainty regarding where, when, and how development will be
100	encouraged and promoted.
101	(f) Providing coordination, incentive, and funding
102	programs that jointly share the responsibility with local and
103	regional governments for relieving the crowded conditions in
104	schools and congestion on our highways and the protection of
105	natural resources.
106	(g) Maintenance of existing private property rights in a
107	growing economy so that all sectors of our economy share in the
108	quality of life we all seek.
109	(4) At least eight public hearings conducted every 60
110	days, shall be held by the commission at different locations
111	throughout the state in order to solicit input from the public
112	and interest groups, with particular attention being paid to
113	suggestions for how local, state, and regional agencies and
114	governments can better coordinate growth management programs.
115	(5) By December 1, 2005, the commission shall provide to
116	the President of the Senate, Speaker of the House of

118	recommendations for all issues specified in subsection (3). The
119	Department of Community Affairs shall prepare legislative
120	recommendations consistent with the commission report for
121	consideration by the 2006 Legislature.
122	(6) The commission may appoint technical advisory
123	committees. Such committee members are entitled to be reimbursed
124	by the Department of Community Affairs for travel and per diem
125	expenses as provided in s. 112.061, Florida Statutes.
126	(7) The commission may appoint an executive director who
127	shall report to the commission and serve at its pleasure. The
128	executive director shall receive staff assistance from the
129	Department of Community Affairs and the department may provide
130	consultants upon request of the commission when the cost of such
131	consultants can be paid from the appropriation provided for in
132	this act.
133	(8) Commission members shall receive per diem and travel
134	expenses as provided in s. 112.061, Florida Statutes, while
135	acting on behalf of the commission.
136	Section 2. The sum of \$300,000 is appropriated from the
137	General Revenue Fund to the Department of Community Affairs to
138	be used for the purpose of implementing this act.
139	Section 3. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law.

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
