| 22 | (1) This section may be cited as the "Innovation |
| 23 | Florida Scholarships for Developing High-Tech Jobs Act." |
| 24 | (2) The Innovation Florida Scholarships for Developing |
| 25 | High-Tech Jobs Program is created to provide need-based |
| 26 | financial assistance to any graduate of a high school in this |
| 27 | state who merits recognition of high academic achievement and |
| 28 | who enrolls in a certified degree program at an eligible |
| 29 | postsecondary educational institution within 3 years after |
| 30 | graduation from high school. |

- Innovation Florida Scholarships for Developing High-Tech Jobs

 Program according to rules and procedures established by the

 State Board of Education. The department must advertise the

 availability of the scholarship program and must notify

 students, teachers, parents, guidance counselors, and

 principals or other relevant school administrators of the

 criteria and application procedures. The department must begin

 this process of notification no later than January 1 of each

 year.
- (5) Funds for the Innovation Florida Scholarships for Developing High-Tech Jobs Program shall be appropriated annually in the General Appropriations Act.
- (a) If funds appropriated are not adequate to provide the maximum allowable award to each eligible applicant, awards must be prorated to each eligible applicant using the same percentage reduction.
- (b) Notwithstanding s. 216.301, if all funds allocated to the Innovative Florida Scholarships for Developing

 High-Tech Jobs Program are not used in any fiscal year, up to 20 percent of the total allocation may be carried forward and used for awards in the following year.
- scholarship program annually. Annual awards may be for up to 45 semester credit hours or the equivalent for the amount of demonstrated unmet need for the cost of education, not to exceed an amount equal to the average cost of tuition, fees, and assigned books and supplies for the prior academic year at state universities or such other amount as specified in the General Appropriations Act. A demonstrated unmet need of less than \$100 shall render the applicant ineligible for a

scholarship. Before the registration period each semester, the
department shall transmit payment for each award to the
president or director of the postsecondary educational
institution, or his or her representative, except that the
department may withhold payment if the receiving institution
fails to report or to make refunds to the department as
required in this section.

- (a) Within 30 days after the end of regular registration each semester, the educational institution shall certify to the department the eligibility status of each student who receives an award. After the end of the drop and add period, an institution is not required to reevaluate or revise a student's eligibility status, but must make a refund to the department if a student who receives an award disbursement terminates enrollment for any reason during an academic term and a refund is permitted by the institution's refund policy.
- (b) An institution that receives funds from the program shall certify to the department the amount of funds disbursed to each student and shall remit to the department any undisbursed advances within 60 days after the end of regular registration.
- (c) Each institution that receives moneys through this program shall prepare an annual report that includes an annual financial audit conducted by an independent certified public accountant or the Auditor General. The report must include an audit of the institution's administration of the program and a complete accounting of the moneys for the program. This report must be submitted to the department annually by March 31. The department may conduct its own annual audit of an institution's administration of the program. The department

 may request a refund of any moneys overpaid to the institution for the program. The department may suspend or revoke an institution's eligibility to receive future moneys for the program if the department finds that an institution has not complied with this section. The institution must remit within 60 days any refund requested in accordance with this subsection.

- (7)(a) A student enrolled in 6 to 8 semester credit hours may receive up to one-half of the maximum award; a student enrolled in 9 to 11 credit hours may receive up to three-fourths of the maximum award; and a student enrolled in 12 or more credit hours may receive up to the full award.
- (b) If a recipient transfers from one eligible institution to another and continues to meet eligibility requirements, the award must be transferred with the student.
- (c) A student may use an award for summer term enrollment if funds are available.
- (d) Funds from a scholarship may not be used to pay for remedial or college-preparatory coursework.
- (8) To be eligible for an initial award, a student
 must:
- (a) Be a resident of this state as defined in s. 1009.40 and rules of the State Board of Education.
- (b) Earn a standard Florida high school diploma or its equivalent as described in s. 1003.43 or s. 1003.45 unless:
- 1. The student is enrolled full-time in the early admission program of an eligible postsecondary educational institution or completes a home education program according to s. 1002.41; or

- 2. The student earns a high school diploma from an out-of-state school while living with a parent who is on military or public service assignment away from Florida.
- (c) Have achieved a cumulative grade point average of at least 3.0 on a 4.0 scale or its equivalent in high school courses designated by the Department of Education, unless the student has attended a home education program according to s. 1002.41 during grades 11 and 12, in which case the student must have attained at least the score identified by rules of the Department of Education on the combined verbal and quantitative parts of the Scholastic Aptitude Test, the Scholastic Assessment Test, or the recentered Scholastic Assessment Test of the College Entrance Examination, or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program.
- (d) Be accepted by and enroll in a Florida public or independent postsecondary educational institution identified by the Department of Education.
- (e) Be enrolled for at least 6 semester credit hours or the equivalent in quarter hours or clock hours.
- (f) Have not been convicted of a felony offense, unless the student's civil rights have been restored by the Governor and Cabinet sitting as the Board of Executive Clemency. This paragraph does not apply to an offense for which adjudication of guilt is withheld.
- (g) Apply for a Pell Grant, the entitlement to which shall be considered when conducting an assessment of the financial resources available to each student.
- (h) Apply for a scholarship from the program by the time of high school graduation.
- 30 (9) A student is eligible to accept an initial award
 31 for 3 years following high school graduation and to accept a

renewal award for 7 years following high school graduation. A student who applies for an award by the time of high school graduation and who meets all other eligibility requirements, but who does not accept his or her award, may reapply during subsequent application periods for 3 years after high school graduation. For a student who enlists in the United States

Armed Forces immediately after completion of high school, the 3-year eligibility period for his or her initial award shall begin upon the date of separation from active duty. For a student who is receiving an Innovation Florida Scholarship and discontinues his or her education to enlist in the United States Armed Forces, the remainder of his or her 7-year renewal period shall commence upon the date of separation from active duty.

(10) Eligibility for renewal awards shall be based on continued academic achievement of a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.75 on a 4.0 scale or its equivalent by the student at the eligible institution, continued eligibility for financial assistance pursuant to this section, and participation of the student for at least one summer during the course of the student's postsecondary education in an internship program that is relevant to at least one of the areas of targeted employment as defined in this section. A student must work a minimum of 160 hours during the summer internship and the internship must be completed before the start of the student's senior year.

(11) A postsecondary educational institution with a certified degree program may provide a grant to an employer that hires a student in the certified degree program to work in an area of targeted employment as part of a summer internship program approved by the institution for wages paid

to the student, not to exceed \$500 per student per summer. An 1 2 employer that receives a grant under this subsection must pay 3 each student in the internship program wages at a rate that is 4 at least 120 percent of the federal minimum wage. 5 (12) The State Board of Education shall adopt rules 6 under ss. 120.536(1) and 120.54 to administer this section. 7 Section 2. There is appropriated from the General Revenue Fund to the Department of Education for fiscal year 8 9 2004-2005 the sum of \$30 million to implement the provisions 10 of this act. Section 3.
