A bill to be entitled 2 An act relating to public postsecondary 3 education and state universities; amending s. 4 1004.225, F.S.; deleting obsolete provisions; providing for terms of members appointed to the 5 6 Emerging Technology Commission; providing for 7 filling any vacancy that occurs during the term 8 of a member of the commission; delaying the 9 expiration of the Florida Technology Development Act; requiring Florida Research 10 Consortium, Inc., to report to the Emerging 11 Technology Commission within a specified 12 13 timeframe with respect to criteria for 14 reviewing proposals for a center of excellence; requiring the commission to notify state 15 universities and the State Technology Office of 16 approved criteria for submitting a proposal for 17 18 a center of excellence by a specified date; requiring the Emerging Technology Commission to 19 submit, by a specified date, a recommended plan 20 to the State Board of Education for 21 22 establishing or expanding one or more centers 23 of excellence; providing a timeframe for the 24 State Board of Education to approve a final plan and report to the Governor and the 25 Legislature; creating s. 1004.451, F.S.; 26 creating the Florida State University Center 27 28 for the Performing Arts Direct Support 29 Organization; providing an appropriation; amending s. 1004.55, F.S.; relocating regional 30 autism centers for certain counties; creating 31

s. 1004.63, F.S.; creating the Florida-Scripps 2 Research Compact; providing an appropriation; 3 providing an effective date.

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Section 1004.225, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

1004.225 Florida Technology Development Act.--

- (1) This section may be cited as the "Florida Technology Development Act."
- (2) The term "center of excellence," as used in this section, means an organization of personnel, facilities, and equipment established at or in collaboration with one or more universities in Florida to accomplish the purposes and objectives of this section. The purposes and objectives of a center of excellence include:
- (a) Identifying and pursuing opportunities for university scholars, research center scientists and engineers, and private businesses to form collaborative partnerships to foster and promote the research required to develop commercially promising, advanced, and innovative technologies and to transfer those technologies to commercial sectors.
- (b) Acquiring and leveraging public and private sector funding to provide the totality of funds, personnel, facilities, equipment, and other resources needed to support the research required to develop commercially promising, advanced, and innovative technologies and to transfer those technologies to commercial sectors.
- (c) Recruiting and retaining world class scholars, 31 | high-performing students, and leading scientists and engineers

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in technology disciplines to engage in research in this state to develop commercially promising, advanced, and innovative technologies.

- (d) Enhancing and expanding technology curricula and laboratory resources at universities and research centers in this state.
- (e) Increasing the number of high-performing students in technology disciplines who graduate from universities in this state and pursue careers in this state.
- (f) Stimulating and supporting the inception, growth, and diversification of technology-based businesses and ventures in Florida and increasing employment opportunities for the workforce needed to support such businesses.
- (3) Subject to legislative appropriation, The Emerging Technology Commission, or "commission," is created within the Executive Office of the Governor to guide the establishment of centers of excellence.
- (a) The commission shall consist of five regular members appointed by the Governor, one of whom the Governor shall appoint as chair of the commission; two regular members appointed by the President of the Senate; two regular members appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives; before January 7, 2003, the Secretary of Education as an ex officio nonvoting member; effective January 7, 2003, the Commissioner of Education as an ex officio nonvoting member; and, as ex officio nonvoting members, the member of the Senate and the member of the House of Representatives who serve as members of the Florida Research Consortium, Inc. The regular members shall be business leaders, industrial researchers, academic researchers, scientists, or engineers who have been 31 recognized as leaders in the state's emerging and advanced

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technology sectors. A regular member of the commission may not serve for more than 4 years. Any vacancy that occurs during the term of a regular member of the commission shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment. Regular members must be appointed on or before July 1, 2002.

- (b) Members of the commission shall serve without compensation but shall be entitled to receive per diem and travel expenses in accordance with s. 112.061 while in performance of their duties.
- (c) The Executive Office of the Governor shall provide staff support for the activities of the commission and per diem and travel expenses for commission members.
- (4) By August 1, 2002, Florida Research Consortium, Inc., shall provide a report to the commission which describes in detail and prioritizes factors that contribute to the success of the creation of centers of excellence. At a minimum, the report should describe and prioritize the following factors:
- (a) Maturity of existing university programs relating to a proposed center of excellence.
- (b) Existing amount of university resources dedicated to activities relating to a proposed center of excellence.
- (c) Comprehensiveness and effectiveness of site plans relating to a proposed center of excellence.
 - (d) Regional economic structure and climate.
- (e) The degree to which a university proposed to house a center of excellence identifies and seizes opportunities to collaborate with other public or private entities for research purposes.
- (f) The presence of a comprehensive performance and 31 accountability measurement system.

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- The use of an integrated research and development strategy utilizing multiple levels of the educational system.
- (h) The ability of a university proposed to house a center of excellence to raise research funds and leverage public and private investment dollars to support advanced and emerging technological research and development projects.
- (i) The degree to which a university proposed to house a center of excellence transfers advanced and emerging technologies from its laboratories to the commercial sector.
- (j) The degree to which a university proposed to house a center of excellence stimulates and supports new venture creation.
- (k) The existence of a plan to enhance academic curricula by improving communication between academia and industry.
- (1) The existence of a plan to increase the number, quality, and retention rate of faculty, graduate students, and eminent scholars in advanced and emerging technology-based disciplines.
- (m) The existence of a plan to increase the likelihood of faculty, graduate students, and eminent scholars pursuing private sector careers in the state.
- (n) Ability to provide capital facilities necessary to support research and development.
- (5) By September 15, 2002, The commission shall develop and approve criteria for evaluating proposals submitted under this section subsection (6). When developing such criteria, the commission shall consider the report provided by Florida Research Consortium, Inc., under subsection (4) and hold at least two public hearings, at times 31 and locations designated by the chair of the commission, for

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the purpose of soliciting expert testimony. By October 1, 2002, The commission shall provide a list of such criteria to each university in the State University System and to the State Technology Office for publishing on the Internet within 24 hours after the office's receipt of the list.

- criteria to the universities, the commission shall notify each university, in writing, of the opportunity to submit to the commission written proposals for establishing one or more centers of excellence. Proposals must specifically address the evaluation criteria developed by the commission and delineate how funding would be used to develop one or more centers of excellence. Proposals must be submitted to the commission by December 1, 2002. Notwithstanding this deadline, the commission, upon an affirmative vote of a majority of its members, may accept a proposal submitted after the deadline.
- (7) By February 1, 2003, The commission shall submit to the State Board of Education a minimum of two, but no more than five, recommended plans for the establishment of one or more centers of excellence in the state. Recommended plans must specifically address the evaluation criteria developed by the commission and delineate how funding would be used to develop one or more centers of excellence. When developing such recommended plans, the commission shall consider the university proposals submitted under subsection (6) and hold at least three public hearings, at times and locations designated by the chair of the commission, for the purpose of soliciting expert testimony including, but not limited to, viewing presentations of university proposals.
- (8) By March 15, 2003, The State Board of Education shall develop and approve a final plan for the establishment

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of one or more centers of excellence in the state and authorize expenditures for implementation of the plan. The final plan must allocate at least \$10 million to each center of excellence established by the plan. When developing this final plan, the board shall consider the commission's recommended plans submitted under subsection (7) and hold at least one public hearing for the purpose of soliciting expert testimony. The final plan must include performance and accountability measures that can be used to assess the progress of plan implementation and the success of the centers of excellence established under the final plan. By March 22, 2003, The board shall provide a copy of the final plan to the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

- (9) Beginning June 30, 2003, The commission shall report quarterly, in writing, to the Commissioner of Education on the progress of the implementation of the final plan approved under subsection (8) and the success of the centers of excellence established under that plan.
- (10) This section expires <u>June 30, 2006</u> July 1, 2004.

Section 2. Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, and subject to a specific appropriation by the Legislature for fiscal year 2004-2005, the State Board of Education shall provide for the establishment or expansion of one or more centers of excellence in this state, as defined under section 1004.225, Florida Statutes, in the manner and using the timeframes prescribed in this section.

(1)(a) Florida Research Consortium, Inc., shall review the report submitted to the Emerging Technology Commission under section 1004.225, Florida Statutes, and revise the

factors contributing to the success of a center of excellence as the consortium considers necessary. 3 1. In reviewing the report and revising the factors, 4 the consortium shall, at a minimum, consider activities and progress related to the establishment of the centers of 5 excellence designated under section 1004.225, Florida 6 7 Statutes. 8 2. The consortium also shall ensure that the report 9 addresses factors contributing to the success of an expansion of a center of excellence designated under section 1004.225, 10 Florida Statutes. 11 (b) By August 1, 2004, the consortium shall submit a 12 13 revised report to the commission. (2)(a) By September 1, 2004, the Emerging Technology 14 Commission shall approve criteria for evaluating proposals for 15 establishing or expanding one or more centers of excellence 16 under this section. The commission shall consider the criteria 17 18 developed under section 1004.225, Florida Statutes, and the 19 revised report submitted by Florida Research Consortium, Inc., under subsection (1). The commission shall hold at least one 20 public hearing, at a time and location designated by the chair 2.1 22 of the commission, for the purpose of receiving expert 2.3 testimony on the evaluation criteria. 24 (b) By September 15, 2004, the commission shall provide a list of the approved criteria to each university in 2.5 26 the state and to the State Technology Office for publishing on the Internet within 24 hours after the office's receipt of the 2.7 28 list. 29 (3)(a) Concurrent with the provision of the list of criteria under subsection (2), the Emerging Technology 30

Commission shall notify each university in the state, in

writing, of the opportunity to submit to the commission a written proposal for establishing a center of excellence under this section or expanding a center of excellence designated 3 under section 1004.225, Florida Statutes. This section does 4 not prevent a university that is the site of a center of 5 excellence designated under section 1004.225, Florida 6 7 Statutes, from submitting a proposal to establish a new center 8 of excellence or to expand the existing center of excellence 9 designated under that section. (b) A proposal from a university must be submitted to 10 the commission before November 1, 2004. 11 (c) A proposal must specifically address the 12 13 evaluation criteria developed by the commission and specify how funding would be used to establish or expand a center of 14 excellence. 15 (4) By January 1, 2005, the Emerging Technology 16 Commission shall submit to the State Board of Education a 17 18 recommended plan for establishing or expanding one or more 19 centers of excellence under this section. The recommended plan must specifically address the evaluation criteria developed by 20 the commission and specify how funding would be used to 2.1 22 establish or expand each center of excellence. When developing 2.3 the recommended plan, the commission shall consider the 24 proposals submitted under this section and hold at least two public hearings, at times and locations designated by the 2.5 chair of the commission, for the purpose of receiving expert 26 testimony, including, but not limited to, viewing 2.7 2.8 presentations of university proposals. 29 (5)(a) By February 15, 2005, the State Board of Education shall develop and approve a final plan for 30 establishing or expanding one or more centers of excellence 31

	under this section and shall authorize expenditures for
2	implementing the plan.
3	(b) The plan may provide for:
4	1. Designating one or more centers of excellence,
5	which shall be in addition to any centers of excellence
6	designated under section 1004.225, Florida Statutes;
7	2. Expanding one or more of the centers of excellence
8	designated under section 1004.225, Florida Statutes; or
9	3. Designating one or more new centers of excellence
10	and expanding one or more of the centers of excellence
11	designated under section 1004.225, Florida Statutes.
12	(c) The final plan must include performance and
13	accountability measures that can be used to assess the
14	progress of plan implementation and the success of each center
15	of excellence that receives funding under the final plan. By
16	March 1, 2005, the State Board of Education shall provide a
17	copy of the final plan to the Governor, the President of the
18	Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
19	(6) Beginning July 1, 2005, the Emerging Technology
20	Commission, as part of the report submitted under section
21	1004.225(9), Florida Statutes, shall report quarterly, in
22	writing, to the Commissioner of Education on the progress in
23	implementing the final plan approved under subsection (5) and
24	the success of each center of excellence that receives funding
25	under that plan.
26	Section 3. Section 1004.451, Florida Statutes, is
27	created to read:
28	1004.451 Center for the Performing Arts direct-support
29	organization
30	(1) Florida State University shall create a
2 1	direct support organization for the Florida State University

Center for the Performing Arts for the purposes described in this section. The board of directors of the direct-support organization shall consist of eleven members. The core 3 members of the board of directors shall be the President of 4 Florida State University, the Chair of the Board of Trustees 5 for Florida State University, the Dean of Florida State 6 7 University School of Theater, the Dean of Florida State 8 University School of Visual Arts and Dance, the Director of 9 Florida State University Conservatory for Actor Training in Sarasota, and two members nominated by Asolo Theater, Inc., 10 and approved by the President of Florida State University. 11 The seven core members of the board shall appoint two 12 13 additional members to serve on the board of directors with the 14 approval of the President of Florida State University. The President of Florida State University shall appoint two 15 members from the Sarasota community, or, at the President's 16 discretion, may appoint two members nominated by the Sarasota 17 18 Ballet, Inc. Upon appointment of all members of the board of 19 directors, the direct-support organization shall develop a charter and bylaws to govern its operation, provided that all 20 decisions by its board of directors shall be taken by at least 2.1 22 six-vote majorities. The charter, bylaws, and any 2.3 modifications of such, shall be subject to approval by Florida 24 State University. (2) The direct-support organization, operating under 2.5 its charter and bylaws, shall acquire from Florida State 26 University, own and operate the Florida State University 2.7 28 Center for the Performing Arts, and shall promote a resident 29 professional repertory program to work in conjunction with, complement and support the Conservatory's graduate educational 30 theater program of Florida State University in Sarasota. It 31

shall engage in fundraising to support its activities and support the independent fundraising efforts of the Asolo and the Conservatory. The direct-support organization shall 3 operate and maintain the building in coordination with the 4 Florida State University Ringling Cultural Center. All 5 agreements between the University and Asolo in force on the 6 effective date of this statute shall remain binding on the 8 parties. 9 (3) The direct-support organization shall provide for an annual financial audit in accordance with s. 1004.28(5), 10 Florida Statutes. The audit shall be addressed to the direct 11 support organization, Florida State University, the Asolo and, 12 13 if it has members serving on the Board of Directors, the 14 Ballet, each of whom are authorized to require and receive from the direct-support organization, or from its independent 15 auditor, any detail or supplemental data relative to the 16 operation of such organization. 17 18 (4) An employee or member of the direct-support 19 organization may not receive, nor any member of their immediate family receive, a commission, fee, or financial 20 benefit in connection with services or goods associated with 2.1 22 the direct-support organization and may not be a business associate of any individual, firm, or organization involved in 23 24 the sale or exchange of goods or services within the <u>direct-support organization.</u> 2.5 (5) In all other respects, the direct-support 2.6 27 organization shall act as a direct-support organization 28 authorized and governed by the provisions of s. 1004.28. 29 (6) Florida State University shall transfer the Center for the Performing Arts to the direct-support organization 30 31

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when Florida State University has approved the charter and bylaws of the direct-support organization.

Section 4. The sum of \$50,000 is appropriated from nonrecurring general revenue to the Executive Office of the Governor for the purpose of providing staff and administrative support to the Emerging Technology Commission, created under section 1004.225, Florida Statutes, and per diem and travel expenses for commission members during the 2004-2005 fiscal year.

Section 5. Subsections (1) and (3) of section 1004.55, Florida Statutes, are amended to read:

1004.55 Regional autism centers.--

- (1) Seven Six regional autism centers are established to provide nonresidential resource and training services for persons of all ages and of all levels of intellectual functioning who have autism, as defined in s. 393.063; who have a pervasive developmental disorder that is not otherwise specified; who have an autistic-like disability; who have a dual sensory impairment; or who have a sensory impairment with other handicapping conditions. Each center shall be operationally and fiscally independent and shall provide services within its geographical region of the state. Each center shall coordinate services within and between state and local agencies and school districts but may not duplicate services provided by those agencies or school districts. The respective locations and service areas of the centers are:
- (a) The Department of Communication Disorders at Florida State University, which serves Bay, Calhoun, Escambia, Franklin, Gadsden, Gulf, Holmes, Jackson, Jefferson, Leon, Liberty, Madison, Okaloosa, Santa Rosa, Taylor, Wakulla, 31 Walton, and Washington Counties.

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- (b) The College of Medicine at the University of Florida, which serves Alachua, Bradford, Citrus, Columbia, Dixie, Gilchrist, Hamilton, Hernando, Lafayette, Levy, Marion, Putnam, Suwannee, and Union Counties.
- (c) The University of Florida Health Science Center at Jacksonville, which serves Baker, Clay, Duval, Flagler, Nassau, and St. Johns Counties.
- (d) The Louis de la Parte Florida Mental Health
 Institute at the University of South Florida, which serves
 Charlotte, Collier, DeSoto, Glades, Hardee, Hendry, Highlands,
 Hillsborough, Indian River, Lee, Manatee, Martin, Okeechobee,
 Pasco, Pinellas, Polk, St. Lucie, and Sarasota Counties.
- (e) The Mailman Center for Child Development at the University of Miami, which serves Broward, Dade and, Monroe, and Palm Beach Counties.
- (f) The College of Health and Public Affairs at the University of Central Florida, which serves Brevard, Lake, Orange, Osceola, Seminole, Sumter, and Volusia Counties.
- (q) The Department of Exceptional Student Education at Florida Atlantic University, which serves Palm Beach, Martin, St. Lucie, Okeechobee, and Indian River Counties.
- (3) To promote statewide planning and coordination, a conference must be held annually for staff from each of the seven five centers and representatives from each center's constituency board. The purpose of the conference is to facilitate coordination, networking, cross-training, and feedback among the staffs and constituency boards of the centers.
- 29 Section 6. Section 1004.63, Florida Statutes, is 30 created to read:
 - 1004.63 Florida-Scripps Research Compact. --

1	(1) There is created the Florida-Scripps Research
2	Compact. The purpose of the compact is to explore facilitating
3	and maximizing Florida's postsecondary collaboration with the
4	Scripps Research Institute, including the feasibility and
5	planning of a physical presence constituting a fully
6	operational State of Florida-Scripps Research Campus over a
7	multiyear phase-in. Such plans may include, but need not be
8	limited to, the creation of research and graduate education
9	facilities for faculty, support staff, and students of the
10	state universities, the state's historically black colleges
11	and universities, the University of Miami, and any other
12	accredited medical school in this state to collaborate with
13	the Scripps Research Institute; the acquisition of land,
14	facilities, and equipment; the potential for placement of a
15	research hospital on the campus; the placement of a
16	public-private research incubator on the campus; and any other
17	public-private partnerships and necessary physical resources
18	that would enhance the state's relationship with the Scripps
19	Research Institute. By December 31, 2004, the compact shall
20	submit a report to the Office of the Governor, the Senate, and
21	the House of Representatives outlining the potential and
22	feasibility of a Florida-Scripps Research Campus, including
23	plans for governance, operation, and phased-in budget.
24	(2) For purposes of administration and fiscal agency,
25	the compact shall be hosted by Florida Atlantic University and
26	chaired by the President of Florida Atlantic University.
27	Functions of the compact shall be overseen by a board of
28	directors whose composition shall be determined by the
29	Governor, in consultation with the Scripps Research Institute.
30	(3) A Compact Research Advisory Committee shall serve
21	as a standing committee of the board of directors. The

1	committee shall be comprised of all members of the Florida
2	Research Consortium and other members as determined by the
3	Governor. The purpose of the Compact Research Advisory
4	Committee shall be to facilitate the report as well as the
5	future collaboration and coordination among Florida's
6	postsecondary institutions and the Scripps Research Institute.
7	Such coordination shall be for purposes of communication,
8	efficiency, priority, and nonduplication rather than as a
9	restriction on any Florida postsecondary institution and its
10	relationship with the Scripps Research Institute.
11	Section 7. There is appropriated from the General
12	Revenue Fund to the State Board of Education the sum of
13	\$250,000 in nonrecurring funds for the 2004-2005 fiscal year.
14	These funds shall be administered by the Board of Governors of
15	the State University System to support the activities of the
16	Florida-Scripps Research Compact and the Compact Research
17	Advisory Committee.
18	Section 8. This act shall take effect upon becoming a
19	law.
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
