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15	Section 1. Section 413.011, Florida Statutes, is
16	amended to read:
17	413.011 Division of Blind Services, <u>legislative</u>
18	policy, intent; internal organizational structure and powers;
19	Rehabilitation Advisory Council for the Blind
20	(1) PolicyIt is the policy of the Legislature that
21	all programs, projects, and activities of the division are to
22	be carried out in a manner consistent with the following
23	principles:
24	(a) Respect for individual dignity, personal
25	responsibility, self-determination to live independently, and
26	pursuit of meaningful careers, based on informed choice;
27	(b) Support for the involvement of an individual's
28	representative if an individual requests, desires, or needs
29	such support;
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1	(c) Respect for the individual's privacy and equal
2	access, including the use of information in accessible
3	formats; and
4	(d) Integration and full participation of individuals
5	who are blind in society on equal terms with others.
6	(2) It is the intent of the Legislature to establish a
7	coordinated program of services which will be available to
8	individuals throughout this state who are blind. The program
9	must be designed to maximize employment opportunities for such
10	individuals and to increase their independence and
11	self-sufficiency.
12	(3)(1) The internal organizational structure of the
13	Division of Blind Services shall be designed for the purpose
14	of ensuring the greatest possible efficiency and effectiveness
15	of services to the blind and to be consistent with chapter 20.
16	The Division of Blind Services shall plan, supervise, and
17	carry out the following activities:
18	(a) Recommend personnel as may be necessary to carry
19	out the purposes of this section.
20	(b) Develop and implement a state plan for vocational
21	rehabilitation services for individuals who are blind,
22	pursuant to section 101 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as
23	amended.
24	(c) In conjunction with the Florida Independent Living
25	Council, develop and implement a 3-year state plan for
26	independent living services and provide independent living
27	services for blind and visually impaired individuals,
28	including services for older individuals who are blind,
29	pursuant to Title VII, chapter 2 of the Rehabilitation Act of
30	1973, as amended.
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1	(d) Provide services that contribute to the
2	maintenance of or the increased independence of older
3	individuals who are blind.
4	(e) Establish, equip, and maintain an orientation and
5	adjustment center or centers to provide independent living
6	skills training and other training such as, but not limited
7	to, instruction in Braille; use of the long white cane for
8	independent travel; homemaking and home-management skills; and
9	communication skills, including the use of computer
10	technology, to prepare individuals who are blind or visually
11	impaired for eventual vocational training, job placement, and
12	independence.
13	(f) Establish and implement a small business
14	enterprises program and serve as the state licensing agency
15	for individuals who are blind, pursuant to the federal
16	Randolph-Sheppard Act.
17	(g) Purchase and distribute specialized equipment,
18	devices, and technology, including low-vision aids, obtained
19	directly from specialty vendors without using state
20	centralized purchasing procedures.
21	(h) In cooperation with the Library of Congress,
22	provide library services to persons who are blind and persons
23	who have other print-related disabilities.
24	(i) In cooperation with other appropriate agencies,
25	provide to employers, the state education agency, and local
26	education agencies technical assistance in the provision of
27	auxiliary aids and services to people who are blind, students,
28	and their parents in complying with the Americans with
29	Disabilities Act and the Individuals with Disabilities
30	Education Act, as amended.
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1 (j) Provide technical assistance to agencies within the state in order to assure that information technology 2 3 purchased or used by such agencies is accessible to and usable by individuals who are blind, at the time the technology is 4 5 purchased or used. 6 (k) Participate, through the designation of the director or an appropriate staff member of the division, on 7 8 boards, commissions, or bodies in this state for the purpose 9 of coordinating and planning services. 10 (1) Adopt rules for administering the programs of the 11 division. (m) Apply for and receive money from any state or 12 13 federal agency to support the programs of the division. 14 (n) Develop and administer any other program that will further the provision of services to people who are blind and 15 that the division determines falls within its scope of 16 17 responsibility. (b) Cause to be compiled and maintained a complete 18 19 register of the blind in the state, which shall describe the 20 condition, cause of blindness, and capacity for education and industrial training, with such other facts as may seem to the 21 22 division to be of value. Any information in the register of the blind which, when released, could identify an individual 23 24 is confidential and exempt from the provisions of s. 25 119.07(1). (o) (c) Inquire into the cause of blindness, inaugurate 26 preventive measures, and provide for the examination and 27 treatment of the blind, or those threatened with blindness, 28 29 for the benefit of such persons, and shall pay therefor, 30 including necessary incidental expenses. 31

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1 (p)(d) Aid the blind in finding employment, teach them 2 trades and occupations within their capacities, assist them in 3 disposing of products made by them in home industries, assist them in obtaining funds for establishing enterprises where 4 5 federal funds reimburse the state, and do such things as will б contribute to the efficiency of self-support of the blind. 7 (q)(e) Establish one or more training schools and 8 workshops for the employment of suitable blind persons; make 9 expenditures of funds for such purposes; receive moneys from 10 sales of commodities involved in such activities and from such 11 funds make payments of wages, repairs, insurance premiums and replacements of equipment. All of the activities provided for 12 13 in this section may be carried on in cooperation with private workshops for the blind, except that all tools and equipment 14 15 furnished by the division shall remain the property of the 16 state. 17 (r) (f) Provide special services and benefits for the blind for developing their social life through community 18 19 activities and recreational facilities. 20 (s) (g) Undertake such other activities as may 21 ameliorate the condition of blind citizens of this state. (t) (h) Cooperate with other agencies, public or 22 private, especially the Division of the Blind and Physically 23 24 Handicapped of the Library of Congress and the Division of 25 Library and Information Services of the Department of State, to provide library service to the blind and other handicapped 26 persons as defined in federal law and regulations in carrying 27 28 out any or all of the provisions of this law. 29 (u)(i) Recommend contracts and agreements with 30 federal, state, county, municipal and private corporations,

31 and individuals.

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1	(v) (j) Receive moneys or properties by gift or bequest
2	from any person, firm, corporation, or organization for any of
3	the purposes herein set out, but without authority to bind the
4	state to any expenditure or policy except such as may be
5	specifically authorized by law. All such moneys or properties
6	so received by gift or bequest as herein authorized may be
7	disbursed and expended by the division upon its own warrant
8	for any of the purposes herein set forth, and such moneys or
9	properties shall not constitute or be considered a part of any
10	legislative appropriation made by the state for the purpose of
11	carrying out the provisions of this law.
12	(w) (k) Prepare and make available to the blind, in
13	braille and on electronic recording equipment, Florida
14	Statutes chapters 20, 120, 121, and 413, in their entirety.
15	(x)(1) Adopt by rule:
16	1. Procedures for providing vocational rehabilitation
17	services for the blind; and.
18	<u>2.(m)</u> Adopt by rule forms and Instructions to be used
19	by the division in its general administration.
20	(4) (2) As used in this section, the term:
21	(a) "Act," unless the context indicates otherwise,
22	means the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, 29 U.S.C. ss. 701-797.
23	(b) "Blind" or "blindness" means the condition of any
24	person for whom blindness is a disability as defined by the
25	Rehabilitation Act of 1973, 29 U.S.C. s. 706(8)(b).
26	(c) "Department" means the Department of Education.
27	(5)(a) There is created within the Division of Blind
28	Services a children's program to serve children who are blind
29	from 5 years of age through transition to the Vocational
30	Rehabilitation Program. This program must supplement services
31	already offered by the school system to foster the child's
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1 learning and ability to function independently. The child's parents, guardian, and family members should be an integral 2 3 part of the program in order to foster independence. The division shall provide vocational 4 (b) 5 rehabilitation services to individuals in this state who are б blind, pursuant to the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended. The division shall provide independent living 7 (C) 8 services to individuals in this state who are blind, including older individuals, pursuant to the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, 9 as amended. 10 11 (6) Property that is purchased by a state agency for the purpose of making accommodations for individuals who are 12 blind is not subject to the record and inventory requirements 13 set forth in s. 273.02. A state agency may use funds from all 14 possible sources to make accommodations for individuals who 15 16 are blind. 17 (7) The division shall require all employees and 18 applicants for employment to undergo personnel screening and 19 security background investigations as provided in chapter 435, 20 using the level two standards for screening set forth in that 21 chapter, as a condition of employment and continued 22 employment. 23 (8) (3) (3) There is hereby created in the department the 24 Rehabilitation Advisory Council for the Blind, which is an 25 advisory council as defined in s. 20.03, to assist the division in the planning and development of statewide 26 rehabilitation programs and services, to recommend 27 28 improvements to such programs and services, and to perform the 29 functions provided in this section. 30 (a) The advisory council shall be composed of: 31

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1. At least one representative of the Independent Living Council, which representative may be the chair or other designee of the council; 2. At least one representative of a parent training and information center established pursuant to s. 631(c)(9) of the Individuals with Disabilities Act, 20 U.S.C. s. 1431(c)(9); 3. At least one representative of the client assistance program established under the act; 4. At least one vocational rehabilitation counselor who has knowledge of and experience in vocational rehabilitation services for the blind, who shall serve as an ex officio nonvoting member of the council if the counselor is an employee of the department; 5. At least one representative of community rehabilitation program service providers; Four representatives of business, industry, and 6. labor; 7. At least one representative of a disability advocacy group representing individuals who are blind; At least one parent, family member, guardian, 8. advocate, or authorized representative of an individual who is blind, has multiple disabilities, and either has difficulties representing himself or herself or is unable, due to disabilities, to represent himself or herself; 9. Current or former applicants for, or recipients of, vocational rehabilitation services; and 10. The director of the division, who shall be an ex officio member of the council. (b) Members of the council shall be appointed by the

31 Governor, who shall select members after soliciting

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1 recommendations from representatives of organizations 2 representing a broad range of individuals who have 3 disabilities, and organizations interested in those individuals. 4 5 (c) A majority of council members shall be persons who б are: 7 1. Blind; and 2. Not employed by the division. 8 9 (d) The council shall select a chair from among its 10 membership. 11 (e) Each member of the council shall serve for a term of not more than 3 years, except that: 12 13 1. A member appointed to fill a vacancy occurring 14 prior to the expiration of the term for which a predecessor 15 was appointed shall be appointed for the remainder of such term; and 16 17 2. The terms of service of the members initially appointed shall be, as specified by the Governor, for such 18 19 fewer number of years as will provide for the expiration of 20 terms on a staggered basis. (f) A No member of the council may not serve more than 21 two consecutive full terms. 22 (g) Any vacancy occurring in the membership of the 23 24 council shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment. A vacancy does not affect the power of the 25 remaining members to execute the duties of the council. 26 27 (h) In addition to the other functions specified in 28 this section, the council shall: 29 1. Review, analyze, and advise the division regarding 30 the performance of the responsibilities of the division under 31 Title I of the act, particularly responsibilities relating to: 10

1 Eligibility, including order of selection; a. 2 b. The extent, scope, and effectiveness of services 3 provided; and Functions performed by state agencies that affect 4 c. 5 or potentially affect the ability of individuals who are blind б to achieve rehabilitation goals and objectives under Title I. 7 Advise the department and the division, and, at the 2. 8 discretion of the department or division, assist in the 9 preparation of applications, the state plan, the strategic 10 plan, and amendments to the plans, reports, needs assessments, 11 and evaluations required by Title I. To the extent feasible, conduct a review and 12 3. analysis of the effectiveness of, and consumer satisfaction 13 14 with: The functions performed by state agencies and other 15 a. public and private entities responsible for performing 16 17 functions for individuals who are blind. b. Vocational rehabilitation services: 18 (I) Provided or paid for from funds made available 19 20 under the act or through other public or private sources. 21 (II) Provided by state agencies and other public and private entities responsible for providing vocational 22 rehabilitation services to individuals who are blind. 23 24 4. Prepare and submit an annual report on the status 25 of vocational rehabilitation services for the blind in the state to the Governor and the Commissioner of the 26 27 Rehabilitative Services Administration, established under s. 28 702 of the act, and make the report available to the public. 29 5. Coordinate with other councils within the state, 30 including the Independent Living Council, the advisory panel 31 established under s. 613(a)(12) of the Individuals with 11

1 Disabilities Education Act, 20 U.S.C. 1413(a)(12), the State Planning Council described in s. 124 of the Developmental 2 3 Disabilities Assistance and Bill of Rights Act, 42 U.S.C. s. 4 6024, and the state mental health planning council established 5 under s. 1916(e) of the Public Health Service Act, 42 U.S.C. б 300X - 4(e). 7 6. Advise the department and division and provide for 8 coordination and the establishment of working relationships 9 among the department, the division, the Independent Living 10 Council, and centers for independent living in the state. 11 7. Perform such other functions consistent with the purposes of the act as the council determines to be 12 13 appropriate that are comparable to functions performed by the 14 council. (i)1. The council shall prepare, in conjunction with 15 the division, a plan for the provision of such resources, 16 17 including such staff and other personnel, as may be necessary to carry out the functions of the council. The resource plan 18 19 shall, to the maximum extent possible, rely on the use of 20 resources in existence during the period of implementation of 21 the plan. If there is a disagreement between the council and 22 2. the division in regard to the resources necessary to carry out 23 24 the functions of the council as set forth in this section, the disagreement shall be resolved by the Governor. 25 The council shall, consistent with law, supervise 26 3. 27 and evaluate such staff and other personnel as may be 28 necessary to carry out its functions. 29 While assisting the council in carrying out its 4. 30 duties, staff and other personnel shall not be assigned duties 31

by the division or any other state agency or office that would
create a conflict of interest.

3 (j) <u>A No</u> council member <u>may not</u> shall cast a vote on 4 any matter that would provide direct financial benefit to the 5 member or otherwise give the appearance of a conflict of 6 interest under state law.

7 (k) The council shall convene at least four meetings 8 each year. These meetings shall occur in such places as the 9 council deems necessary to conduct council business. The 10 council may conduct such forums or hearings as the council 11 considers appropriate. The meetings, hearings, and forums shall be publicly announced. The meetings shall be open and 12 13 accessible to the public. The council shall make a report of each meeting which shall include a record of its discussions 14 and recommendations, all of which reports shall be made 15 available to the public. 16

Section 2. Section 413.014, Florida Statutes, isamended to read:

19 413.014 Community-based rehabilitation programs.--The 20 Division of Blind Services shall enter into cooperative 21 agreements with community-based rehabilitation programs as defined by the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended, to be 22 the service providers for the blind citizens of their 23 24 communities. The division shall, as rapidly as feasible, increase the amount of such services provided by 25 community-based rehabilitation programs. The goal shall be to 26 27 decrease the amount of such services provided by division 28 employees and to increase to the maximum extent allowed by 29 federal law the amount of such services provided through cooperative agreements with community-based service providers. 30 31 The division shall seek, to the maximum extent allowed by

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1 federal and state law and regulation, all available federal 2 funds for such purposes. Funds and in-kind matching 3 contributions from community and private sources shall be used 4 to maximize federal funds. Unless prohibited by federal law or 5 regulation, the share of the federal vocational rehabilitation 6 grant apportioned for services to the blind <u>must shall</u> be not 7 less than 17 percent.

8 Section 3. Section 413.041, Florida Statutes, is 9 amended to read:

10 413.041 Eligible blind persons; placement in vending 11 facilities in public places. -- For the purpose of assisting blind persons to become self-supporting, the Division of Blind 12 13 Services is hereby authorized to carry on activities to 14 promote the employment of eligible blind persons, including the licensing and establishment of such persons as operators 15 of vending facilities on public property. The said division 16 17 may cooperate with any agency of the Federal Government in the furtherance of the provisions of the Act of Congress entitled 18 19 "An Act to authorize the operation of stands in federal 20 buildings by blind persons, to enlarge the economic opportunities of the blind and for other purposes," Pub. L. 21 22 No. 732, 74th Congress, and the said division may cooperate in the furtherance of the provisions of any other act of Congress 23 24 providing for the rehabilitation of the blind which is that 25 may now be in effect or is may hereafter be enacted by 26 Congress. Section 4. Subsections (1), (2), (4), (7), and (9), of 27 28 section 413.051, Florida Statutes, are amended to read: 29 413.051 Eligible blind persons; operation of vending 30 stands.--31

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1 (1) This section may be cited shall be known as the 2 Little Randolph Sheppard Act. 3 As used in this section, the term: (2) "Blind licensee" means any blind person trained 4 (a) 5 and licensed by the Division of Blind Services of the б Department of Education to operate a vending stand. 7 "Vending stand" means any manually operated (b) 8 cafeteria, snack bar, cart service, shelter, counter, or other 9 manually operated facility for the sale of newspapers, 10 periodicals, confections, tobacco products, foods, beverages, 11 or other such articles or services. "State agency" means any agency of the state. 12 (C) "State property" means any building or land owned, 13 (d) leased, or otherwise controlled by the state, but does not 14 include any building or land under the control of the Board of 15 Regents, a community college district board of trustees, or 16 17 any state correctional institution as defined in s. 944.02. (4) The Division of Blind Services shall conduct be 22 responsible for a periodic survey of all state properties and, 23 24 where feasible, shall establish vending facilities to be 25 operated by blind licensees. A No person or persons may not shall be offered or 26 (7) granted any concession by any property custodian or person in 27 28 charge to operate a vending stand on any state property 29 acquired after July 1, 1979, unless the division is notified 30 of that proposed concession. 31

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1	(9) This section does not It is the legislative intent
2	that this section shall not apply or operate, in any way or
3	any manner, to divest any person or organization presently
4	operating a vending stand on state, county, or municipal
5	property from continuing to do so; however, the property
6	custodian or person in charge shall notify the Division of
7	Blind Services at least 180 days prior to the expiration
8	whether <u>the</u> such vending facility location is suitable for
9	operation by a blind licensee.
10	Section 5. Section 413.091, Florida Statutes, is
11	amended to read:
12	413.091 Identification cards
13	(1) The Division of Blind Services of the Department
14	of Education <u>shall</u> is hereby empowered to issue identification
15	cards to persons known to be blind or partially sighted, upon
16	the written request of such individual.
17	(2) The individual shall submit proof of blindness as
18	specified by the division.
19	(3) The division is will be responsible for design and
20	content of the identification card and shall develop and <u>adopt</u>
21	promulgate rules, regulations, and procedures relating to the
22	eligibility and application for, and issuance and control of,
23	these identification cards.
24	Section 6. Section 413.095, Florida Statutes, is
25	created to read:
26	413.095 Retention of title to and disposal of property
27	and equipment
28	(1) The Division of Blind Services retains title to
29	any real or personal property, such as tools, instruments,
30	training supplies, equipment, motor vehicles, real property,
31	or other items of value acquired for use by people who have
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1 visual impairments or personnel employed in operating programs of the division, and may repossess and transfer such property 2 3 for use by other people who have visual impairments or personnel employed in the operation of the division. 4 5 The Division of Blind Services may offer for sale (2) б any surplus items acquired in the operation of the program 7 when they are no longer necessary or may exchange them for 8 necessary items that can be used to greater advantage. When any such surplus equipment is sold or exchanged, a receipt for 9 the sale or exchange which shows the consideration given for 10 11 the equipment must be taken from the purchaser, and the consideration must be forwarded to the division to be included 12 in the division's portfolio of investments pursuant to s. 13 413.0115. Such funds are exempt from the State Treasury 14 pursuant to s. 215.311, and are available for expenditure for 15 any purposes consistent with ss. 413.011-413.092. 16 17 (3) The division has the exclusive right to develop 18 rules relating to records and recordkeeping for property owned 19 by the division which is referred to in subsections (1) and 20 (2). 21 Blind services direct-support Section 7. 22 organization.--23 (1) As used in this section, the term "direct-support 24 organization" means a not-for-profit corporation incorporated under chapter 617, Florida Statutes, and organized and 25 operated to conduct programs and activities; initiate 26 27 developmental projects; raise funds; request and receive grants, gifts, and bequests of moneys; acquire, receive, hold, 28 29 invest, and administer, in its own name, securities, funds, 30 objects of value, or other property, real or personal; and 31

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1 make expenditures to or for the direct or indirect benefit of the state and for blind persons in this state. 2 3 (2)(a) The Division of Blind Services is authorized to organize and incorporate a direct-support organization 4 5 pursuant to the requirements of this section and chapter 617, б Florida Statutes, to accomplish the purposes and objectives 7 set forth in this section. 8 (b) The first board of seven members of the 9 direct-support organization shall be appointed by the 10 Governor. Two members shall be appointed to serve 2-year 11 terms, three members shall be appointed to serve 3-year terms, and two members shall be appointed to serve 4-year terms. 12 Thereafter, the board shall be self-appointed according to the 13 14 established by-laws. The director of the division or his or her 15 (C) designee shall serve as an ex officio member of the board of 16 17 the direct-support organization. 18 The direct-support organization is subject to the (d) 19 requirements of Section 24 of Article I of the State Constitution, chapter 119, Florida Statutes, and section 20 21 286.011, Florida Statutes. 22 (e) Upon the dissolution of the corporation, all properties of the corporation revert to the division. 23 24 (f) The direct-support organization shall maintain 25 donations and direct service expenditures in a bank account 26 outside of the State Treasury. 27 (g) Any administrative costs of running and promoting 28 the purposes of the corporation must be paid by private funds. 29 The purposes and objectives of the direct-support (3) 30 organization must be consistent with the priority issues and 31 objectives of the Department of Education and must be in the

1 best interests of the state, though the Division of Blind Services may permit, without charge, the appropriate use of 2 3 property and facilities of the state by the direct-support organization subject to this section. Such use must be 4 5 directly in keeping with the approved purposes of the б direct-support organization. 7 (4) Funds designated for the direct-support 8 organization must be used for the enhancement of programs and projects of the Division of Blind Services. All moneys 9 10 received by the direct-support organization must be deposited 11 into an account of the direct-support organization and must be used by the organization in a manner consistent with the 12 purposes and goals of the direct-support organization. 13 The direct-support organization shall comply with 14 (5) the audit requirements of section 215.981, Florida Statutes. 15 The director of the Division of Blind Services may 16 (6) 17 designate employees of the division to solicit donations from public or private sources to fund the authorized purposes of 18 19 the direct-support organization. 20 Section 8. Sections 413.061, 413.062, 413.063, 413.064, 413.065, 413.066, 416.067, 413.068, and 413.069, 21 22 Florida Statutes, are repealed. Section 9.
