19-1380-04 A bill to be entitled 1 2 An act relating to health care for children; creating the Florida Universal Health Access 3 4 for Children Plan; providing legislative 5 intent; providing definitions relating to health care services for children; providing a 6 7 single, publicly financed statewide program to provide medically necessary health services for 8 9 each child in the state without cost to the 10 child or his or her family; requiring the 11 Department of Health to administer the plan; 12 directing the department to perform certain specified activities and responsibilities; 13 requiring the department to report annually to 14 the Governor and the Legislature; directing the 15 16 department to adopt rules to administer the 17 plan; authorizing the department to hold public hearings; providing an effective date. 18 19 20 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: 21 22 Section 1. Universal health care for children.--23 (1) LEGISLATIVE INTENT.--24 (a) The Legislature finds that one of the principal 25 duties of government is to ensure the care, safety, and 26 protection of children in an environment that fosters healthy 27 social, emotional, intellectual, and physical development. To 28 ensure a secure and safe environment, it is paramount to 29 promote the health and well-being of all children in this 30 state. 31

1	(b) The Legislature further finds that most families
2	are competent caregivers and providers for the health care
3	needs of their children and that children achieve their
4	greatest potential when families are able to support and
5	nurture the health of their children in their own homes.
6	Therefore, the Legislature finds that the policies and
7	procedures relating to the health of the children in this
8	state must ensure that all children, regardless of their
9	parents' income, have access to high-quality health care,
10	without cost to the family or child.
11	(2) DEFINITIONSAs used in this section, the term:
12	(a) "Child" means any person younger than 19 years of
13	age.
14	(b) "Child with special health care needs" means a
15	child whose serious or chronic physical or developmental
16	condition requires extensive preventive and maintenance care
17	beyond that required by typical healthy children. Health care
18	utilization by such a child exceeds the statistically expected
19	usage of the normal child adjusted for chronological age.
20	These children often need complex care requiring multiple
21	providers, rehabilitation services, and specialized equipment
22	in a number of different settings.
23	(c) "Comprehensive health care services" means
24	services, medical equipment, and supplies furnished by a
25	provider, including, but not limited to, medical, surgical,
26	and dental care; psychological, optometric, optic,
27	chiropractic, podiatric, nursing, physical therapy, and
28	pharmaceutical services; emergency services and care; health
29	education, preventive medical, rehabilitative, and home health
30	services; inpatient and outpatient hospital services; extended
31	care; nursing home care; convalescent institutional care;
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1 technical and professional clinical pathology laboratory services; laboratory and ambulance services; appliances, 2 3 drugs, medicines, and supplies; and any other care, service, or treatment of disease or correction of defects for children. 4 5 "Department" means the Department of Health. (d) б "Emergency services and care" means medical (e) 7 screening, examination, and evaluation by a physician, or, to 8 the extent permitted by applicable law, by other appropriate personnel under the supervision of a physician, to determine 9 10 if an emergency medical condition exists and, if it does, the 11 care, treatment, or surgery for a covered service by a physician necessary to relieve or eliminate the emergency 12 medical condition, within the service capability of a 13 hospital. 14 "Family" means the group or the individuals caring 15 (f) for a child. The family includes a child with a custodial 16 17 parent or caretaker relative who resides in the same house or living unit or, in the case of a child whose disability of 18 19 nonage has been removed under chapter 743, Florida Statutes, the child. The family may also include other individuals whose 20 21 income and resources are considered in whole or in part in determining the eligibility of the child. 22 "Health care provider" means a health care 23 (g) 24 professional, health care facility, or entity licensed or 25 certified to provide health services in this state which meets the criteria as established by the department. 26 27 "Medically necessary" means the use of any medical (h) treatment, service, equipment, or supply necessary to palliate 28 29 the effects of a terminal condition or to prevent, diagnose, 30 correct, cure, alleviate, or preclude deterioration of a

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1 condition that threatens life, causes pain or suffering, or results in illness or infirmity and which is: 2 3 1. Consistent with the symptom, diagnosis, and treatment of the child's condition; 4 5 2. Provided in accordance with generally accepted б standards of medical practice; 7 Not primarily intended for the convenience of the 3. 8 child, the child's family, or the health care provider; 9 4. The most appropriate level of supply or service for 10 the diagnosis and treatment of the child's condition; and 11 5. Approved by the appropriate medical body or health care specialty involved as effective, appropriate, and 12 essential for the care and treatment of the child's condition. 13 14 (3) FLORIDA UNIVERSAL HEALTH ACCESS FOR CHILDREN PLAN.--The Florida Universal Health Access for Children Plan 15 is created for the purpose of providing a single, publicly 16 17 financed statewide program to provide comprehensive health care service for all medically necessary health services for 18 19 all children of the state without cost to the child or his or 20 her family. (4) RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF 21 22 HEALTH.--(a) The Department of Health shall: 23 24 1. Establish budget and reimbursement policy 25 guidelines for the plan, recommend priorities for implementing 26 comprehensive plans and budgets, and determine aggregate 27 capital expenditures. 28 2. Establish fee schedules for health care providers. 29 3. Determine the medical standards for establishing 30 the eligibility of children seeking comprehensive health care 31 services from the plan based on medical priority.

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1 4. Coordinate a comprehensive delivery system for 2 children to take maximum advantage of all available funds. 3 5. Administer and implement the plan. Study the most effective methods of providing 4 б. 5 comprehensive health care services to all children in this б state, including children with special health care needs. Serve as a provider and principal case manager for 7 7. 8 children with special health care needs. 9 8. Report annually to the Governor, the President of 10 the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives on 11 its activities and recommend any changes in health care law and funding to improve access to health care for the children 12 13 of this state. 9. Disseminate, to health care providers of services 14 and to the public, information concerning the plan and the 15 children eligible to receive the comprehensive health care 16 17 services under the plan. Monitor, study, and evaluate the operation of the 18 10. 19 plan, including, but not limited to, the adequacy and quality of the comprehensive health care services furnished to 20 21 children under the plan, the cost of each type of service, and the effectiveness of cost-containment measures under the plan. 22 23 Conduct necessary investigations and inquiries and 11. compel the submission of information, documents, and records 24 25 it considers necessary to carry out its duties under this act. 26 12. Conduct other activities the department considers 27 necessary to carry out the purposes of this act. 13. Develop a plan of operation. 28 Adopt rules to administer the plan. The rules may 29 14. 30 include requirements for definitions of terms, program organization, and program description; responsibilities of 31

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1	clients; requirements for service applications, including
2	required medical information; requirements for initial
3	treatment and for continued treatment; billing and payment
4	requirements for health care providers; requirements for
5	qualification, appointments, verification, and emergency
6	exceptions for health-professional consultants; general and
7	diagnostic-specific standards for diagnostic and treatment
8	facilities; and standards for the method of service delivery,
9	including consultant services, respect-for-privacy
10	considerations, examination requirements, family support
11	plans, and clinic design.
12	(b) The department, after providing notice to
13	families, health care providers, and others, may hold hearings
14	in connection with any action that it proposes to take under
15	this act.
16	Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2004.
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19	SENATE SUMMARY
20	Creates a universal health care plan for children. Provides for a single, publicly financed statewide
21	provides for a single, publicly financed statewide program to provide medically necessary health services for all children in the state without cost to the child
22	or his or her family. Requires the Department of Health
23	to administer the plan. Directs the department to perform certain specified activities and responsibilities.
24	Directs the department to adopt rules to administer the plan. Authorizes the department to hold public hearings.
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
