# SENATE STAFF ANALYSIS AND ECONOMIC IMPACT STATEMENT

#### I. Summary:

This bill clarifies provisions of law relating to the commercial taking of crawfish through the use of traps and increases the fee for required crawfish trap numbers from \$100 to \$125 to fund the trap retrieval program created for the purposes of retrieving lost or abandoned lobster and stone crab traps.

This bill substantially amends ss. 370.14 and 370.143, Florida Statutes.

#### II. Present Situation:

#### **Commercial Crawfish Traps**

Section 370.14 (2), F.S., provides that each trap used for taking or attempting to take crawfish (a/k/a spiny lobster) must have a trap number permanently attached to the trap and the buoy. This trap number is issued when the owner of the traps submits an application for a trap number to the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWCC) and pays a \$100 fee. The proceeds from the fee are deposited into the Marine Resources Conservation Trust Fund and distributed as follows:

- Fifty percent is to be used to enforce statutory trap requirements through aerial and other surveillance and to retrieve lost or abandoned traps; and
- Fifty percent is to be used to administer the spiny lobster trap certificate program, research and monitoring of the spiny lobster fishery, enforcement and public education, and to evaluate the impact of the trap reduction program on the spiny lobster fishery.

Section 370.143, F.S., authorizes the FWCC to implement a trap retrieval program for retrieval of lobster and stone crab traps remaining in the water during the closed season for each species.

Trap owners are charged a retrieval fee of \$10 per trap recovered. For persons holding a stone crab endorsement, the fee for the first five traps retrieved is waived because the commercial stone crab endorsement fee is \$125, of which \$25 is used to fund the trap retrieval program (see s. 370.13, F.S.). Revenue from retrieval fees is deposited into the Marine Resources Conservation Trust Fund and used for the operation of the trap retrieval program.

## III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

**Section 1.** Amends s. 370.14, F.S., to provide that the fee for a commercial crawfish trap number issued by the FWCC is \$125. Provides that \$25 of the commercial crawfish trap number fee must be used solely for the purposes of retrieving lost or abandoned lobster, crawfish and stone crab traps under the FWCC's trap retrieval program. The bill also corrects a cross-reference.

**Section 2.** Amends s. 370.143, F.S., to clarify that the trap retrieval program includes the retrieval of commercial crawfish traps and waives the \$10 per trap fee for the first five traps recovered for commercial crawfish harvesters who pay \$125 for a crawfish trap number.

Section 3. Provides that the act will take effect July 1, 2004.

#### **Crawfish Fees**

According to the FWCC, the additional \$25 fee for crawfish trap numbers will generate approximately \$36,250 per year based on crawfish trap numbers issued in 2003-2004. This will provide a stable revenue source for the trap retrieval program.

According to the FWCC, approximately 1,450 commercial crawfish harvesters fish with trap gear. However, the additional \$25 cost could save \$50 in trap retrieval fees when the \$10 per trap retrieval fee is waived for the first five recovered traps.
