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20	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:								
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22	Section 1. This act may be referred to by the popular								
23	name the "Students First Act."								
24	Section 2. Subsections (2) , (3) , and (4) of section								
25	1008.34, Florida Statutes, are amended to read:

28	(2) SCHOOL PERFORMANCE GRADE CATEGORIESThe annual								
29	report shall identify schools as being in one of the following								
30	grade categories defined according to rules of the State Board								
31	of Education:								
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1 (a) "Passing with Distinction."" A, " schools making 2 excellent progress. 3 (b) "Passing.""B," schools making above average 4 progress. 5 (c) "Failing.""C," schools making satisfactory б progress. 7 (d) "D," schools making less than satisfactory 8 progress. 9 (e) "F," schools failing to make adequate progress. 10 11 Each school designated in performance grade category "Passing with Distinction, ""A, " making excellent progress, or having 12 13 improved at least one two performance grade category categories, shall have greater authority over the allocation 14 of the school's total budget generated from the FEFP, state 15 categoricals, lottery funds, grants, and local funds, as 16 17 specified in state board rule. The rule must provide that the increased budget authority shall remain in effect until the 18 19 school's performance grade declines. Beginning in the 2004-2005 school year, a school that has been designated as 20 21 performance grade category "F" in a prior school year shall not be designated as performance grade category "Failing" 22 using the current year's data if that school has shown at 23 24 least a 50-percent increase toward the baseline score in each 25 subject area. (3) DESIGNATION OF SCHOOL PERFORMANCE GRADE 26 27 CATEGORIES. -- For purposes of determining school performance, 28 student performance should be based on a student's annual 29 learning gains when the gain can be measured with an accurate 30 and consistent assessment system. School performance grade 31

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1 category designations itemized in subsection (2) shall be 2 based on the following: 3 (a) Timeframes.--School performance grade category designations 4 1. 5 shall be based on the school's current year performance and б the school's annual learning gains. 7 2. Beginning in school year 2004-2005, a school's 8 performance grade category designation shall be determined based upon the following weighted factors for the following 9 10 grade levels, according to rules adopted by the State Board of 11 Education: a. For kindergarten through grade 2, 60 percent of the 12 performance grade shall be based on the percentage of classes 13 for which there is a ratio of 1 teacher to 20 students, 20 14 percent shall be based on attendance, 10 percent shall be 15 based on parental involvement, and 10 percent shall be based 16 17 on school safety. b. For grades 3 through 5, 60 percent of the 18 19 performance grade shall be based on FCAT scores, 20 percent shall be based on attendance, 10 percent shall be based on 20 21 parental involvement, and 10 percent shall be based on school 22 safety. c. For grades 6 through 10, 60 percent of the 23 24 performance grade shall be based on FCAT scores, 10 percent 25 shall be based on attendance, 10 percent shall be based on the dropout rate, 10 percent shall be based on parental 26 27 involvement, and 10 percent shall be based on school safety. 28 For grades 11 and 12, 35 percent of the performance d. 29 grade shall be based on the dropout rate; 35 percent shall be 30 based on the number of acceleration mechanisms available to 31 students, including, but not limited to, Advanced Placement

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1 courses and dual enrollment courses; 10 percent shall be based on attendance; 10 percent shall be based on parental 2 3 involvement; and 10 percent shall be based on school safety. 4 5 During the 2006-2007 school year, the Legislature shall б conduct public hearings on the school performance grade 7 requirements of this paragraph to receive recommendations for 8 revisions to improve such requirements. The recommendations 9 shall be considered prior to adopting school performance grade 10 requirements for the 2007-2008 school year and thereafter. 11 A school's performance grade category designation 2. shall be based on a combination of student achievement scores, 12 13 student learning gains as measured by annual FCAT assessments 14 in grades 3 through 10, and improvement of the lowest 25th 15 percentile of students in the school in reading, math, or 16 writing on the FCAT, unless these students are performing 17 above satisfactory performance. (b) Student assessment data.--Student assessment data 18 19 used in determining school performance grade categories shall 20 include: The aggregate scores of all eligible students 21 1. enrolled in the school who have been assessed on the FCAT. 22 The aggregate scores of all eligible students 23 2. 24 enrolled in the school who have been assessed on the FCAT, including Florida Writes, and who have scored at or in the 25 lowest 25th percentile of students in the school in reading, 26 27 math, or writing, unless these students are performing above 28 satisfactory performance. 29 30 The Department of Education shall study the effects of 31 mobility on the performance of highly mobile students and 4 **CODING:**Words stricken are deletions; words underlined are additions.

1 recommend programs to improve the performance of such 2 students. The State Board of Education shall adopt appropriate 3 criteria for each school performance grade category. The 4 criteria must also give added weight to student achievement in 5 reading. Schools designated as performance grade category б "Passing""C," making satisfactory progress,shall be required 7 to demonstrate that adequate progress has been made by 8 students in the school who are in the lowest 25th percentile 9 in reading, math, or writing on the FCAT, including Florida 10 Writes, unless these students are performing above 11 satisfactory performance. (4) SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT RATINGS. -- The annual report 12 shall identify each school's performance as having improved, 13 remained the same, or declined. This school improvement rating 14 shall be based on a comparison of the current year's and 15 previous year's student and school performance data. Schools 16 17 that improve at least one performance grade category are eligible for school recognition awards pursuant to s. 1008.36. 18 19 Section 3. Section 1008.36, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 20 Students First Florida School Recognition 21 1008.36 22 Program. --The Legislature finds that in order to provide 23 (1)24 every student enrolled in K-12 public schools with the 25 opportunity to achieve a successful public education, academic problems must be identified early and remediation and 26 27 intervention services must be provided. It is the intent of 28 this section that no child shall be left behind there is a 29 need for a performance incentive program for outstanding faculty and staff in highly productive schools. The 30 31 Legislature further finds that performance-based incentives 5

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1 are commonplace in the private sector and should be infused 2 into the public sector as a reward for productivity. 3 (2) The Students First Florida School Recognition Program is created to provide financial awards to public 4 5 schools that: б (a) A curriculum-based, year-round measurement of learning gains for all kindergarten students enrolled in 7 8 public schools. Sustain high performance by receiving a school 9 grade of "A," making excellent progress; or 10 (b) Remediation and intervention services to all 11 kindergarten through grade 12 students enrolled in public schools who are not meeting grade-appropriate performance 12 expectations, including FCAT scores Demonstrate exemplary 13 14 improvement due to innovation and effort by improving a letter 15 grade. (3) All public schools, including charter schools, 16 17 that receive a school grade pursuant to s. 1008.34 are 18 eligible to participate in the program. (4) All selected schools shall receive financial 19 20 assistance awards depending on the availability of funds 21 appropriated and the number and size of schools selected to receive an award. Funds must be distributed to the school's 22 fiscal agent and placed in the school's account and must be 23 24 used for purposes listed in subsection (5) as determined jointly by the school's staff and school advisory council. If 25 school staff and the school advisory council cannot reach 26 27 agreement by November 1, the awards must be equally 28 distributed to all classroom teachers currently teaching in 29 the school. 30 (5) Students First Program funds School recognition 31 awards must be used for the following: 6

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1 (a) Administration of the Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills (DIBELS) to all kindergarten students 2 3 enrolled in public schools Nonrecurring bonuses to the faculty and staff; 4 5 (b) Nonrecurring expenditures for remediation of 6 low-performing students, including remediation programs and 7 intervention services adopted and administered by the 8 Department of Education; 9 (c) (b) Nonrecurring expenditures for educational 10 equipment or materials to assist in the remediation of 11 low-performing students maintaining and improving student 12 performance; or 13 (d) (c) Temporary personnel for the school to assist in the remediation of low-performing students; or maintaining and 14 improving student performance. 15 (e) Contracts with private sector participants to 16 provide remediation services, provided that 90 percent of the 17 personnel providing services reside in Florida. 18 19 20 Notwithstanding statutory provisions to the contrary, 21 incentive awards are not subject to collective bargaining. 22 Section 4. (1) The Department of Education shall provide training and informational resources for educators to 23 24 administer the Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills (DIBELS) and shall be responsible for creating and 25 26 implementing provisions for the collection and analysis of the 27 testing data. 28 (2) The Department of Education shall establish 29 policies and procedures for the development of individual 30 education plans for low-performing students who need 31 remediation and intervention services.
