1 gushing out of Jeffrey Haider's incisions under pulsating 2 pressure, and 3 WHEREAS, at this point the neurosurgeon realized that 4 the diagnosis of a tumor was incorrect and that Jeffrey Haider 5 had an aneurysm, and б WHEREAS, in fact, the neurosurgeon notes in his 7 operative report that "at this point, we felt that this 8 probably was an aneurysm. I brought in the radiologist who 9 felt that, in retrospect, this was a possibility," and 10 WHEREAS, an aneurysm is a permanent, abnormally 11 blood-filled dilation of a blood vessel, usually resulting from the disease of a vessel wall, and it is common medical 12 13 knowledge that puncturing an aneurysm is the incorrect 14 treatment for a cerebral aneurysm, and WHEREAS, the surgeon and the radiologist then summoned 15 an interventional radiologist who performed an angiogram, a 16 17 procedure that should have been ordered prior to the 18 operation, and 19 WHEREAS, the intraoperative angiogram revealed a giant 20 aneurysm filling from the right middle cerebral artery, and 21 WHEREAS, in an instance of further negligence on the part of the South Broward Hospital District, the neurosurgeon 22 did not repair Jeffrey Haider's middle cerebral artery, but 23 24 instead controlled the bleeding from the aneurysm for about 45 minutes and then closed the dura and the skull, and then sent 25 Jeffrey Haider to the intensive care unit "with the idea of 26 reoperating at a later time, " and 27 28 WHEREAS, however, within hours, Jeffrey Haider was 29 exhibiting dangerous neurological symptoms and was in need of immediate repair of the aneurysm, and 30 31 2

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1	WHEREAS, on June 6, 2000, the repair surgery was
2	commenced, and
3	WHEREAS, when Jeffrey Haider's brain was opened it was
4	noted to be "extremely swollen" and the "aneurysm was causing
5	tremendous pressure on the brain and herniating through the
6	craniotomy," and
7	WHEREAS, at that point the neurosurgeon compounded
8	Jeffrey Haider's condition by tearing off the M1 artery from
9	the junction of the aneurysm and the M2 artery so that he was
10	unable to perform an anastomosis to repair and join the
11	arteries, and
12	WHEREAS, Dr. Rodriquez, the neurosurgeon, states in his
13	operative report that "the larger M2 (artery), and even the
14	other one, were essentially on the aneurysm bulbous dilation
15	and I could not bring them together to do an anastomosis," and
16	WHEREAS, Jeffrey Haider has suffered astronomical
17	economic and noneconomic damages as a result of the treatment
18	he received from the South Broward Hospital District, and
19	WHEREAS, Jeffrey Haider was in a chronic vegetative
20	state and required 7-day-a-week, around-the-clock care, until
21	his death on January 1, 2004, NOW, THEREFORE,
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23	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
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25	Section 1. The facts stated in the preamble to this
26	act are found and declared to be true.
27	Section 2. (1) The South Broward Hospital District is
28	authorized and directed to appropriate from funds of the
29	hospital district not otherwise appropriated and to draw a
30	warrant in the sum of $$3,800,000$, plus interest, as agreed to
31	by the claimant and the South Broward Hospital District,
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payable to Jeffrey Haider as compensation for injuries and 1 damages sustained. After payment of attorney's fees and costs, 2 3 the balance shall be paid into the guardianship account established for Jeffrey Haider. 4 5 The claimants, Alan Haider, Max Haider, Jonathan (2) Haider, and Jessica Haider, and the attorney for each of the б 7 claimants shall, as a condition of payment, nominate a 8 financial institution doing business in this state, or an independent individual who is not related to the claimants by 9 10 blood, marriage, or contract, to act as a trustee for an 11 irrevocable inter vivos trust established for the benefit of each respective claimant. In addition, the proceeds that are 12 paid to Alan Haider, Max Haider, Jonathan Haider, and Jessica 13 Haider shall be placed in separate, irrevocable inter vivos 14 trusts, to be used solely for the health care, support, 15 maintenance, and education of each respective claimant until 16 17 that claimant is 30 years of age. The trustee must take into consideration any other resources and income of the 18 19 beneficiary of a trust before disbursing any funds from a 20 trust to the claimant who is the beneficiary of that trust. To that end, the trustee of the trusts must possess experience in 21 financial and trust management. The amount payable under this 22 section is inclusive of costs and attorney's fees, as limited 23 24 by section 768.28(8), Florida Statutes. 25 Section 3. 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1	STATEMENT OF SUBSTANTIAL CHANGES CONTAINED IN COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR
2	Senate Bill 40
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4	The title is revised to reflect the death of the claimant, Mr. Haider. The bill requires the South Broward Hospital District
5	to pay the Haider family \$3.8 million plus liquidated interest of \$46,437 in specified distributions: the wife of the
б	deceased gets 60 percent and the trust of each adult child gets 10 percent. The bill provides requirements for the
7	creation of trusts for each of the adult children of Mr. and Mrs. Haider to protect the awarded funds. The duration of each
8	trust is until each adult child reaches age 30. The bill specifies qualifications for the trustee.
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
