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An act relating to abrogating offensive or derogatory place names; creating s. 267.0625, F.S.; providing legislative findings that certain place names are offensive or derogatory; providing definitions; requiring the Florida Historical Commission and the Division of Historical Resources to aid state agencies and local governments in identifying geographic sites having offensive or derogatory place names; directing state agencies and local governments to identify geographic sites having offensive or derogatory place names by a specified date; directing the commission to recommend to the division replacement names; directing the division to select replacement names by a specified date; requiring state and local governments to update maps and markers with the new place names; directing the division to notify the United States Board on Geographic Names of name changes; providing specified exceptions to the act; providing an effective date.

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 267.0625, Florida Statutes, is created Section 1. to read:

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267.0625 Abrogation of offensive and derogatory geographic place names. --

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(1) The Legislature finds that certain place names for geographic sites are offensive or derogatory to the state's people, history, and heritage. The state encourages tolerance

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and understanding between all of its residents and these

- 32 Legislature finds that these offensive or derogatory place names
- 33 should be replaced by names that reflect the state's people,
- history, and heritage without resorting to offensive

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- (2) As used in this section, the term:
- (a) "Commission" means the Florida Historical Commission within the Department of State.
- (b) "Geographic site" means a location or structure in this state, and includes, but is not limited to, rivers, bodies of water, roads, bridges, buildings, geographic features, and parks.
- (c) "Offensive or derogatory place name" means a name deemed offensive on the basis of race, religion, creed, gender, sexual orientation, or national origin.
- with state agencies and political subdivisions in order to identify and inventory all public lands, waters, structures, and other geographic sites having offensive or derogatory place names. The commission shall also assist the division in developing alternative names to replace offensive or derogatory place names with place names that reflect the state's diversity and culture.
- (4)(a) Each state agency that owns or manages public lands, waters, or structures in this state shall, by October 1, 2004, identify any geographic sites under its jurisdiction which contain offensive or derogatory place names and inform the commission of those geographic sites. The commission shall, by

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January 1, 2005, recommend to the division a new name for each
geographic site to replace the offensive or derogatory place
name. The division shall, by March 1, 2005, choose a new name
for the geographic site. Thereafter, the agency shall ensure
that whenever the agency updates a map or replaces a sign,
interpretive marker, or any other marker because of wear or
vandalism, the offensive or derogatory place name is removed and

replaced with the name chosen by the division.

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- (b) Each political subdivision that owns or manages public land, waters, or structures in this state shall, by October 1, 2004, identify any geographic sites under its jurisdiction which contain offensive or derogatory place names and inform the commission of those sites. The political subdivision shall at the same time recommend a replacement name. The commission shall, by January 1, 2005, recommend to the division a new name for each geographic site to replace the offensive or derogatory place name, giving preference to the name suggested by the political subdivision. The division shall, by March 1, 2005, choose a new name for the geographic site. Thereafter, the political subdivision shall ensure that whenever it updates a map or replaces a sign, interpretive marker, or any other marker because of wear or vandalism, the offensive or derogatory place name is removed and replaced with the name chosen by the division.
  - (5) The division shall:
- (a) Notify the Department of Transportation, the Office of Tourism, Trade, and Economic Development, the Department of Management Services, and any other entity that compiles information for or develops maps or markers for the state of the

HB 0505 2004 88 name change so that it may be reflected on subsequent editions of any maps, informational literature, or markers produced by 89 90 those entities. 91 (b) Place a formal request with the United States Board on 92 Geographic Names to render a decision on the proposed name 93 change so that the new name will be reflected on all maps of the 94 United States Board on Geographic Names. 95 (6) This section does not apply to a geographic place name that is the same as the name of a historic person or event or 96 97 that is a nonpejorative place name.

Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2004.

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
