An act relating to homestead exemption; amending s. 196.131, F.S.; providing a value-based sliding scale of criminal penalties for claiming homestead exemption if the funds for the homestead were unlawfully obtained through the performance of a fraudulent act; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 196.131, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

- 196.131 Homestead exemptions; claims; receipt; false information; use of funds from fraudulent acts; penalties.--
- (1) At the time each taxpayer files claim for homestead exemption, the property appraiser shall deliver to the taxpayer a receipt over his or her signature, or that of a duly authorized deputy, which shall appropriately identify the property covered in the application, shall bear date as of the day such application is received by the property appraiser, and shall include any serial number or other identifying data desired by said property appraiser. The possession of such receipt shall constitute conclusive proof of the timely filing of such application.
- (2) Any person who knowingly and willfully gives false information for the purpose of claiming homestead exemption as provided for in this chapter commits is guilty of a misdemeanor of the first degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082 or by fine not exceeding \$5,000, or both.

32	or in whole, with funds which are unlawfully obtained through

34	value of the homestead is:
35	(a) At least \$200,000 but less than \$500,000, a felony of

42	Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2004.
