2 An act relating to dealing in stolen property; amending s.
3 812.022, F.S.; creating an inference that certain persons
4 accepting used property knew or should have known that the
5 property was stolen if the property conspicuously displays
6 specified information; specifying actions such persons may
7 take to avoid the inference; providing exceptions
8 reenacting s. 812.014(1) and (2), F.S., relating to theft;
9 amending s. 921.0022, F.S.; reclassifying the offenses of
10 cargo theft of the first degree and cargo theft of the
11 second degree under the offense severity ranking chart of
12 the Criminal Punishment Code to increase the penalties
13 imposed for any such offense; amending s. 812.022, F.S.;
14 creating an inference that a dealer in used property knew
15 or should have known that he or she possessed stolen
16 property if it is proved that the dealer possessed stolen
17 property upon which a name and phone number are
18 conspicuously displayed; providing that the dealer avoids
19 the inference by meeting specified requirements for
20 verifying that the property was not stolen; specifying
21 records that constitute sufficient evidence to avoid the
22 inference; providing exceptions to the application of the
23 act; providing an effective date.

25 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
26

27 Section 1. Subsection (2) of section 812.022, Florida
 28 Statutes, is amended, and subsection (5) is added to said
 29 section, to read:

30 812.022 Evidence of theft or dealing in stolen property.--

31 (2) Except as provided in subsection (5), proof of
 32 possession of property recently stolen, unless satisfactorily
 33 explained, gives rise to an inference that the person in
 34 possession of the property knew or should have known that the
 35 property had been stolen.

36 (5) Proof that a dealer who regularly deals in used
 37 property possesses stolen property upon which a name and phone
 38 number of a person other than the offeror of the property are
 39 conspicuously displayed gives rise to an inference that the
 40 dealer possessing the property knew or should have known that
 41 the property was stolen.

42 (a) If the name and phone number are for a business that
 43 rents property, the dealer avoids the inference by contacting
 44 such business, prior to accepting the property, to verify that
 45 the property was not stolen from such business. If the name and
 46 phone number are not for a business that rents property, the
 47 dealer avoids the inference by contacting the local law
 48 enforcement agency in the jurisdiction where the dealer is
 49 located, prior to accepting the property, to verify that the
 50 property has not been reported stolen. An accurate written
 51 record, which contains the number called, the date and time of
 52 such call, and the name and place of employment of the person
 53 who verified that the property was not stolen, is sufficient
 54 evidence to avoid the inference pursuant to this subsection.

55 (b) This subsection does not apply to:
 56 1. Persons, entities, or transactions exempt from chapter
 57 538.
 58 2. Used sports equipment that does not contain a serial
 59 number, printed or recorded materials, computer software, or
 60 videos or video games.
 61 3. A dealer who implements, in a continuous and consistent
 62 manner, a program for identification and return of stolen
 63 property that meets the following criteria:
 64 a. When a dealer is offered property for pawn or purchase
 65 that contains conspicuous identifying information that includes
 66 a name and phone number, or a dealer is offered property for
 67 pawn or purchase that contains ownership information that is
 68 affixed to the property pursuant to a written agreement with a
 69 business entity or group of associated business entities, the
 70 dealer will promptly contact the individual or company whose
 71 name is affixed to the property by phone to confirm that the
 72 property has not been stolen. If the individual or business
 73 contacted indicates that the property has been stolen, the
 74 dealer shall not accept the property.
 75 b. If the dealer is unable to verify whether the property
 76 is stolen from the individual or business, and if the dealer
 77 accepts the property that is later determined to have been
 78 stolen,, the dealer will voluntarily return the property at no
 79 cost and without the necessity of a replevin action, if the
 80 property owner files the appropriate theft reports with law
 81 enforcement and enters into an agreement with the dealer to

84 | c. If a dealer is required by law to complete and submit a
85 | transaction form to law enforcement, the dealer shall include
86 | all conspicuously displayed ownership information on the
87 | transaction form.

88 | Section 2. Subsections (1) and (2) of section 812.014,
89 | Florida Statutes, are reenacted to read:

90 | 812.014 Theft.--

91 | (1) A person commits theft if he or she knowingly obtains

133 (c) It is grand theft of the third degree and a felony of
134 the third degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, s.
135 775.083, or s. 775.084, if the property stolen is:

136 1. Valued at \$300 or more, but less than \$5,000.

- 137 2. Valued at \$5,000 or more, but less than \$10,000.
- 138 3. Valued at \$10,000 or more, but less than \$20,000.
- 139 4. A will, codicil, or other testamentary instrument.
- 140 5. A firearm.
- 141 6. A motor vehicle, except as provided in paragraph
- 142 (2)(a).
- 143 7. Any commercially farmed animal, including any animal of
- 144 the equine, bovine, or swine class, or other grazing animal, and
- 145 including aquaculture species raised at a certified aquaculture
- 146 facility. If the property stolen is aquaculture species raised
- 147 at a certified aquaculture facility, then a \$10,000 fine shall
- 148 be imposed.

- 150 9. Any amount of citrus fruit consisting of 2,000 or more
- 151 individual pieces of fruit.

- 155 12. Anhydrous ammonia.
- 156 (d) It is grand theft of the third degree and a felony of
- 157 the third degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, s.
- 158 775.083, or s. 775.084, if the property stolen is valued at \$100
- 159 or more, but less than \$300, and is taken from a dwelling as
- 160 defined in s. 810.011(2) or from the unenclosed curtilage of a
- 161 dwelling pursuant to s. 810.09(1).
- 162 (e) Except as provided in paragraph (d), if the property
- 163 stolen is valued at \$100 or more, but less than \$300, the
- 164 offender commits petit theft of the first degree, punishable as
