## CHAMBER ACTION

The Committee on Insurance recommends the following:

Remove the entire bill and insert:

A bill to be entitled

An act relating to fire hydrants; requiring owners of private fire hydrants to test hydrants in accordance with national standards and to contract with licensed professionals or local fire control authorities to inspect and service such hydrants; authorizing local fire officials to contract with owners of private fire hydrants to maintain such hydrants; providing for imposition of fines for noncompliance; providing an effective date.

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Be It Enacted by The Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. (1) A person who owns a private fire hydrant must ensure that the hydrant is tested in accordance with the provisions of National Fire Protection Association Standard 24, Standard for the Installation of Private Fire Service Mains and Their Appurtenances, and that it is inspected and maintained in compliance with the provisions of National Fire Protection Association Standard 25, Standard for the Inspection, Testing,

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and Maintenance of Water-Based Fire Protection Systems, the edition currently adopted by the State Fire Marshal pursuant to its code adoption and standards adoption authority in chapter 633, Florida Statutes. A person who owns a private fire hydrant must produce, upon request of the fire official, a valid and continuing maintenance contract with a plumbing contractor licensed under chapter 489, Florida Statutes, an underground utility contractor licensed under chapter 489, Florida Statutes, or, if the private hydrant is part of a fire suppression system, a fire protection contractor licensed under chapter 633, Florida Statutes.

- (2) The fire department having jurisdiction over the subject property may enter into a contract with the owner to maintain the fire hydrant as required by the code, if the contract does not violate any other federal law or state or local codes, statutes, or ordinances.
- (3) A person who violates this section commits a noncriminal violation, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$100 for a first offense or \$250 for each subsequent offense.

  Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2004.
