Popular name. -- This act shall be known by the 35 popular name the "Healthy Achievers Act." 36 Paragraph (f) is added to subsection (15) of Section 2. 37 section 1001.42, Florida Statutes, and paragraph (a) of subsection (16) and paragraph (a) of subsection (17) of said 38 39 section are amended, to read: 1001.42 Powers and duties of district school board.--The 40 district school board, acting as a board, shall exercise all 41 42 powers and perform all duties listed below: 43 PUBLIC INFORMATION AND PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT (15)44 PROGRAM. --45 (f) Annually provide a student health report to each 46 parent. The report shall contain information as to whether the student is overweight, at risk of becoming overweight, a healthy 47 weight, or underweight. The report shall include general health 48 49 information and district contact information. In preparing the 50 report, districts shall utilize the support materials and

51 information developed by the Department of Education pursuant to 52 section 5 of this act.

IMPLEMENT SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT AND 53 (16)54 ACCOUNTABILITY. -- Maintain a system of school improvement and 55 education accountability as provided by statute and State Board 56 of Education rule. This system of school improvement and education accountability shall be consistent with, and 57 58 implemented through, the district's continuing system of 59 planning and budgeting required by this section and ss. 60 1008.385, 1010.01, and 1011.01. This system of school 61 improvement and education accountability shall include, but is 62 not limited to, the following:

63 School improvement plans. -- Annually approve and (a) require implementation of a new, amended, or continuation school 64 improvement plan for each school in the district, except that a 65 66 district school board may establish a district school 67 improvement plan that includes all schools in the district operating for the purpose of providing educational services to 68 youth in Department of Juvenile Justice programs. Such plan 69 70 shall be designed to achieve the state education priorities 71 pursuant to s. 1000.03(5) and student performance standards. 72 Each plan shall also address issues relative to budget, 73 training, instructional materials, technology, staffing, student 74 support services, specific school safety and discipline 75 strategies, student health and fitness, and other matters of resource allocation, as determined by district school board 76 77 policy, and shall be based on an analysis of student achievement and other school performance data. 78

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(17) LOCAL-LEVEL DECISIONMAKING.--

80 Adopt policies that clearly encourage and enhance (a) 81 maximum decisionmaking appropriate to the school site. Such 82 policies must include quidelines for schools in the adoption and 83 purchase of district and school site instructional materials and 84 technology, the implementation of student health and fitness standards, staff training, school advisory council member 85 training, student support services, budgeting, and the 86 87 allocation of staff resources.

88 Section 3. Subsection (4) of section 1001.43, Florida89 Statutes, is amended to read:

90 1001.43 Supplemental powers and duties of district school 91 board.--The district school board may exercise the following 92 supplemental powers and duties as authorized by this code or 93 State Board of Education rule.

(4) FACILITIES MANAGEMENT. -- The district school board may 94 95 adopt policies providing for management of the physical campus and its environs, including, but not limited to, energy 96 97 conservation measures; indoor environmental quality; building 98 and ground maintenance; fencing, landscaping, and other property 99 improvements; site acquisition; new construction and renovation; 100 dedication and rededication or naming and renaming of district buildings and other district facilities; and development of 101 102 facilities management planning and priorities.

103 Section 4. Section 1001.452, Florida Statutes, is amended 104 to read:

105 1001.452 District and school advisory councils.-106 (1) ESTABLISHMENT.--

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107 The district school board shall establish an advisory (a) 108 council for each school in the district and shall develop 109 procedures for the election and appointment of advisory council 110 members. Each school advisory council shall include in its name 111 the words "school advisory council." The school advisory council 112 shall be the sole body responsible for final decisionmaking at the school relating to implementation of the provisions of ss. 113 1001.42(16) and 1008.345. A majority of the members of each 114 115 school advisory council must be persons who are not employed by 116 the school. Each advisory council shall be composed of the 117 principal and an appropriately balanced number of teachers, 118 education support employees, students, parents, and other 119 business and community citizens, including at least one person from a health care profession, who are representative of the 120 ethnic, racial, and economic community served by the school. 121 122 Technical center and high school advisory councils shall include 123 students, and middle and junior high school advisory councils may include students. School advisory councils of technical and 124 125 adult education centers are not required to include parents as members. Council members representing teachers, education 126 support employees, students, and parents shall be elected by 127 128 their respective peer groups at the school in a fair and equitable manner as follows: 129 130 1. Teachers shall be elected by teachers. Education support employees shall be elected by 131 2. 132 education support employees. Students shall be elected by students. 133 3. 134 4. Parents shall be elected by parents.

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136 The district school board shall establish procedures for use by 137 schools in selecting business and community members that include 138 means of ensuring wide notice of vacancies and of taking input 139 on possible members from local business, chambers of commerce, 140 community and civic organizations and groups, health care related professional organizations, and the public at large. The 141 142 district school board shall review the membership composition of each advisory council. If the district school board determines 143 144 that the membership elected by the school is not representative 145 of the ethnic, racial, and economic community served by the school, the district school board shall appoint additional 146 147 members to achieve proper representation. The commissioner shall 148 determine if schools have maximized their efforts to include on 149 their advisory councils minority persons and persons of lower socioeconomic status. Although schools are strongly encouraged 150 151 to establish school advisory councils, the district school board of any school district that has a student population of 10,000 152 153 or fewer may establish a district advisory council which shall include at least one duly elected teacher from each school in 154 155 the district. For the purposes of school advisory councils and 156 district advisory councils, the term "teacher" shall include classroom teachers, certified student services personnel, and 157 158 media specialists. For purposes of this paragraph, "education support employee" means any person employed by a school who is 159 not defined as instructional or administrative personnel 160 pursuant to s. 1012.01 and whose duties require 20 or more hours 161 in each normal working week. 162

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(b) The district school board may establish a district advisory council representative of the district and composed of teachers, students, parents, and other citizens or a district advisory council that may be comprised of representatives of each school advisory council. Recognized schoolwide support groups that meet all criteria established by law or rule may function as school advisory councils.

(c) For those schools operating for the purpose of providing educational services to youth in Department of Juvenile Justice programs, district school boards may establish a district advisory council with appropriate representatives for the purpose of developing and monitoring a district school improvement plan that encompasses all such schools in the district, pursuant to s. 1001.42(16)(a).

177 (d) Each school advisory council shall adopt bylaws178 establishing procedures for:

Requiring a quorum to be present before a vote may be
 taken by the school advisory council. A majority of the
 membership of the council constitutes a quorum.

182 2. Requiring at least 3 days' advance notice in writing to
183 all members of the advisory council of any matter that is
184 scheduled to come before the council for a vote.

185 3. Scheduling meetings when parents, students, teachers,186 businesspersons, and members of the community can attend.

187 4. Replacing any member who has two unexcused consecutive
188 absences from a school advisory council meeting that is noticed
189 according to the procedures in the bylaws.

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5. Recording minutes of meetings.

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CS 191 192 The district school board may review all proposed bylaws of a school advisory council and shall maintain a record of minutes 193 194 of council meetings. 195 (2) GENERAL DUTIES. -- Each school advisory council shall: 196 (a) Perform such functions as are prescribed by 197 regulations of the district school board; however, no advisory council shall have any of the powers and duties now reserved by 198 199 law to the district school board. 200 (b) Each school advisory council shall Assist in the 201 preparation and evaluation of the school improvement plan 202 required pursuant to s. 1001.42(16). 203 (c) Make recommendations by March 1 of each year to 204 maintain or improve student health and fitness. During the recommendation process, a public meeting shall be held by each 205 206 advisory council to give parents an opportunity to express ideas or concerns about the school's role in, or effect on, student 207 208 health and fitness. When making recommendations, consideration shall be given to, but not limited to, the following areas: 209 210 1. Nutrition.--Issues affecting student nutrition, 211 including the school food service program offerings, use of food 212 of minimal nutritional value as classroom incentives or as fundraisers, vending machine contents and hours of availability, 213 214 and the level of nutrition education in the curriculum. 215 2. Physical fitness.--Opportunities to increase student 216 fitness, including the content, length, and frequency of 217 physical education classes and recesses; activity requirements 218 of before school, after school, and summer school programs;

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plan.

CS 219 school participation in organized activity programs that include 220 regular monitoring and assessment of student fitness; and the 221 use of school grounds as public parks. 222 3. Parental information. -- The needs of parents to have a 223 source of information about the health and fitness status of 224 their children. 225 4. Indoor environmental quality.--The need or desirability 226 of having regular indoor environmental quality inspections or 227 establishing indoor environmental quality standards. 228 229 The advisory council's recommendations shall be distributed to the school's parents and principal and submitted to the district 230 231 school board. The district school board, using advisory council 232 recommendations, shall develop a districtwide plan to address student health and fitness. The presence of a districtwide plan 233 234 does not preclude a school from implementing recommendations 235 from its advisory council if the school would otherwise have the 236 authority to take the recommended action. By May 1 of each year, 237 the district school board shall submit the districtwide student 238 health and fitness plan to the department. 239 (3) BUDGET DUTIES.--With technical assistance from the 240 Department of Education, each school advisory council shall 241 assist in the preparation of the school's annual budget and plan 242 as required by s. 1008.385(1). A portion of funds provided in 243 the annual General Appropriations Act for use by school advisory

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councils must be used for implementing the school improvement

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CS 246 Section 5. (1) The Department of Education shall conduct 247 a study to gather information concerning student health and fitness in each school district and develop support materials 248 249 school districts or individual schools could use to improve 250 student health and fitness through local action. 251 (2) The study shall include an examination of: 252 The average length and frequency of physical education (a) 253 classes in elementary, middle, and high school, respectively, by 254 school district. 255 (b) The percent of physical education classes taught by 256 certified physical education instructors. 257 (c) The degree to which individual schools within a school 258 district are allowed to add to or modify district physical 259 education requirements. 260 (d) The availability of fitness assessment programs, like the President's Challenge Physical Fitness Program, which could 261 262 be adopted by schools or entire school districts to provide 263 feedback on and encourage student fitness. 264 (e) Methods of providing feedback to a parent through a 265 student health report that would summarize a student's health 266 and fitness. 267 (3) By December 1, 2004, the department shall develop 268 support materials and distribute them to each school district to 269 enable implementation of fitness assessment programs recommended 270 pursuant to s. 1001.452(2)(c), Florida Statutes, or student 271 health reports required pursuant to s. 1001.42(15)(f), Florida 272 Statutes. The support materials shall include the necessary instructions, procedures, and forms to implement and 273

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274	successfully administer the programs or reports. The department
275	may develop and distribute other support or informational
276	materials it determines may assist schools or school districts
277	to improve student health and fitness through local action.
278	(4) The Department of Education shall report the results
279	of the study to the Governor, the President of the Senate, and
280	the Speaker of the House of Representatives by December 1, 2004.
281	The report shall include results of the study, any identified
282	barriers to local action to improve student health and fitness,
283	and any recommendations based upon the study that would require
284	funding or statutory changes.
285	Section 6. This act shall take effect July 1, 2004.

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
