1 The Committee on Education K-20 recommends the following: 2 3 Committee Substitute 4 Remove the entire bill and insert: 5 A bill to be entitled 6 An act relating to early learning; providing for 7 establishment of the Voluntary Prekindergarten Education 8 Program (VPK Program); providing for scholarship options; 9 providing for the use of web-based or book-based 10 curriculum in lieu of a scholarship; providing eligibility 11 requirements for prekindergarten schools to participate in 12 the VPK Program; providing accountability requirements; providing for administration by the Agency for Workforce 13 14 Innovation; authorizing the agency to adopt rules; providing for the continued administration of the School 15 Readiness Program by the Florida Partnership for School 16 17 Readiness under certain conditions; providing findings 18 regarding the School Readiness Program; providing 19 requirements of the partnership and revising its 20 membership; requiring selection of an Early Learning 21 Advisory Council and appointment of a statewide early 22 learning coordinator; providing for administration of the 23 TEACH scholarship program and any necessary statewide

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24 resource and referral functions by the Agency for 25 Workforce Innovation; requiring the State Board of 26 Education to identify appropriate education curricula for 27 children in the VPK Program and the School Readiness Program; requiring revision of the uniform school 28 29 readiness screening system; requiring a prekindergarten 30 school teacher preparation program and continuing 31 education program; providing an effective date.

33 WHEREAS, the "School Readiness Act," enacted by the 34 Legislature in 1999, consolidated the early childhood 35 development and education programs formerly administered by the 36 Department of Education and the Department of Children and 37 Family Services for at-risk and economically disadvantaged 38 children from birth to kindergarten in order to create a more cohesive, efficient, and integrated school readiness system and 39 40 increase these children's chances of achieving future educational success, and 41

42 WHEREAS, Amendment 8 to the State Constitution, approved by the electors in the 2002 general election, requires the 43 44 Legislature to create a voluntary, high-quality, universal 45 prekindergarten education program for every 4-year-old child in the state, which must be fully implemented no later than the 46 47 beginning of the 2005 school year and funded through "funds 48 generated in addition to those used for existing education, 49 health, and development programs . . . as of January 1, 2002," 50 and

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51 WHEREAS, in anticipation of implementation of Amendment 8, 52 the 2003 Legislature enacted chapter 2003-93, Laws of Florida, 53 which required the Auditor General and the Office of Program 54 Policy Analysis and Government Accountability (OPPAGA) to 55 conduct program and financial audits of the 1999 School 56 Readiness Program, to make recommendations to the 2004 57 Legislature regarding the progress of that program, and to 58 evaluate the ability of the school readiness system to 59 effectively implement the new voluntary, universal 60 prekindergarten education program for all 4-year-old children, 61 and which also required the State Board of Education to make 62 recommendations regarding the appropriate curriculum, design, 63 and standards for the new voluntary program for all 4-year-old 64 children, and

65 WHEREAS, the State Board of Education recommended in 66 January 2004 that the state board adopt curriculum standards 67 based on a scientifically research-based early reading 68 foundation program to be offered by providers using child 69 development associate teachers for a period of 4 hours per day, 70 180 days per year, and

71 WHEREAS, the Auditor General and OPPAGA issued reports 72 containing their findings and recommendations in January 2004, 73 which, in summary, concluded that the School Readiness Program's 74 potential is beginning to be realized and progress has been 75 made, but identified needed improvements at both the state and 76 local levels and found that, if these needed improvements are 77 made, the "School Readiness Program could provide an effective

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78	structure for implementing the Universal Pre-K Program
79	recommended by the State Board of Education," NOW, THEREFORE,
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81	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
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83	Section 1. Voluntary Prekindergarten Education Program
84	The Voluntary Prekindergarten Education Program (VPK Program) is
85	established beginning with the 2005-2006 school year and shall
86	be available to all children who will have attained the age of 4
87	years on or before September 1 of the school year. Participation
88	in the VPK Program shall be voluntary on the part of both
89	parents and prekindergarten schools.
90	(1)(a) The parent of an age-eligible child may request and
91	receive from the state:
92	1. A scholarship for the child to attend any eligible VPK
93	Program public, private, or faith-based prekindergarten school
94	of the parent's choice for a school year of 540 hours. The
95	parent shall be responsible for the child's transportation and
96	for additional hours or services desired for the child unless
97	the child is eligible for subsidized services under the School
98	Readiness Program; or
99	2. A scholarship for the child to attend an intensive
100	full-day 310-hour prekindergarten summer school offered by an
101	eligible VPK Program public, private, or faith-based school of
102	the parent's choice. The parent shall be responsible for the
103	child's transportation and for additional hours or services
104	desired for the child unless the child is eligible for
105	subsidized services under the School Readiness Program.

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107 If the parent requests a scholarship for the child for the option under subparagraph 1. or the option under subparagraph 108 109 2., the scholarship shall be issued by individual warrant in the 110 name of the parent to the eligible VPK Program prekindergarten 111 school of the parent's choice upon verification of the child's 112 enrollment in and attendance at the school, and the parent shall 113 personally by signature restrictively endorse the warrant to the 114 school for deposit in the school's account. The scholarship 115 shall be in an amount set by the 2005 Legislature, annually 116 adjusted for inflation in accordance with the Consumer Price 117 Index. The parent is free to choose any eligible VPK Program 118 prekindergarten school for the child and, if the parent chooses 119 a school that costs more than the amount set by the Legislature, 120 the parent may supplement the state-provided scholarship amount. 121 (b) Recognizing that research shows the parent is the 122 child's best first teacher, any parent of an age-eligible child 123 may request and receive from the state in lieu of a scholarship 124 the parent's choice of a web-based or book-based curriculum for 125 4-year-old children that is literacy based and numeracy based 126 and emphasizes phonics, phonemic awareness, and vocabulary for 127 the parent to teach the child. (2)(a) To be an eligible prekindergarten school in the VPK 128 129 Program, the school must be a Florida public, private, or faith-130 based school that offers a literacy-based and numeracy-based 131 foundation curriculum which emphasizes phonics, phonemic 132 awareness, and vocabulary and is appropriate to prepare 4-year-133 old children for success upon entry into public school. A public

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CS 134 school graded D or F shall not be eligible to participate in the 135 VPK Program unless no other VPK Program prekindergarten school is located in the geographic area, in which case the public 136 137 school graded D or F shall contract with a public school graded 138 A or B or a private or faith-based VPK Program prekindergarten 139 school to provide the prekindergarten program in the public 140 school graded D or F. (b) The prekindergarten school shall maintain an accurate 141 school profile containing pertinent information regarding the 142 143 school, its curriculum, the qualifications of its teachers and 144 staff, and the overall performance of its students as measured by the uniform school readiness screening defined in section 145 146 3(2) of this act and other objective measures and keep this profile readily available and easy to access and understand by 147 parents of children attending the school and parents interested 148 149 in the school for their child. 150 (c) As a condition of ongoing participation by a 151 prekindergarten school in the VPK Program, the performance of 152 the students taught by the prekindergarten school over each 2-153 year period must be equal to or greater than the average 154 performance of all students assessed during that 2-year period 155 as ready for kindergarten when administered the school readiness uniform screening defined in section 3(2) of this act upon entry 156 157 into public school for the first time. 158 (d) The prekindergarten school shall comply with the 159 antidiscrimination provisions of 42 U.S.C. s. 2000d. 160 The prekindergarten school shall be accountable for (e) 161 providing each of its students with a teacher qualified to

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CS 162 instill in the student the literacy, numeracy, phonics, phonemic 163 awareness, and vocabulary foundation necessary for the student to be measured as ready for school when the student is 164 165 administered the uniform school readiness screening defined in 166 section 3(2) of this act upon entry into public school. 167 (3) The VPK Program and the scholarships offered through 168 the program shall be administered by the Agency for Workforce 169 Innovation. In administering the VPK Program, the Agency for 170 Workforce Innovation shall be responsible for determining that 171 the child is age eligible and that the VPK Program 172 prekindergarten school chosen by the parent has demonstrated 173 fiscal soundness and is an eligible prekindergarten school. The 174 Agency for Workforce Innovation shall maintain a clearinghouse 175 of information that includes the VPK Program prekindergarten 176 school profiles required under paragraph (2)(b) to help parents make informed choices about their child's school. 177 178 The Agency for Workforce Innovation may adopt rules (4) 179 pursuant to ss. 120.536(1) and 120.54, Florida Statutes, to 180 administer this section. However, the inclusion of eligible 181 private and faith-based options for the VPK Program available to 182 the state's 4-year-old children does not expand any regulatory 183 authority to impose any additional regulation of private and 184 faith-based prekindergarten schools beyond those reasonably 185 necessary to enforce requirements expressly set forth in this 186 section. 187 Section 2. School Readiness Program. -- The existing School 188 Readiness Program shall continue to be administered by the 189 Florida Partnership for School Readiness if the partnership

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meets the requirements of this section and section 3 to the satisfaction of the 2005 Legislature. (1) The Legislature recognizes the findings of the Auditor General and the Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government Accountability (OPPAGA) regarding the School Readiness Program established by the Legislature in 1999, including: The School Readiness Program has made progress and is (a) beginning to transform what used to be a child care system into a coordinated school readiness program, but substantial issues remain and more progress is needed. The Florida Partnership for School Readiness has taken (b) steps to address key program issues and many local school readiness coalitions are beginning to make meaningful progress implementing key program elements. Improvement is needed in guidance of the program and (C) in the program's operational and financial management. (d) A new funding formula for the program that is equity based and performance based has been developed as required by law but needs to be improved and implemented. (e) Some rules for the program have been adopted but additional rules are needed. (f) The quality of some school readiness coalition plans and the single statewide database must be addressed. (q) The school readiness uniform screening system must be implemented uniformly across the state and must provide a single score that assesses a child's readiness for school. (h) Some program providers are not being required to use

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218	(i) The partnership and school readiness coalitions have
219	exhibited weaknesses in financial management that have led to

221	(2) No later than March 1, 2005, the Florida Partnership
222	for School Readiness shall provide to the Legislature:
223	(a) Evidence that all state-level policy and fiscal
224	guidance issues identified by the Auditor General in AG Report
225	2004-085 and by OPPAGA in OPPAGA Reports 03-75 and 04-06 have
226	been addressed and resolved.
227	(b) A plan for consolidating the current 50 local school
228	readiness coalitions into 28 school readiness coalitions. Until
229	the 2005 Legislature acts, no school readiness coalition may
230	become a provider of direct services, including eligibility
231	determination, resource and referral, training and technical
232	assistance, and provider payments, unless the decision to
233	provide such service was officially made by the coalition prior
234	to January 1, 2004.
235	(c) A commitment that the partnership's focus is on the
236	children and families served in the School Readiness Program.
237	(d) The selection of a 12-member Early Learning Advisory
238	Council to the Florida Partnership for School Readiness
239	comprised of a representative of:
240	1. Parents.
241	2. State university presidents.
242	3. Community college presidents.
243	4. Private postsecondary educational institution
244	presidents.
245	5. District school superintendents.

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279	The board shall elect its chair annually by majority vote and
280	shall appoint a statewide early learning coordinator who shall
281	serve at the pleasure of the board and shall be responsible for
282	the state-level program administration, the coordination of
283	quality program delivery among the 28 school readiness
284	coalitions, and the collection and dissemination of reliable and
285	accurate data about the program.
286	(4) Notwithstanding s. 402.3017, Florida Statutes, the
287	Agency for Workforce Innovation shall administer the TEACH
288	scholarship program.
289	(5) Notwithstanding s. 402.27, Florida Statutes, the
290	Agency for Workforce Innovation shall administer any functions
291	of a statewide resource and referral network that the agency
292	determines necessary for efficient operation of the local school
293	readiness coalitions.
294	Section 3. Literacy-based and numeracy-based education
295	curricula for children birth to age 5; school readiness outcome
296	measures
297	(1) No later than December 31, 2004, the State Board of
298	Education shall identify and provide to the Agency for Workforce
299	Innovation, for purposes of the VPK Program, and to the Florida
300	Partnership for School Readiness, for purposes of the School
301	Readiness Program, curricula that will provide an appropriate
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302 education foundation for each age grouping of children from birth to age 5 in each program. The curricula shall be literacy-303 based and numeracy-based and shall emphasize phonics, phonemic 304 awareness, and vocabulary. The Agency for Workforce Innovation 305 306 shall make the curricula for 4-year-old children available to 307 all prekindergarten schools participating in the VPK Program, 308 and the Florida Partnership for School Readiness shall make the 309 curricula for children birth to age 5 available to all 28 school 310 readiness coalitions for incorporation into each coalition's 311 school readiness plan and for availability to all school 312 readiness program providers. 313 (2) Notwithstanding ss. 411.01(4)(0) and 1008.21, Florida 314 Statutes, no later than August 1, 2005, the State Board of 315 Education shall have in place in all public elementary schools 316 throughout the state a uniform school readiness screening system 317 that is focused on the measurement of the child's literacy and 318 numeracy foundation proficiency with an emphasis on phonics, 319 phonemic awareness, and vocabulary. Each prekindergarten school 320 participating in the VPK Program and each provider of a school 321 readiness program for 4-year-old children shall be accountable 322 in accordance with section 1(2)(c) of this act for the performance of their students as measured by this uniform school 323 324 readiness screening system. 325 Section 4. Prekindergarten school teacher preparation 326 program and continuing education program .--327 (1) The Florida Center for Reading Research at Florida 328 State University shall design a web-based teacher preparation 329 program and continuing education program that will provide

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330 teachers of 4-year-old children with the teaching skills necessary to teach these children the literacy, numeracy, 331 phonics, phonemic awareness, and vocabulary foundation skills 332 they need to be measured as ready for school when they are 333 334 administered the uniform school readiness screening upon entry 335 into public school. 336 (2) The teacher education program and continuing education 337 program must be designed with sufficient flexibility to 338 accommodate the variety of curricula and teaching methodologies 339 that may be used by public, private, and faith-based 340 prekindergarten schools. 341 (3) The teacher preparation program and continuing 342 education program shall be provided to the Agency for Workforce 343 Innovation and the Florida Partnership for School Readiness by 344 May 1, 2005. By June 1, 2005, the Agency for Workforce 345 Innovation and the Florida Partnership for School Readiness 346 shall make the teacher preparation program and continuing 347 education program available to all VPK Program prekindergarten 348 schools and to all School Readiness Program providers. 349 (4) Each school readiness coalition shall actively 350 advertise and promote the teacher preparation program and 351 continuing education program throughout the coalition. 352 (5) All teachers of 4-year-old children in prekindergarten 353 schools participating in the VPK Program or the School Readiness 354 Program shall complete the teacher preparation program and 355 participate in the continuing education program. 356 Section 5. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law.
