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23 Section 1. Paragraph (b) of subsection (14) and paragraph 24 (d) of subsection (15) of section 489.503, Florida Statutes, are 25 amended to read:

489.503 Exemptions. -- This part does not apply to:

28 (b) The installation of, repair of, alteration of, 29 addition to, or design of electrical wiring, fixtures, 30 appliances, thermostats, apparatus, raceways, and conduit, or 31 any part thereof, when those items are for the purpose of 32 transmitting data, voice communications, or commands as part of 33 a system of telecommunications, including computers, telephone 34 customer premises equipment, or premises wiring. The scope of 35 this exemption is limited to electrical circuits and equipment 36 governed by the applicable provisions of Articles 725 (Classes 2 37 and 3 circuits only), 770, 800, 810, and 820 of the National 38 Electrical Code, current edition, or 47 C.F.R. part 68. A 39 company certified under chapter 364 is not subject to any local ordinance that requires a permit for work performed by its 40 employees related to low voltage electrical work, including 41 42 related technical codes and regulations. The exemption in this 43 paragraph shall apply only if such work is requested by the 44 company's customer, is required in order to complete phone service, is incidental to provision of telecommunication service 45 46 as required by chapter 364, and is not the subject of a 47 competitive bid. The definition of "employee" established in 48 subsection (1) applies to this exemption and does not include 49 subcontractors. Persons who perform work in accordance with the 50 applicable provisions of Articles 725 (Classes 2 and 3 circuits Page 2 of 8

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51 <u>only</u>), 770, 800, 810, and 820 of the National Electrical Code, 52 <u>current edition, or 47 C.F.R. part 68 who are not employees of a</u> 53 <u>company certified under chapter 364 must be certified pursuant</u> 54 to s. 489.511.

(15) The provision, installation, testing, routine maintenance, factory-servicing, or monitoring of a personal emergency response system, as defined in s. 489.505, by an authorized person who:

(d) Is an employee of or an authorized representative or
distributor for the producer or manufacturer of the personal
emergency response system being monitored.

Section 2. Subsections (2), (7), (25), (27), and (28) of
 section 489.505, Florida Statutes, are amended to read:

489.505 Definitions.--As used in this part:

65 (2) "Alarm system contractor" means a person whose 66 business includes the execution of contracts requiring the 67 ability, experience, science, knowledge, and skill to lay out, fabricate, install, maintain, alter, repair, monitor, inspect, 68 69 replace, or service alarm systems for compensation, including, 70 but not limited to, all types of alarm systems for all purposes. This term also means any person, firm, or corporation that 71 engages in the business of alarm system contracting under an 72 73 expressed or implied contract; that undertakes, offers to 74 undertake, purports to have the capacity to undertake, or 75 submits a bid to engage in the business of alarm system 76 contracting; or that does itself or by or through others engage 77 in the business of alarm system contracting.

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(a) "Alarm system contractor I" means an alarm system
contractor whose business includes all types of alarm systems
for all purposes.

(b) "Alarm system contractor II" means an alarm system
contractor whose business includes all types of alarm systems
other than fire, for all purposes, except as herein provided.

"Certified alarm system contractor" means an alarm 84 (7)85 system contractor who possesses a certificate of competency issued by the department. The scope of certification is limited 86 87 to alarm circuits originating in the alarm control panel and 88 equipment governed by the applicable provisions of Articles 725, 760, 770, 800, and 810 of the National Electrical Code, Current 89 90 Edition, and National Fire Protection Association Standard 72, Current Edition. The scope of certification for alarm system 91 92 contractors also includes the installation, repair, fabrication, 93 erection, alteration, addition, inspection, monitoring, or 94 design of electrical wiring, fixtures, appliances, thermostats, apparatus, raceways, and conduit, or any part thereof not to 95 96 exceed 98 volts (RMS) 77 volts, when those items are for the purpose of transmitting data or proprietary video (satellite 97 98 systems that are not part of a community antenna television or 99 radio distribution system) or providing central vacuum capability or electric locks; however, this provision governing 100 101 the scope of certification does not create any mandatory licensure requirement. 102 103 (25) "Burglar alarm system agent" means a person: 104 Who is employed by a licensed alarm system contractor (a) 105 or licensed electrical contractor;

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(b) Who is performing duties which are an element of an activity which constitutes alarm system contracting requiring licensure under this part; and

(c) Whose specific duties include any of the following: altering, installing, maintaining, moving, repairing, replacing, servicing, <u>inspecting</u>, selling onsite, or monitoring an intrusion or burglar alarm system for compensation.

"Monitoring" means to receive electrical or 113 (27)114 electronic signals, originating from any structure building 115 within or outside of the state, regardless of whether those 116 signals are relayed through a jurisdiction outside of the state, 117 where such signals are produced by any security, medical, fire, 118 or burglar alarm, closed circuit television camera, access control system, or related or similar protective system and are 119 intended by design to initiate a response thereto. A person 120 121 shall not have committed the act of monitoring if:

(a) The person is an occupant of, or an employee workingwithin, protected premises;

(b) The person initiates emergency action in response tohearing or observing an alarm signal;

126 (c) The person's action is incidental to his or her 127 primary responsibilities; and

(d) The person is not employed in a proprietary monitoring
facility, as defined by the National Fire Protection Association
pursuant to rule adopted under chapter 633.

193 (a) To regulate the quality and character of work 194 performed by contractors through a system of permits, fees, and 195 inspections which is designed to secure compliance with, and aid 196 in the implementation of, state and local building laws or to 197 enforce other local laws for the protection of the public health 198 and safety. However, no certified alarm system contractor or 199 certified electrical contractor shall be subject to any 200 additional certification or licensure requirements not required 201 by this part.
