The first primary is a nomination or elimination election; the second 8 9 primary is a nominating election only. 10 Section 3. Subsection (1) of section 97.055, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 11 12 97.055 Registration books; when closed for an 13 election.--(1) The registration books must be closed on the 29th 14 day before each election and must remain closed until after 15 that election. If an election is called and there are fewer 16 17 than 29 days before that election, the registration books must be closed immediately. When the registration books are closed 18 for an election, voter registration and party changes must be 19 accepted but only for the purpose of subsequent elections. 20 21 However, party changes received between the book closing date 22 of the first primary election and the date of the second 23 primary election are not effective until after the second 2.4 primary election. 25 Section 4. Section 98.081, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 14 98.081 Names removed from registration books; 15 restrictions on reregistering; recordkeeping; restoration of 16 17 erroneously or illegally removed names. --18 (1) Any person who requested that his or her name be removed from the registration books between the book closing 19 date of the first primary and the date of the second primary 20 21 may not register in a different political party until after 22 the date of the second primary election. 23 (1) (1) (2) When the name of any elector is removed from the registration books pursuant to s. 98.065, s. 98.075, or s. 2.4 98.093, the elector's original registration form shall be 25 26 filed alphabetically in the office of the supervisor. As 27 alternatives, registrations removed from the registration 2.8 books may be microfilmed and such microfilms substituted for the original registration forms; or, when voter registration 29 information, including the voter's signature, is maintained 30 digitally or on electronic, magnetic, or optic media, such 31

If 26 the person is running for an office which will be grouped on 27 the ballot with two or more similar offices to be filled at 2.8 the same election, the candidate must indicate in his or her 29 oath for which group or district office he or she is running.
