A bill to be entitled

An act relating to human immunodeficiency virus; amending s. 381.0046, F.S.; increasing the number of HIV and AIDS minority coordinators within the Department of Health; requiring the department to expand its HIV/AIDS prevention efforts in the state's minority communities and establish linkage programs for HIV-positive persons in minority communities and for HIV-positive inmates prior to their release from jail; deleting obsolete provisions; requiring the department to expand HIV counseling, testing, and referral services; requiring programs under this section to be consistent with recommendations of certain state and federal organizations; providing an effective date.

WHEREAS, HIV/AIDS is one of the state's most critical public health challenges, with Florida having the third highest number of AIDS cases and the second highest number of pediatric AIDS cases in the nation, and

 WHEREAS, minorities, primarily African Americans and Hispanic Americans, now constitute 63 percent of the more than 99,000 adult and pediatric AIDS cases reported in Florida since the epidemic began in 1981, and

WHEREAS, the HIV/AIDS epidemic has disproportionately affected Florida's minority communities, and

WHEREAS, the total medical and related lifetime costs for a patient infected with HIV may reach \$175,000 or more, and

WHEREAS, the Legislature finds that sustained, comprehensive prevention efforts can have a substantial impact

on slowing the course of the HIV/AIDS epidemic, and

WHEREAS, the Legislature intends to decrease the number of deaths of minorities due to HIV/AIDS by increasing public awareness, increasing early detection and treatment of HIV/AIDS in the state's minority communities, and increasing the coordination of HIV/AIDS prevention and treatment efforts in the state's minority communities, and

WHEREAS, the prevalence of HIV/AIDS in the state's jails exceeds the prevalence of HIV/AIDS in the general population, and

WHEREAS, recent advances in treatment for HIV/AIDS can potentially reduce the number of opportunistic infections and associated medical costs and delay the onset of death due to the disease, and

WHEREAS, referral to appropriate medical and social services upon the release of an inmate can play a crucial role in treatment, care, and secondary prevention efforts, and

WHEREAS, the Legislature authorized the creation of the Minority HIV and AIDS Task Force to provide recommendations on strategies to strengthen HIV/AIDS prevention, early intervention, and treatment efforts in Florida's minority communities, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 381.0046, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

381.0046 Statewide HIV and AIDS prevention campaign.--

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(1) The Department of Health shall develop and implement a statewide HIV and AIDS prevention campaign that is directed towards minorities who are at risk of HIV infection. The campaign shall include television, radio, and outdoor advertising; public service announcements; and peer-to-peer outreach. Each campaign message and concept shall be evaluated with members of the target group to ensure its effectiveness. The campaign shall provide information on the risk of HIV and AIDS infection and strategies to follow for prevention, early detection, and treatment. The campaign shall use culturally sensitive literature and educational materials and promote the development of individual skills for behavior modification. The campaign shall be expanded to include prevention information specifically targeted to the state's Hispanic and Haitian communities.

- (2) The Department of Health shall establish eight four positions within the department for HIV and AIDS regional minority coordinators and one position for a statewide HIV and AIDS minority coordinator. The coordinators shall facilitate statewide efforts to implement and coordinate HIV and AIDS prevention and treatment programs. The statewide coordinator shall report directly to the chief of the Bureau of HIV and AIDS within the Department of Health.
- (3) The Department of Health shall provide HIV and AIDS outreach programs in the state's minority communities to identify persons infected with HIV and AIDS. These programs shall address real and perceived barriers to HIV testing among the state's minority populations, with assistance from the

Minority HIV and AIDS Task Force and the statewide coordinator, plan and conduct a statewide Black Leadership Conference on HIV and AIDS by January 2000. The conference shall provide workshops for minority organizations in building skills and improving an organization's capacity to conduct HIV and AIDS prevention and treatment programs.

- (4) The Department of Health shall provide a program to ensure that persons who are HIV positive are linked with prevention, care, and support services. This program shall be provided in a culturally sensitive manner to promote prevention among persons who are HIV positive and increase the acceptance and delivery of care and support services in high-risk communities.
- (5) The Department of Health shall expand testing programs for HIV, sexually transmissible diseases, and hepatitis in local county jails. The department shall establish programs for inmates who are HIV positive to ensure coordination and linkage to treatment and secondary prevention messages upon their release.
- (6) To promote HIV testing among minority persons who are at risk of infection, the department shall expand its HIV counseling, testing, and referral services.
- (7) Minority programs operating pursuant to this section shall be consistent with the findings and recommendations of the Minority HIV and AIDS Task Force and the State of Florida
 HIV/AIDS Comprehensive Prevention Plan and the recommendations of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.
 - Section 2. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law.
