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A bill to be entitled

An act relating to the John M. McKay Scholarships for Students with Disabilities Program; amending s. 1002.39, F.S.; authorizing a John M. McKay Scholarship to fund a home-based early intervention program for a child with an Autism Spectrum Disorder; providing an exemption from an attendance requirement; providing program requirements; specifying uses for scholarship funds; authorizing a John M. McKay Scholarship to fund certain community-based services for a public school student with an Autism Spectrum Disorder; defining the term "Autism Spectrum Disorder; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Subsection (8) of section 1002.39, Florida Statutes, is renumbered as subsection (9) and a new subsection (8) is added to said section to read:

1002.39 The John M. McKay Scholarships for Students with Disabilities Program.—There is established a program that is separate and distinct from the Opportunity Scholarship Program and is named the John M. McKay Scholarships for Students with Disabilities Program, pursuant to this section.

(8)(a) Notwithstanding the provisions of this section, the parent of a child with an Autism Spectrum Disorder may receive a John M. McKay Scholarship to fund a home-based Early Intensive Behavioral Intervention (EIBI) Program for the child. Such child shall not be required to have spent the prior school year in

(b) The EIBI Program must be:

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- 1. Recommended by a physician or the Early Steps Family
  Support Team for EIBI as the most effective treatment option for the child.
- 2. Planned and regularly supervised by a person who is, at minimum, a Board Certified Behavior Analyst (BCBA).
- 3. Provided in the family home with a weekly schedule of educational activities.
- (c) A John M. McKay Scholarship may be used to pay for or reimburse the following:
- 1. Assessment, program planning, staff and parent training, and supervision by the BCBA.
  - 2. Direct intervention with the child by the BCBA.
- 3. Services of a person who possesses an associate degree or higher and who has completed 15 hours of training in the EIBI Program.
- 4. Training manuals and books and teaching and learning materials essential for establishing and maintaining the EIBI Program.
- (d) A student with an Autism Spectrum Disorder who is at least 14 but not more than 22 years of age and in the public school system is eligible for a John M. McKay Scholarship to pay for services provided by a community-based organization for or related to career or life skills preparation.
- (e) The term "Autism Spectrum Disorder" means one of the five specific diagnoses enumerated in the DSM-IV for Pervasive
