Subsection (5) of section 409.903, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 11 12 409.903 Mandatory payments for eligible persons. -- The 13 agency shall make payments for medical assistance and related services on behalf of the following persons who the 14 15 department, or the Social Security Administration by contract with the Department of Children and Family Services, 16 17 determines to be eligible, subject to the income, assets, and categorical eligibility tests set forth in federal and state 18 law. Payment on behalf of these Medicaid eligible persons is 19 subject to the availability of moneys and any limitations 20 21 established by the General Appropriations Act or chapter 216. 22 (5) A pregnant woman for the duration of her pregnancy 23 and for the postpartum period as defined in federal law and rule, or a child under age 1, if either is living in a family 2.4 that has an income which is at or below 150 percent of the 25 most current federal poverty level, or, effective January 1, 26 27 1992, that has an income which is at or below 185 percent of 2.8 the most current federal poverty level. Such a person is not subject to an assets test. Further, a pregnant woman who 29 applies for eligibility for the Medicaid program through a 30 qualified Medicaid provider must be offered the opportunity, 31

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subject to federal rules, to be made presumptively eligible for the Medicaid program. Effective July 1, 2005, eligibility for Medicaid services is eliminated for women who have incomes above 185 150 percent of the most current federal poverty level. Section 2. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law. SENATE SUMMARY Increases the income level, from 150 percent to 185 percent above the federal poverty level, at which a pregnant woman is eligible for Medicaid services.

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
