The Environmental Regulation Committee recommends the following:

and Coastal Resources Council; providing findings and
intent; providing for board composition, purpose, and
responsibilities; authorizing reimbursement for travel and
per diem; requiring the Department of Environmental
Protection to provide certain services to the council;
requiring the council to submit preliminary and annual
reports to the Governor and the Legislature; providing for
a pilot research project; providing an effective date.

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Section 380.29, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

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380.29 Oceans and Coastal Resources Council.--

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(1) FINDINGS; INTENT. -- In spite of many years of efforts

to protect and conserve the resources of the state's coastal

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zone, recent reports, including the September 2004 Final Report of the United States Commission on Ocean Policy, have identified troubling trends with regard to continuing degradation of the state's coastal zone that will require major changes in the way this area is managed.

- (a) The Coastal Management Act was adopted in 1972 as a means for complying with the federal Coastal Zone Management Act. The coastal zone management plan approved by the Federal Government for the state to comply with the Coastal Zone Management Act is based on existing statutes and rules and is coordinated through the Coastal Management Program in the Department of Environmental Protection. It is now apparent that the program has not been completely effective in achieving the goal of protecting and conserving the resources of the state's coastal zone, and new measures must be taken to achieve this goal.
- (b) The inability of the current coastal zone management plan to achieve the goal of protecting and conserving the resources of the state's coastal zone is due in large part to inadequate information with regard to those resources and inadequate management strategies to protect and conserve those resources.
- (c) It is the intent of the Legislature to create the Oceans and Coastal Resources Council to assist the state in determining what new management strategies should be implemented to achieve the goal of maximizing the protection and conservation of the resources of the state's coastal zone.

(d) It is the intent of the Legislature that publicprivate partnerships be encouraged as a means of providing
necessary research and management in order to achieve the
protection and conservation goals for the state's coastal zone.

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(2) COMPOSITION. -- The Oceans and Coastal Resources Council shall be composed of 15 voting members. The Governor shall appoint four members, the President of the Senate shall appoint four members, the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint four members, and the Board of Directors of the Florida Oceans Alliance shall appoint three members. The Governor shall appoint the chair, and the vice chair shall be elected from among the membership. Membership shall be representative of the boating and dive industries, the commercial and recreational fishing industries, the energy industry, the environmental community, the development industry, ocean research and development, ports and marine transportation, the tourism industry, the ecotourism industry with an interest in wildlife conservation, and university ocean education and shall include members of the House of Representatives and the Senate. The Secretary of Environmental Protection, the Secretary of Community Affairs, the Executive Director of the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, the Commissioner of Agriculture, the Commissioner of Education, and the Secretary of State or their designees shall also serve as ex officio members of the council. All appointments shall be for 4-year terms. The Governor may at any time fill a vacancy for an unexpired term. The members of the council shall serve without compensation but shall be paid travel and per diem as provided in s. 112.061

79 while in the performance of their official duties. Administrative, personnel, and other support services necessary 80 for the council shall be furnished by the Department of 81 82 Environmental Protection.

- (3) PURPOSE.--The purpose of the council shall be to determine those new management strategies that should be implemented to achieve the goal of maximizing the protection and conservation of the resources of the state's coastal zone through the specific responsibilities listed in subsection (4).
  - (4) RESPONSIBILITIES. --

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- The initial responsibility of the council is to review the September 2004 Final Report of the United States Commission on Ocean Policy and other similar reports in order to identify those specific issues of concern that apply to the state.
- The council shall then conduct a comprehensive evaluation of the state's current coastal zone management plan for the purpose of understanding how that plan is being implemented and why it has not been effective in achieving the goal of protecting and conserving the resources of the state's coastal zone.
- The council shall identify specific, quantifiable (C) goals that can be achieved to meet the overall goal of protecting and conserving the resources of the state's coastal zone.
- The council shall create a research task force and a management task force to assist in its work.
- 105 The research task force shall be composed of 106 representatives from the state's marine science institutions and

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habitat and shall be appointed by the council. The research task force shall be responsible for identifying specific inadequacies in the information and data that are essential to the implementation of effective management strategies for achieving the identified goals. The research task force shall make recommendations to the council for specific research projects that can be conducted to provide the needed information.

- 2. The management task force shall be composed of representatives from the Department of Environmental Protection, the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, each of the five water management districts, the South Atlantic Fisheries

  Management Council, and the Gulf of Mexico Fisheries Management Council. The management task force shall be responsible for identifying specific inadequacies in the current management of the state's coastal resources. The management task force shall make recommendations to the council for specific changes to the current management programs that can be implemented to address those management inadequacies.
- (e) The council shall have continuing responsibilities to seek funding for research and propose legislation for new management strategies and realignment of current management responsibilities.
- (5) REPORTING.--The council shall submit a preliminary report of its work to the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives by February 1, 2006. In subsequent years, the council shall report annually by December 31 to the Governor, the President of the Senate, and

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the Speaker of the House of Representatives and shall include in such report recommendations for research needs and management strategies, recommendations for legislative appropriations, and proposed legislation needed to implement any recommended changes to management strategies.

Section 2. In order to protect, conserve, and restore declining recreational fisheries, stimulate economic growth, and help meet the state's seafood needs, the research task force created in s. 380.29(4)(d), Florida Statutes, shall, as a pilot project to demonstrate the feasibility of collaborative research efforts, direct research by two or more marine science research entities to evaluate the potential for inland, recirculating, and aquaculture technology to produce marine species and to implement new marine stock enhancement initiatives. This project shall be designed to expand new aquaculture and marine stock enhancement technology to include additional species and evaluate the potential to successfully enhance those marine stocks. The research task force shall present to the Oceans and Coastal Resources Council the results of this research project by March 1, 2007.

Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2005.
