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21	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
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23	Section 1. Section 501.935, Florida Statutes, is
24	created to read:
25	501.935 Home inspection services; advisory council;
26	licensure requirements; exemptions; prohibited acts and
27	penalties; complaints and discipline; fees and insurance;
28	continuing education; reciprocity; limitations and
29	enforcement
30	(1) INTENTIt is the intent of this section to
31	require the licensing of home inspectors and to ensure that
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1 consumers of home inspection services can rely on the 2 competence of home inspectors, as determined by educational and experience requirements and testing. 3 4 (2) DEFINITIONS.--As used in this section, the term: 5 (a) "Department" means the Department of Business and 6 Professional Regulation. 7 (b) "Home" means any residential real property, or 8 manufactured or modular home, which is a single-family 9 dwelling, duplex, triplex, quadruplex, condominium unit, or 10 cooperative unit. The term does not include the common areas of condominiums or cooperatives. 11 12 (c) "Home inspector" means any person who provides or 13 offers to provide a home inspection for a fee or other compensation. 14 (d) "Home inspection" means a limited visual 15 examination of one or more of the readily accessible installed 16 17 systems and components of a home, including the structure, 18 electrical system, HVAC system, roof covering, plumbing system, interior components, exterior components, and site 19 conditions that affect the structure, for the purposes of 20 21 providing a written professional opinion of the condition of 2.2 the home. 23 (3) STANDARDS OF PRACTICE. -- The department, in consultation with the Florida Home Inspection Advisory 2.4 Council, shall adopt by rule pursuant to ss. 120.536(1) and 25 120.54 the minimum standards of practice for home inspectors, 26 27 which shall be based on nationally recognized industry 2.8 standards of practice for home inspectors. (4) FLORIDA HOME INSPECTION ADVISORY COUNCIL. --29 30 (a) The department shall appoint a Florida Home Inspection Advisory Council to consist of eight members who 31

1	are home inspectors having a minimum of 5 years' experience
2	each, one consumer member, and one nonvoting member from the
3	staff of the department.
4	(b) The mission of the advisory council is to provide
5	industry input to the department and assist the department in
6	developing standards of practice and rules pursuant to this
7	section.
8	(c) The advisory council shall assist the department
9	in the review of complaints filed against home inspectors.
10	(d) The advisory council shall meet at least three
11	times each year.
12	(5) EXEMPTIONS The following persons are not
13	required to comply with this section with regard to any
14	valuation condition, report, survey, evaluation, or estimate
15	rendered within the scope of practice authorized by such
16	license, except when such persons are operating within the
17	scope of this section:
18	(a) A construction contractor licensed under chapter
19	<u>489.</u>
20	(b) An architect licensed under chapter 481.
21	(c) An engineer licensed under chapter 471.
22	(d) A building code administrator, plans examiner, or
23	building code inspector licensed under part XII of chapter
24	<u>468.</u>
25	(e) A certified real estate appraiser, licensed real
26	estate appraiser, or registered real estate appraiser licensed
27	<u>under part II of chapter 475.</u>
28	(f) An inspector whose report is being provided to,
29	and is solely for the benefit of, the Federal Housing
30	Administration or the Veterans Administration.
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1 (q) An inspector conducting inspections for 2 wood-destroying organisms on behalf of a licensee under chapter 482. 3 4 (h) A firesafety inspector certified under s. 633.081. 5 (i) An insurance adjuster licensed under part VI of 6 chapter 626. 7 (j) An officer appointed by the court. 8 (k) A master septic tank contractor licensed under part III of chapter 489. 9 10 (1) A certified energy auditor performing an energy audit of any home or building conducted under chapter 366 or 11 12 rules adopted by the Public Service Commission. 13 (6) LICENSE CRITERIA.--(a) A person may not provide or represent himself or 14 herself as able to perform a professional home inspection for 15 compensation unless the person is licensed in accordance with 16 17 this section. 18 (b) A business entity may not provide or offer to provide home inspection services unless each of the home 19 inspectors employed by the business entity is licensed in 20 21 accordance with this section. 22 (c) A business entity may not use, in connection with 23 the name or signature of the business entity, the title "home inspectors to describe the business entity's services unless 2.4 each of the home inspectors employed by the business entity is 25 licensed in accordance with this section. 26 27 (7) ELIGIBILITY.--To be eligible for a license as a 2.8 home inspector, an applicant must: (a) Be of good moral character. 29 30 (b) Have successfully completed high school or its equivalent. 31

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1	(c) Have completed a course of study of no less than
2	90 hours that covers all of the following components of a
3	home: structure, electrical system, HVAC system, roof
4	covering, plumbing system, interior components, exterior
5	components, and site conditions that affect the structure.
б	(d) Pass an examination that is psychometrically valid
7	and meets the standards of the Council on Licensure,
8	Enforcement, and Regulation, as determined by the department.
9	(8) GRANDFATHERING For the first year after the
10	enactment of this section, to be eligible for a license as a
11	home inspector, an applicant must:
12	(a) Be of good moral character.
13	(b) Have successfully completed high school or its
14	equivalent or have been in the business of home inspection
15	services for at least 5 years.
16	(c) Have been engaged in the practice of home
17	inspection for compensation for not fewer than 3 years prior
18	to the effective date of this section.
19	(d) Have performed not fewer than 250 home inspections
20	for compensation.
21	(e) Have passed a psychometrically valid examination
22	that meets the standards in the Council on Licensure,
23	Enforcement, and Regulation publication "A Resource Brief on
24	Licensure Examinations, " as determined by the department.
25	(9) PROHIBITED ACTS; PENALTIES
26	(a) A home inspector, a company that employs a home
27	inspector, or a company that is controlled by a company that
28	also has a financial interest in a company employing a home
29	inspector may not:
30	1. Perform or offer to perform, prior to closing, for
31	any additional fee, any repairs to a home on which the
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1 inspector or the inspector's company has prepared a home 2 inspection report. This paragraph does not apply to a home warranty company that is affiliated with or retains a home 3 inspector to perform repairs pursuant to a claim made under a 4 5 home warranty contract. б Inspect for a fee any property in which the 2. 7 inspector or the inspector's company has any financial or 8 transfer interest. Offer or deliver any compensation, inducement, or 9 3. 10 reward to the owner of the inspected property, or any broker or agent therefor, for the referral of any business to the 11 12 inspector or the inspection company. 13 4. Accept an engagement to make an omission or prepare a report in which the inspection itself, or the fee payable 14 for the inspection, is contingent upon either the conclusions 15 in the report, preestablished findings, or the close of 16 17 escrow. 18 (b) Any person who violates any provision of this subsection commits a misdemeanor of the second degree, 19 punishable as provided in s. 775.082 or s. 775.083. 20 21 (10) COMPLAINTS; DISCIPLINE.--22 (a) Complaints concerning a home inspector subject to 23 the provisions of this section shall be referred to the 2.4 department. (b) In lieu of investigation, the department may place 25 in a registry a copy of a complaint received by the department 26 27 against a licensed home inspector, the inspector's response to 2.8 the complaint, and a copy of any records of the department 29 concerning the complaint. 30 (c) The department shall provide to the home inspector a copy of the complaint no later than 30 days after the date 31

1 the complaint is received by the department alleging that the 2 inspector has engaged in conduct that is grounds for discipline. 3 4 (d) After receiving a copy of the complaint, the home inspector may place in a registry a statement within 30 days 5 6 that describes the inspector's view of the correctness or 7 relevance of any of the information contained in the 8 complaint. 9 (e) The department shall make the complaint and the 10 home inspector's response to the complaint available to the 11 public. 12 (f) The department shall remove all complaints against 13 and other information concerning a home inspector from the registry if, for a period of 2 years from the date of the most 14 recent complaint filed in the registry, no further complaints 15 16 have been filed against the inspector. 17 (q) Unworthy or frivolous complaints shall be 18 discarded and shall not be retained. 19 (h) The department may make investigations or conduct hearings pursuant to chapter 120 to determine whether a 20 21 violation of this section has occurred. 22 (i) The department may refuse to grant a home 23 inspector license or may suspend or revoke a home inspector license upon proof to the satisfaction of the department that 2.4 the applicant or licensee has participated in an unfair 25 business practice relating to the provision of home inspection 26 27 services. 28 (11) FEES.--The department shall by rule establish the fees for licensure, renewal of licensure, and other services 29 provided by the department under this section. Fees 30 established under this subsection may not exceed amounts 31

1 sufficient to defray the administrative costs to the state 2 under this section and shall be comparable to those charged for other similar, regulated professions. 3 4 (12) INSURANCE. -- A licensed home inspector must maintain a commercial general liability insurance policy in an 5 6 amount of not less that \$300,000. 7 (13) REPAIR COST ESTIMATES. -- Home inspectors are not 8 required to provide estimates related to the cost of repair of 9 an inspected property. 10 (14) RECIPROCITY.--The department shall issue a home inspector license to any person who holds a valid license, 11 12 certificate, or registration issued by another state, the 13 District of Columbia, or a territory or possession of the United States that has standards and licensing requirements 14 substantially equivalent to or exceeding those of this state, 15 as determined by the Florida Home Inspection Advisory Council, 16 17 upon payment of the fee imposed and submission of the written 18 application provided by the department. 19 (15) CONTINUING EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS. -- A licensed 20 home inspector must complete at least 14 hours of continuing 21 education approved by the department during each calendar year 2.2 in order to maintain his or her license. 23 (16) STATUTE OF LIMITATIONS. -- Chapter 95 governs when an action to enforce an obligation, duty, or right arising 2.4 under this section must be commenced. 25 (17) ENFORCEMENT OF VIOLATIONS. -- Any violation of this 26 27 section constitutes a deceptive and unfair trade practice, 2.8 punishable as provided in part II of this chapter. Section 2. For the 2005-2006 fiscal year, the sum of 29 \$642,463 is appropriated from the Professional Regulation 30 Trust Fund, and four positions are authorized, to the 31

4	Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2005.
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
