SECTION 1. Public education. --

(a) The education of children is a fundamental value of

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needs of the people may require. To assure that children attending public schools obtain a high quality education, the legislature shall make adequate provision to ensure that, by the beginning of the 2010 school year, there are a sufficient number of classrooms so that:

- (1) The maximum number of students who are assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public school classrooms for prekindergarten through grade 3 does not exceed 18 students;
- (2) The maximum number of students who are assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public school classrooms for grades 4 through 8 does not exceed 22 students; and
- (3) The maximum number of students who are assigned to each teacher who is teaching in public school classrooms for grades 9 through 12 does not exceed 25 students.

The class size requirements of this subsection do not apply to extracurricular classes. Payment of the costs associated with reducing class size to meet these requirements is the responsibility of the state and not of local schools districts. Beginning with the 2003-2004 fiscal year, the legislature shall provide sufficient funds to reduce the average number of students in each classroom by at least two students per year until the maximum number of students per classroom does not exceed the requirements of this subsection.

(b) By 2010, the average minimum salary for full-time public school teachers shall be no less than the national average beginning pay for public school teachers, as provided by

law. By 2010, the average salary for full-time public school teachers shall be no less than the national average, as provided by law. The increases in the beginning and average full-time public school teacher salaries shall be independent of employee benefits and shall not alter, jeopardize, or decrease existing employee benefits. Payment of the costs associated with increasing beginning and average teacher pay is the responsibility of the state and not of school districts. Nothing in this subsection shall impair collective bargaining.

(c)(b) Every four-year old child in Florida shall be provided by the State a high quality pre-kindergarten learning opportunity in the form of an early childhood development and education program which shall be voluntary, high quality, free, and delivered according to professionally accepted standards. An early childhood development and education program means an organized program designed to address and enhance each child's ability to make age appropriate progress in an appropriate range of settings in the development of language and cognitive capabilities and emotional, social, regulatory and moral capacities through education in basic skills and such other skills as the Legislature may determine to be appropriate.

(d)(e) The early childhood education and development programs provided by reason of subsection (c) subparagraph (b) shall be implemented no later than the beginning of the 2005 school year through funds generated in addition to those used for existing education, health, and development programs.

Existing education, health, and development programs are those

funded by the State as of January 1, 2002 that provided for child or adult education, health care, or development.

SECTION 26. Beginning and average teacher salaries.--The amendment to Section 1 of Article IX relating to public education, which establishes beginning and average teacher salaries, shall take effect July 1 following approval by the electors.
